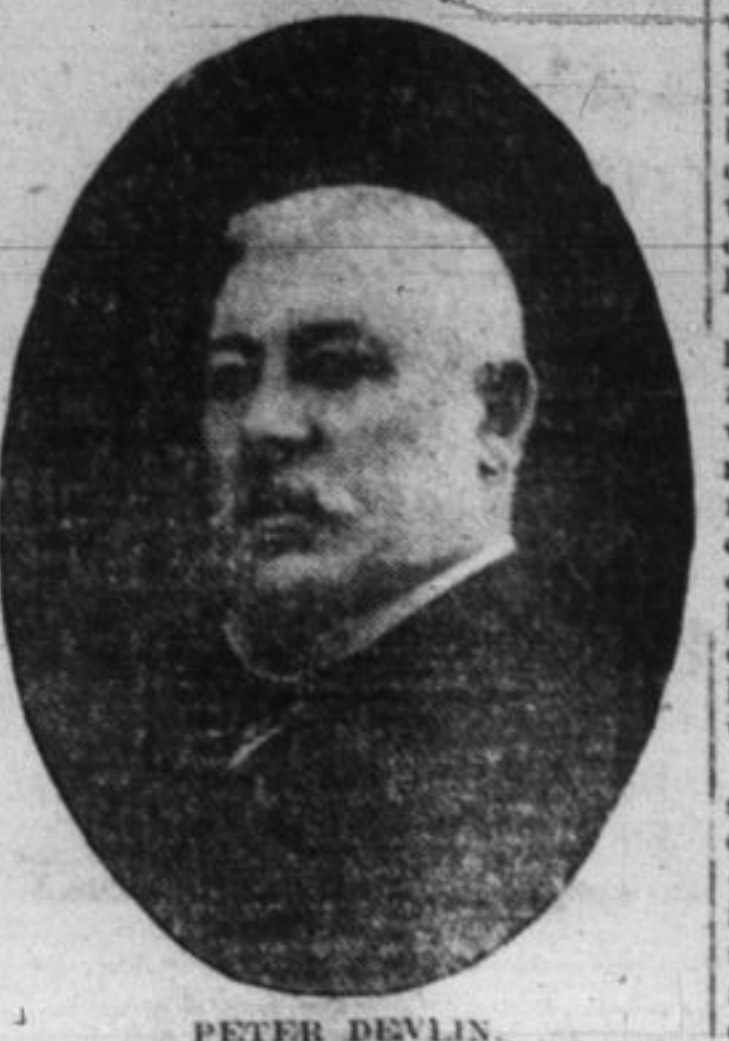

### MADE AN INSPECTOR

OF IMMIGRANTS IN PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS.

Dominion Government Appoints Peter Devlin to an Office—He is Admirably Fitted For the Work.



Peter Devlin, proprietor of the Grand Union hotel, has been appointed to a position on the outside service of the dominion immigration branch, which is connected with the department of the interior. He will begin duty on April 1st. Mr. Devlin's duties will be to inspect and report upon immigrants who are inmates of jails, penitentiaries, asylums, charitable or other public institutions, to escort immigrants about to be deported to one of the ocean ports; to visit ocean ports and direct un- placed immigrants to Canadian govern- ment employment agents. His salary will be \$1,200 a year, and ex- penses, and Kingston will be his headquarters. Mr. Devlin was notified this morning of his appointment by W. W. Scott, superintendent of immigra- tion.

Mr. Devlin's friends are pleased to hear of his appointment, which has come just as he was about to retire from the hotel business. He has been a loyal liberal worker for years, and well deserves the position given him. Mr. Devlin is a native of Kingston and for some years past conducted the Grand Union hotel. As a caterer he is known far and wide, having pre- pared large university dinners and also acted for the officers in many a mili- tary camp.

His large dealings with men of all ranks and stations will give him pecu- liar fitness for the work to which he has been appointed by the government and the energy and perseverance which he has exhibited in public affairs in general will be assets that will serve him in good stead in his new field of labor. Immigrants will find him a valuable helper. Mr. Devlin is one of the best known men in this district.

### BOUGHT THE COAT

GOT IT BACK FROM CUSTOMS OFFICERS.

She Declined to Pay the Duty Put Upon It—When Sale of Smuggled Goods Occurred a Friend Bought It In.

Port Huron, Mich., March 22.—A year ago a pretty Canadian actress, who gave her name as Mrs. Hamilton, now married, and out of all com- pany, while crossing the border with her fiancée, a prominent physician of the same place, and her mother, refused to pay duty on a seal skin coat val- ued at nearly \$450, whereupon the coat was seized by the officials. Yesterday the government held a sale of smuggled goods when a young man appear- ed on behalf of the Brantford lady, now married, and out of all com- pany, until he secured the coat for \$200. Although the coat has cost her nearly \$600, the lady believes she has got satisfaction out of the United States customs force.

New Marriage Law. "The youth of France," says a Paris paper, "applauds the French lawmak- ers because of the bill which was re- cently passed wiping out a venerable clause in the Code Napoleon." The new law provides that "a marriage con- tract may be entered into between a man and a woman, each being twenty- one years old, without the consent of the parents or either." This, says the French writer, "is a long step toward the equality of man with woman. The woman, according to the old law, was fully competent to make a marriage agreement at twenty-one, but the man, although of age in all other respects at that time of his life was compelled to wait four years if his twenty-one his parents refused to consent to his marriage. Children love their parents just as much as they ever did," says the writer, "but the abrogation of the law shows that the day of blind submission is over and that the word 'subject' applied in the family or the state has a bad and musty taste."

WHAT WOULD HAPPEN HERE? If Defendant Seeks Insane Jury Verdict.

Toronto Telegram. If a criminal trial in Canada took the strange turn it has in the Thaw case, what would be the procedure? Here is the way the criminal code provides for such an emergency:

"If at any time after an indictment is found, and before the verdict is given, it appears to the court that there is sufficient reason to doubt whether the accused is then, on account of insanity, incapable of conduct- ing his defence, the court may direct that an issue shall be tried whether the accused is or is not then on ac- count of insanity unfit to take his trial."

"If such issue is directed after the accused has been given in charge to a jury for trial on the indictment, such jury shall be sworn to try this issue in addition to that on which they are already sworn."

"If the verdict on this issue is that the accused is not then unfit to take his trial, the arraignment or the trial shall proceed as if no such issue had been directed. If the verdict is that he is unfit on account of insanity, the court shall order the accused to be kept in custody till the pleasure of the lieutenant-governor of the province shall be known, and any plea pleaded shall be set aside and the jury shall be discharged."

"No such proceeding shall prevent the accused being afterwards tried on such indictment."
