CAME UP SOME
Stocks Were Better On Friday

LOUD CHEERING
WHEN THE BELL SOUNDED FOR CLOSE.

Solvency of Houses After a Terrible Panic—Ryan was the Man Who Saved the Situation When Men Were Being Crippled on Every Hand.



THOMAS F. RYAN.
New York, March 16.—There was a wild and spontaneous outburst of cheering when the bell sounded for the close of business on the stock exchange yesterday, while hats were tossed in the air and coats were torn off and thrown about the room. The outburst was a panoply of self-praise over the solvency of brokerage houses during and after one of the worst panics in the history of Wall Street.
The market had rallied the twenty statistical railway stocks which declined an average of \$7.51 a share on Thursday, and \$12.82 on Thursday and Wednesday, had closed at \$106.01 a share, an average net gain of \$6.30, or almost half of the total loss of the two days. But the phenomenon of the day, as it was on Thursday and over on Wednesday, was that the hundreds of men crippled by the tremendous declines were still able to stand up and make deliveries. The fortunate outcome is credited to T. F. Ryan, vice-president of the Morton Trust company, who, whether for speculation, investment, or to allay the panic, had during the three days put in very close to \$4,000,000 in the purchase of securities, his purchases being directed generally to the acquisition of shares under the most severe pressure, and apparently more made without any intent to secure control in any corporation, but whatever their object, they assisted materially in stemming the tide.

BOND OF SECRECY
Was Removed By Mrs. Evelyn Thaw.

New York, March 16.—With Attorney Delmas fighting him every inch of the way, District Attorney Jerome, yesterday, secured from Abraham Rosen his complete story as to the affair which it is alleged Evelyn Nesbit Thaw made known to the public in 1903, charging Harry K. Thaw with hearing her when she had told him that the statement that Stanford White had drugged and ruined her was not true.
Evelyn Nesbit Thaw herself was called to the stand in the effort of the defence to keep Hummel silent. She declared she had called upon Hummel in his professional capacity and to seek his advice as a lawyer. Stanford White had taken her to the lawyer's office with that end in view.
Justice Fitzgerald declared that, admitting the proposition of counsel and client, Mrs. Thaw had herself waived the professional privilege by taking the stand early in the case and giving her version of what transpired at Hummel's office. The bond of secrecy once removed could not be re-established.

WIDOW FROM INJURIES.
A Police Magistrate Fell Down Stairs.

Goderich, Ont., March 16.—Police Magistrate C. A. Humber died, this morning, as the result of an accident in falling downstairs fracturing his skull. Mr. Humber was moving a bath tub down a flight of stairs, when the edge of a stair, he was standing on, broke away, precipitating him to the ground. He fell backwards, his head striking an iron pipe, breaking the back of his skull. Mr. Humber was one of Goderich's best known citizens. He will be buried on Tuesday, under Masonic auspices, having been very high in the order.

Was Badly Crushed.
Hamilton, Ont., March 16.—In a rear-end collision on the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo railway, this morning, Ross Asplien, heat-stove, a railway employee, was so seriously injured that he died shortly after being admitted to the city hospital. Both of his legs and one of his shoulders were broken.

TAINED MONEY A MYTH.
He'll Accept Any That Isn't Counterfeit.

Washington, March 16.—"There is no such thing as tainted money, declared Dr. Charles W. Neelham, president of George Washington university, in an address before the students of that institution.
The university is making a campaign for a larger scope in American education, and has raised more than \$20,000 lately, to buy the purchase of a \$400,000 site for new buildings. "What is it that taints money?" asked President Neelham, in announcing the university's attitude on the "tainted money" question. "Some people say about it. They say that the wrong conduct of a holder attaches to the money and the money is therefore unfit for service.
"Human conduct in acquiring money does not attach to it, in the coin, nor lessor nor weaken the promise to pay upon the bank note. Good moral money—that is, coin of full weight and five promises to pay, good coin—is good anywhere, in any man's hand. "Truth takes no passing shadows to itself, and money cannot become impregnated by the deeds of passing users.
"Having this view of good money, I will accept it from any man who was it."

AN AWFUL DEED
WORKMAN CREMATED BY COMPANIONS FOR JOKE.

