SQUEEZED BY THE OCTOPUS. The Rockefeller idea may eventually be understood as it is not now. The head of the great Standard Oil trust has posed as a careful man, as a religionist, as one with a keen discernment as to the value and responsibility of money.

Mr. Rockefeller has never troubled himself about the criticisms that have been passed upon him. Whatever he thinks or feels he keeps to himself. He simply pursues the even tenor of his way, sometimes disappearing for long periods from the public eye - when most sought and desired in legal cases - always doing the things that people are least expecting, and occasionally surprising them by his gifts. This last announcement, that in his will he will leave \$250,000,000 for such works of charity and education as his trustees may decide, surpasses anything of the kind to date.

Cecil Rhodes left his name for a perpetual memory by devoting the whole of his vast fortune to a scheme of education that is without a parallel. Andrew Carnegie has made his millions contribute to the intelligence of the age by the public libraries and technical institutes he has endowed. But Rockefeller will outdo them all, and, as the richest man in the world, start the machinery that will help the weak and fallen of the race. He aims it is said, to spend his wealth in philanthropy. A fitting enough purpose when it is remembered that the poor have contributed disproportionately high and almost obscured the vision of his own.

Perhaps in this great distribution of aid the poor may feel that they are coming into their own again. They may in some measure be reconciled to the squeezing they have so long suffered at the hands of the greatest octopus of the age.

LAND FOR THE PEOPLE.

There was a flurry in the commons last week, when Hon. Mr. Oliver submitted his Homesteads' bill, the aim of which was to give settlers in the North-West the option of pre-empting another quarter section of land adjoining what they have at \$3 per acre. Mr. Oliver's argument - very good so far as it went - was that had the policy of the last government been followed there would not now be any of this land left for settlers. The conservative idea was to alienate the land for the benefit of the railway companies, and the \$3,000,000 acre still held it now valued at \$216,000,000. The desire of the government is to open the land to settlers, and while there were only 6,500,000 acres alienated to homesteaders between 1870 and 1896, there were 26,000,000 acres distributed in this way between 1896 and 1906. Now 40,000,000 acres of the odd numbered sections held in reserve, and the policy of the government is to get the land occupied.

The great speech in opposition to the bill was made by Mr. Greenway, formerly premier of Manitoba, and a man of sound judgment and sturdy common sense. He opposed the disposition of the land in the way prescribed by the bill. In the first place it would depopulate Manitoba. People would go west hurriedly in order to enjoy this new and generous distribution of land. Sir Wilfrid thought that Manitoba would not suffer. If any one moved from the province he would sell out to some one else. But see how Ontario has been abandoned by the young men. There have gone west, and more of them would go with the expectation of becoming rich under Mr. Oliver's bill.

The point of significance, which Mr. Greenway emphasized, is that Canada should hold all the land it now has for the benefit of new comers. Suppose it has 40,000,000 acres at its disposal - if immigration this and next year be anything like last year's, it will be wanted. Give homesteaders the privilege of pre-emption and the land will go for less than its actual value.

The Winnipeg authority may be in error in assuming that the land ranges in value from \$8 to \$15 per acre, but it is certainly worth more than \$3. Let the regulation of the future put an end to all reckless speculation in

like its real value, and the whole people be given the advantage of their inheritance.

THE CUT IN RATES.

The light department, through its committee, will recommend to the council on Monday next, that the rates be cut - electric light from 12c. to 10c. per kilo-watt, and gas from \$1.50 per 1,000 feet to \$1. This means that there will be but one gas meter in a house, and that the gas consumer will have a saving in two ways, in the illuminant itself and in the appliances for the measuring of it. The saving will be material, and it must rejoice the consumer's heart. In this reduction in rates the citizens see the fulfillment of the promise which was made when the plant passed under civic management - that the profits would go to the people in the way of a cheapened service.

What is now expected - for the council will surely pass the recommendation of the committee - is but an earnest of better things. Later on there should be another cut in rates, and an experience which will be to the city's good. The more reasonable the power, at any rate, the greater attraction municipally to those who need this power for manufacturing and other purposes. The gas business can be developed, and it is suggested that the arts of the private operator be employed to the end that there

The manager of a western plant was in the city last week, and he mentioned several ways in which he has popularized his business. He has an expert gas man, whose duty it is to see that the light buyers are getting the best results. Where he sees defects he suggests a change, putting on new mantles at cost and allowing something on the old burners, though it is consigned at once to the scrap heap.

The use of gas for cooking is encouraged by this same man, who examines stoves when they go wrong, or who makes repairs when they are necessary. The owner of the stove receives a receipted account. The desire is to show that the gas expert costs money, and that his time and skill are worth something, though the consumer does not pay the bill. The gas producer knows what the stoves are doing, and when one becomes expensive in repairs it is generally replaced by a new article for an old one the gas man sees that his patron does not suffer.

Children's Savings Banks. Exchange. There are 57 school banks in operation under the Nottingham Education Committee, and 13,611 or nearly 50 per cent. of the pupils in the schools are depositors, the average amount standing to their credit being 3s. 1-2d.

Aldermen's Qualification. Brantford Examiner. The municipal committee of the legislative assembly has turned down the proposal to abolish the requirement that candidates for municipal office shall file their property qualifications before polling day. The members evidently feel so long as property is made the basis of qualification for municipal office the law should be made as effective as possible, and not a mere farce.

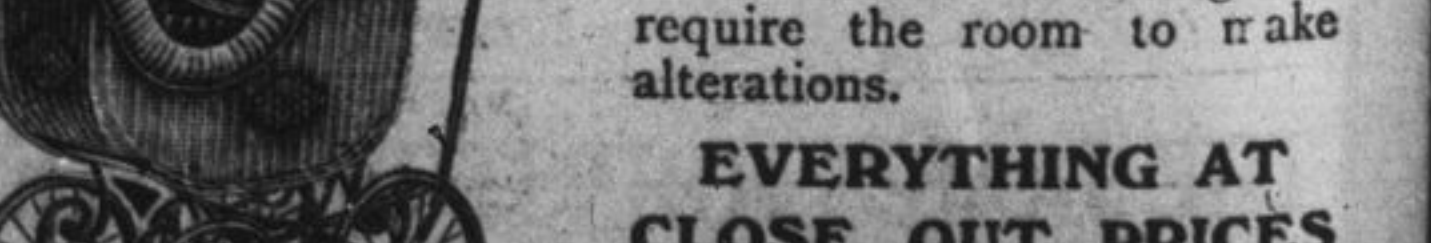
