





As the use of electricity is now rapidly increasing, consumers should take care to have their stores and dwellings properly wired. It doesn't pay to have it done in a cheap manner, for sooner or later some trouble will result. An electrician stated on Saturday, that many houses in Kingston were not safely wired, and that occupants were in just as great danger from defective electric wiring as they were from defective plumbing. A plumbing inspector had been appointed, but a building inspector was just