Was Sleeping Before a Furnace to Keep Warm When "Jokers" Poured Benzine on Him From Five-Gallon Can—Instantly Enveloped in Flames.
Pittsburg, Pa., March 16.—A joke, terrible in its result, was played by workmen employed in the McKee's Rooks plant of the Pressed Steel Car company. The victim is dead, having been burned to a crisp, and the joker is being eagerly sought by the county authorities.
J. Houti, a laborer employed in the plant, was snatching a few minutes' sleep at 2.30 o'clock, this morning, and to keep warm was lying in front of a furnace.
A crane man spied the sleeper, and thought it would be a great joke to pour oil on his head. He called several other workmen into the scheme, and they secured a five-gallon can of benzine.
Taking the can upon the travelling crane with him, the "joker" waited until he was over the prostrate Houti, and then poured the contents on him.
The benzine ignited as soon as the flames came in contact with the furnace, and in a moment Houti was lying, and in an instant he was enveloped in flames.
The other workmen made every effort to save him, but by the time the fire was extinguished, Houti was burned to a crisp, and he died almost instantly.

PUBLIC REQUESTS.

Philadelphia, March 16.—In adjudicating the estate of E. P. Wright of this city, who died in 1903, the city orphans' court has awarded these charitable bequests: Protestant Episcopal church of the United States, \$50,000; Methodist Episcopal church of the United States, \$50,000; Baptist States, \$20,000; Young Men's Christian association, \$15,000; American Sunday School union, \$15,000.

DIAMOND WEDDING HELD.
Miseners of Princeton, Celebrate Anniversary.

Brantford, Ont., March 16.—On March 11th, at Princeton, was celebrated a very pleasant event, it being the sixtieth anniversary of the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. David Misenar. All the children now living were around the festive board. They are Mrs. W. H. Lee, of Brantford; Mrs. Bess Misenar, of Toronto; Alexander, of Woodstock, and Mrs. Joseph Elvidge, of Princeton. Mr. Misenar and wife having been celebrated on his birthday, they also celebrated the eighty-eighth anniversary of that event. Mr. Misenar's hearing is fair and his sight so good as to enable him to read without the aid of glasses. His memory is also remarkable.

A-FARTHING APIECE.
Were the Damages Secured By W. O'Brien.

Limerick, Ireland, March 16.—In the action for libel brought by William O'Brien, member of parliament for Cork city, against the Freeman's Journal, in which Mr. O'Brien claimed \$25,000 damages, the jury yesterday awarded the plaintiff one farthing damages on each of the six counts.

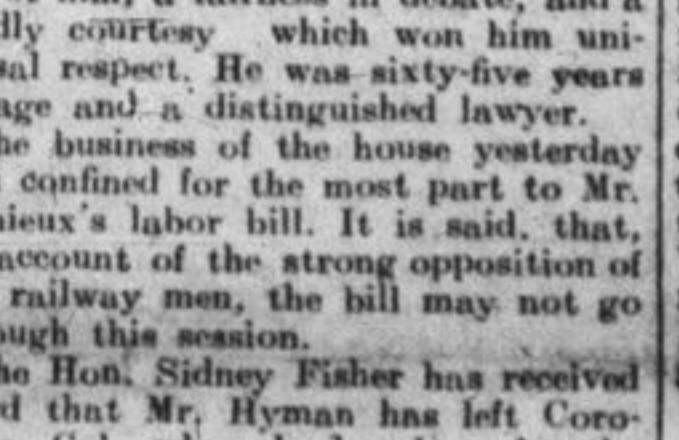
LITTLE HERO SAVED LIFE.
Throws Her Apron Over Woman's Head.
Quebec, March 16.—A young woman, Mrs. Phillips Gingras, residing in St. Lawrence ward, attempted several days ago to light a fire with kerosene. When the flames set fire to her clothing she made a desperate effort to tear off her burning clothing, but the fire reached her hair, and she was unable to do so. Without a moment's hesitation the child, under her apron, wrapped it around the head of the victim, thus stifling the flames and saving the woman's life.

WILL BE HEARD
The Report Of Insurance Commission.

BOURASSA TO TALK
IF SESSION IS NOT OVER LAURIER STAYS.

