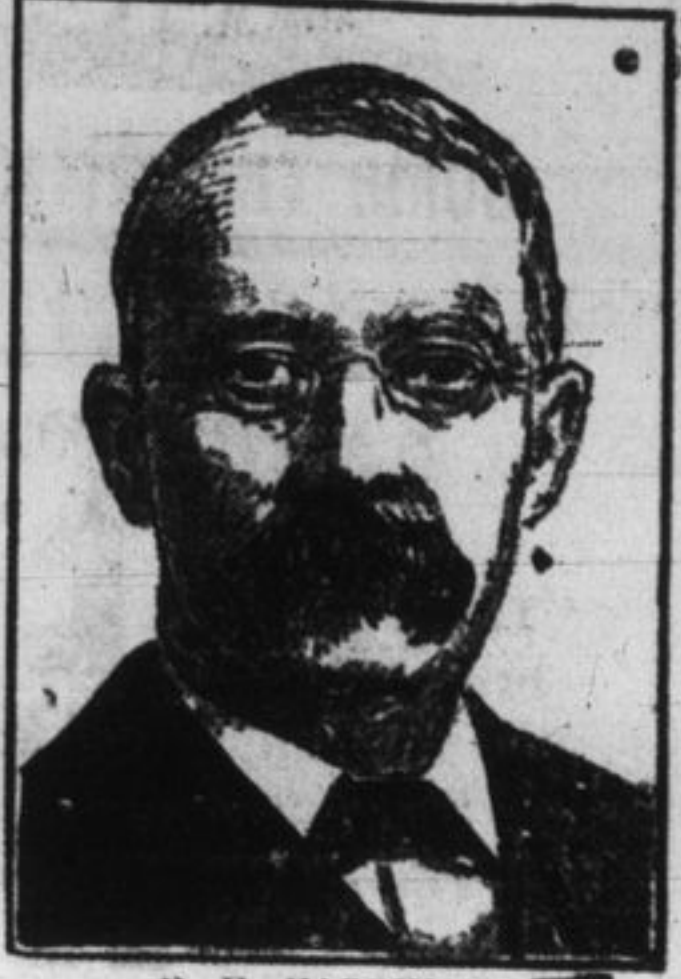

**CRUSH HARRIMAN THIS WAS INTENT OF STOCK PANIC.**

Financiers Planned Campaign With Government Aid to Overthrow Operator in Obedience to Ultimatum.

New York, March 18.—Harriman has got to go. He has no conception of what is lawful and what is unlawful. He has a lawless nature. He is a menace to this country. He is a disgrace to the institution of railroads. The government purposes to follow him up and expose his dealings and practices against public morality and business decency until it is impossible for him to stand up longer against the storm of public opinion that will overwhelm him.

The above ultimatum from President Roosevelt to J. Pierpont Morgan, who is the financial master of the administration's fight on predatory railroads, was the real cause of the sensational upheaval in the stock markets in the last two weeks, according to The New York press. Despite E. H. Harriman's denial to the contrary The Press asserts that the latest king pin of finance has lost, or will lose, the control of the whole Union Pacific system, which includes the Southern Pacific and the Central Pacific, the greatest in the world!

Not only this, but Reading and practically all his other seizures have been, or are to be, wrested from him. He is to be driven from the financial world, rebelliously, just as he de-throned Stuyvesant Fish in the Illinois Central and others of his victims.

Morgan sent an emissary to sound President Roosevelt as to whether his quarrel was with all the railroads, or whether he merely was on the trail of bad managements with the Big Stick. The president sent back word that his only purpose was to stop law-breaking.

Morgan then went personally to assure the president that the wiser managements would be glad to come to an understanding under which they could obey the laws more intelligently.

"That's not enough," said the president. "What is required of us?" asked Mr. Morgan.

Then the president made his extraordinary accusation against the man who has succeeded in putting himself at the head of the American railroad war, after years of fighting, with remorseless methods.

Morgan pleaded that the only possible means whereby Harriman could be overthrown was manipulation in Wall street, which would tear the whole market to pieces, and probably result in a panic from which the country might not recover for years.

President Roosevelt replied that he could not alter his determination to do his duty. If the financial powers thought more of Harriman than of the same shade. The hint had a Roosevelt programme went on just the same.

**YIELDS UP ITS DEAD MURDERER SEES HIS VICTIM'S BODY FOUND.**

Hole He Ordered Man to Make Three Years Ago Intended For Grave.

March 19.—A sensational murder mystery was partially solved this afternoon, when the body of a wealthy young man named Hentchel, who disappeared from home at Munich three years ago, was dug up on a piece of waste land outside the Bavarian capital.

Hentchel was the son of one of the wealthiest business men in Munich. He spent money lavishly, attended the pleasure resorts regularly, belonged to the fashionable clubs, gambled and kept race horses and motor cars.

He was very friendly with another young man named David Neiderhofer, son of the proprietor of a stationary circus at Munich. Hentchel and Neiderhofer found the money for their amusement.

Hentchel suddenly disappeared on May 24th, 1904, and not the least trace of him could be found. Crime was suspected, but the police abandoned their investigations without finding the least clue.

A few days ago Neiderhofer attempted to sell to a jeweler several articles of value which formerly belonged to Hentchel, and, as it happened, the jeweler remembered that they corresponded with particulars circulated by the police describing articles of jewelry which Hentchel commonly wore. These included diamond rings and an extremely expensive bracelet. The jeweler immediately communicated with the police, and detained young Neiderhofer until they arrived to arrest him.

Publication of the news of Neiderhofer's arrest brought other suspicious circumstances to light. A former employee of the Neiderhofer circus informed the police that David Neiderhofer ordered him about three years ago to dig a deep hole in waste land adjoining the circus. He had no idea for what object the hole was dug, but offered to show the police where the hole was made.

Excavations on the waste land began early yesterday morning, and continued all day without success. When they were resumed this morning young Neiderhofer was brought to watch the work, handcuffed and fettered between two policemen.

Late this afternoon Hentchel's body was recovered, amid the intense excitement of all present. Neiderhofer trembled violently, and was quite unable to overcome his agitation. He was then taken back to prison.

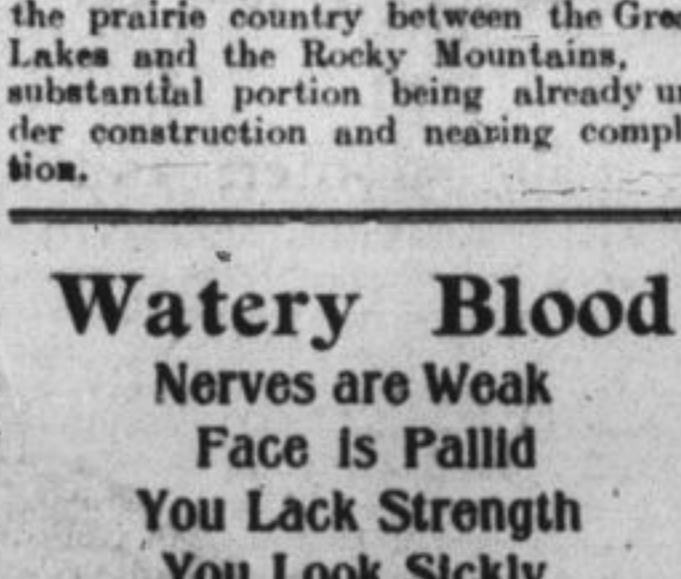
