Paris Has a Sweet Tooth For Horses.

Paris, March 16.—No matter what other people's tastes and sensitiveness are, Paris has no prejudice to horse-flesh, and partakes of it with great freedom, and in such quantities and so regularly that the consumption of man's best friend has reached forty thousand carcasses yearly. Some have been cart horses, some gay carriage horses and have drawn drays along the boulevards, but these self-same horses that now serve as food for Paris needy people, but some also for her gourmands. The forty thousand animals eaten represent about 11,000,000 kilograms of horse flesh, as compared with the earlier figures of 1899, when a total of only 5,000,000 was eaten. The business seems to be growing rapidly, so that the horse butcher is assuming the position of quite a respectable competitor with the beef butcher. Horse butcher signs, with a gold horse head above the door, are numerous in certain sections of the city, and horse butchers are rapidly pre-empting stalls in the market house. It is charged that the

doctors are in league with the butchers, as they are more and more recommending horse flesh for certain patients.

Prices Go Up.

A sudden rise has been noted in the price of imported tobacco and cigarettes. Just at this season, when the different stocks are very low and coming as it did without notice, it has annoyed local dealers. Cigarettes that formerly sold at 15c a package have been raised twenty-five per cent. Some of the dealers have not raised the prices of these goods yet, but must do so on ordering more stock. Nearly all imported tobacco will, hereafter, sell at an advance of twenty-five per cent.
