WAS TAMPERED WITH

WITH THE RESULT THAT EXPRESS WAS DERAILLED.

Many of the Passengers and Crew Were Injured—Mayor Tom Johnson Among the Number—Struck at Street Car.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 22.—Train wreckers tampered with the Pennsylvania railway track, near Stewart Station, east of Pittsburg, early today, and sent the Chicago and New York Limited into the ditch, injuring many of the passengers and crew. Only three Pullmans remained on the tracks. The mail car, baggage car and three forward cars followed the engine. Among the passengers were Mayor Johnson, of Cleveland, who was slightly injured and suffered severely from the shock. Fire followed the wreck and one of the cars was burned.

Later investigation on the part of the railway officials, immediately after the wreck, at Stewart Station, Pa., showed that without doubt train wreckers who hoped to rob the passengers, whose lives they endangered, were responsible. That no person was killed is a marvel.

Ran Into Street Car.

Detroit, Mich., March 22.—A dozen persons were injured, to-day, two of them fatally, when an inbound Lakeshore train struck a Fortieth avenue street car. A number of the injured are school children.

FITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

Montreal General Hospital is to be improved at a cost of \$500,000. Justice Fitzgerald, New York, has executed the Shaw jury until Wednesday morning.

Gas propelled funnelless warships are said to have been designed by Vickers, Sons & Maxims.

King Menelik of Abyssinia, is conferred on Pope Pius XIII the decoration of the Star of Ethiopia.

Frank H. Jones, assistant cashier of the Charlotte, N.C. National Bank, is missing, with \$65,000 of the bank's funds.

Dr. Reginald A. Daly, a graduate of Victoria University, is leaving a government position at Ottawa to take a professorship in Massachusetts.

Joshua Harrison was, at Elizabeth City, N.C., sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment for the kidnapping and murder of Kenneth Beaseley two years ago.

At Hakodate, Japan, the British steamer Fernley has been beached, after having sustained extensive damages. It is supposed that she struck a floating mine.

The twenty-seven celestials, arrested last Sunday, when the Hamilton police raided a Chinese store, which they had reason to believe was a gambling joint, were acquitted.

The Earl and Countess of Southesk will shortly pay a visit to the United States. They will be the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carnegie. The earl is chief of the Carnegie clan.

The immigration into Canada, for the eight months from July to February, inclusive, was 95,655, as compared with 65,170 for the same period of last year, an increase of forty-seven per cent.

Donald McKenna, the old man struck by a Hamilton street car, on Friday night, died at the city hospital, to-day. His injuries were such that it was found necessary to amputate one arm and one leg.

The fish and game committee of the legislature, this morning, decided to introduce an amendment to the game laws, making the license fee for non-residents of Ontario \$10 for deer and \$25 for wild duck. Previously a \$25 license covered everything.

Kate McKenna has issued a writ against Marshall Station & Co., of Toronto, claiming \$900.42 and interest. The dispute arises over some stock deals which the plaintiff got into and which did not turn out well when the recent slump occurred in New York.

Was A Bigamist.

Toronto, March 22.—One year and 364 days, the extreme penalty, was given Bert Windsor, a box-maker who pleaded guilty before Police Magistrate Denison. Four years ago Windsor married Lavinia Cuttle and had two children by her. A few days later he began paying attention to a girl named Woodward and when his wife reproached him with it, Windsor struck her. For this he was ordered out of his home and later married the Woodward girl.

Killed A Count.

Goldfields, Nev., March 22.—After tracing him seven thousand miles during this last two years, J. C. Hines shot and killed Count Constantine Podhoksky last night. The count ruined his home two years ago.

Broke Through The Ice.

A team belonging to W. Allison, Wolfe Island, broke through the ice on Thursday afternoon. Mr. Allison left the K. & P. yards about 5 o'clock on a load of posts, and when about half way across his team got through. They were in the water some time, but were finally pulled out and proceeded to the island without any further incident. Several other islanders broke through but escaped without loss of property. Mr. Allison says that another mid day will finish the ice bridge as far as driving is concerned.

Y.M.C.A. Team In Danger.

A week ago, the local Y.M.C.A. basketball team went to Watertown to play the Y.M.C.A. team of that place in what is recognized as a yearly event, as the teams have played each season since 1900. On returning to Kingston, the team which is composed of young merchants and clerks, had their names sent to Secretary Crowe, of the C.A.U., who threatens to professionalize a lot of young men who are amateur in every sense of the word. Their offense is that they unknowingly played against a professional team, as the locals are all genuine amateurs.

Death Of Walter Gow.

The death occurred, on Thursday night, of Walter Gow, a resident of this city for thirty years. Deceased was ill two months, suffering from gangrene. He was born in Glenburnie, about seventy years of age, and for years was a well-known farmer of that district, later removing to this city, where he lived a retired life. He was much respected by a large circle of friends, all of whom were sorry to learn of his death. Deceased was a member of the Calvary Congregational church. He is survived by six children, Walter, of Bradford; Edward and Neil, of this city; Mrs. S. Mockridge, Buffalo; Mrs. Mark Eves, 224 Montreal street, city, and Mrs. William Phalen, of Hamilton. The funeral will take place at four o'clock Saturday afternoon.

BANK'S FINANCIAL SHOWING.

Annual Statement of Bank of British North America.

The seventy-first yearly general meeting of the Bank of British North America was held on March 5th in London, England. The chairman, Mr. Henry J. B. Kendall, stated that the favorable showing was in a measure due to the change in the financial situation in the United States, where the results had been somewhat disappointing owing to the low rates previously ruling for money in New York. The profits for the half year, after making liberal provision for bad and doubtful debts, amounted to \$77,253. Added to this amount carried forward in June last, the amount now in the fund was \$1,015,116. Of this \$200,000 had been transferred to the reserve funds, making it now stand at \$1,460,000. The building programme for the current year would require at least \$200,000. After the dividend of 6 per cent., plus one per cent. bonus, had been paid the sum of \$1,916,610 was left to carry to the next account. The quick assets, according to the statement, amount to \$17,186,589.27, and the total assets are \$19,961,198.17.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In The Business World—The Markets.

Keewatin after May 1st will be the largest flour-producing centre in Canada. The Canadian Pacific railway's increase in earnings for eight months, from July 10th to March 1st was \$6,173,990.

Toronto railway earnings for the week ending Saturday night were \$60,367, an increase of \$249 over that week last year.

G. T. R. System traffic earnings from March 8th to 14th, 1907, \$767,708; same week, 1906, \$735,167; increase, \$32,541.

The increase of the earnings of the Montreal Street Railway company for the week ending March 16th, 1907, is \$11,996.50.

The Eastern Townships Bank will erect in Montreal one of the largest bank buildings in the city at the corner of St. James and McGill streets.

The Atlas Loan company has paid a five per cent. dividend to the depositors and debenture holders, and another final five per cent. will be paid in a month.

A telegram has been received at the British colonial office from the governor of the Gold Coast stating that the cocoa crop for 1906 reached the record figure of 26,079,800 pounds.

The Sao management has awarded a contract for construction of a new line to Duluth, costing \$8,000,000. Contemplated big expenditures is the reason advanced for no increase in the dividend.

An estimate, made by the public works department, showed that 1,850,000 tons of coal were mined last year in Alberta. Sixteen new mines were opened and sixty-four mines were now working in the province.

It is estimated that the silk industry of the United States gives employment to 70,000 operatives and represents a capital of \$109,550,621. The time was when few traders noticed the items that it would ever be possible for American silk manufacturers to compete successfully with those abroad.
