IS VINDICATED. The Policy of the Irish, Says Dillon. KILLED IN SNOW FORT. Brother, Also Burned, is Dog Out in Time. New York, March 18.—John Meara, the sixteen-year-old son of a policeman, was smothered to death, Saturday, in the ruins of a snow fort which he had helped other boys to build. His brother, Edward, aged thirteen, was dug out only in time to save his life. Against a high board fence the boys had packed a square of damp, heavy snow, eight feet high, into which they were burrowing when the snow collapsed.