The Late Dr. Stockton, M.P., Was An Able Man—Broke Down When Speaking of His Worth—Department of Mines is to Be Established.
From Our Own Correspondent.
Ottawa, March 16.—The report of the insurance commission will be discussed this session after all. Mr. Bourassa will open the attack on March 25th, and it is understood that there will be several field days.
Coming so near the proposed departure of the premier for England, it is extremely doubtful if the business of the session will be completed by April 5th. In that case Sir Wilfrid Laurier may postpone his departure.
Dr. A. A. Stockton, M.P., of St. John, N.B., died yesterday morning, making the eighth this session and the fourth within a week. Tributes were paid to his memory by the leaders were impressive. Between him and Sir Wilfrid Laurier there existed a keen personal regard. Dr. Daniels and Mr. Foster, his particular friends, both attempted to speak, but both broke down.
Dr. Stockton was not only one of the ablest men in the house, but as regards parliamentary procedure, he was recognized authority, to whom knotty questions by both sides were often referred. He was one of the strongest men in the opposition, and there was besides a charm of manner about him, a fairness in debate, and a kindly courtesy, which won him universal respect. He was sixty-five years of age and a distinguished lawyer.
The business of the house yesterday was confined for the most part to Mr. Lemieux's labor bill. It is said that on account of the strong opposition of the railway men, the bill may not go through this session.
The Hon. Sidney Fisher has received word that Mr. Hyman has left Colorado, Cal., where he has been for the last two months, and has gone to Los Angeles. He will remain there for some time. Mr. Hyman's health is improving, but he is not yet able to return to work.
So great is now the concern of the Dominion in mining that it has been determined to create a department of mines. The minister of inland revenue has given notice of an act to this effect.
Mr. Templeman is the British Columbia representative in the cabinet, and British Columbia, it is known, has long been pressing upon the government that the industry of mining, which is expanding very rapidly, and which has almost illimitable possibilities for expansion, should be recognized and encouraged by the creation of a department having it especially in charge.
The new department will not involve any addition to the cabinet, its administration being assigned to a minister of the crown by order of the governor-general-in-council, just as the labor department may be placed in the hands of any minister.
It is, of course, understood that Mr. Templeman will be placed at the head of the new department, which will comprise two branches, a geological branch and a mines branch, over each of which there will be a director and a deputy minister over each. The department will have assigned to it all matters relating to mining.
In the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and in the territories, the dominion owns the lands and enacts the mining laws and regulations, and there the dominion has jurisdiction in all mining questions.
In other provinces, which own their own lands and make their own mining laws the usefulness of the new department to the industry will be great, as its most important work will be to promote mining development, member of parliament for the minister of agriculture promotes the agricultural industry in all the provinces of the dominion, that will be by exploration, examination, publication of accurate information, experimental, metallurgical investigation and in many other ways.

NARROW ESCAPES
In the Socialistic Colony at Engelwood, N.J.



UPTON SINCLAIR.
New York, March 16.—Following a serious explosion, which tore away the front part of the building, Helicon Hall, Upton Sinclair's socialistic colony, at Engelwood, N.J., was totally destroyed by fire this early morning and fifty-five persons who comprised the settlement had narrow escapes with their lives.

TEN MORE MILLIONS
ADDED TO CAPITALIZATION OF COBALT.

Action Regarding Gas Drilling Dismissed—The Stock Feeling More Cheerful—Some of the Gains.
Toronto, March 16.—Ten millions of dollars have been added to Cobalt capitalization according to the announcements of new mining companies in this week's Ontario Gazette. Included in the list of new industrial companies which have been incorporated this week are two independent telephone companies, the Vanford Telephone company, capital \$10,000, and the Bracebridge & Muskoka Lakes Telephone company, capital \$10,000.
Justice McMahon, in a judgment this morning, dismissed an action of Niagara Peninsula Power & Gas company, of Welland, against the St. Catharines & Niagara Power and Fuel company. The action was for the continuation of an injunction to prevent the defendants from drilling for gas on the property of plaintiffs. The injunction, which was objected to by the plaintiffs, is dissolved.
The feeling here, as it could be indicated by stock exchange movements, was more cheerful this morning than yesterday. Many issues, including Canadianians, Americans and Cobalts, advanced. Some of the morning's gains were C.P.R., three points; South Company, three points; Twin City, two and a half; Reading, three; Union Pacific, four; Northern Pacific, three; Great Northern, preferred, four; Sloss, eight, and United States Steel, two and a half.

IRISH VICTIMS PROMOTED.
Survivors Will Receive Higher Pensions.

Toulon, France, March 16.—Only fifty bodies have been identified of the 107 found in-or about the bulk of the battleship Iena. The state funeral will be attended by President Fialier. All the dead have been posthumously promoted so that their survivors will receive higher pensions.

HUB ISLAND SOLD TWICE.
Clayton, N.Y., March 16.—Andrew C. Fields, of Dobbs' Ferry, has sold his steam yacht Enogone, houseboat Lysander and Hub Island, located just above Thousand Island Park, to Capt. A. Capron, of Clayton. Capt. Capron sold Hub Island to E. G. Robbins for \$10,000.

IS SHORT \$130,000.
Berlin, March 16.—Cashier Speyer, of the Mueller Industrial bank, of this city, has disappeared, leaving a shortage of \$130,000. It is thought he lost the money in stock speculations.
