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## IN THE DOOMA

### The Gathering in The Re-paired Palace

### FIRST HOT SCENE

### A BILL TO ABOLISH COURTS-MARTIAL.

Many Speakers Supported the Bill—The Army Ashamed of the Work it is Compelled to do—The Hand of the Government is to be Forced.

St. Petersburg, March 26.—The dooma met, yesterday, in its former place of assembly, the Tauride Palace, repairs there having been effected. The first hot scene of the session occurred when Deputy Malakof, acting for the constitutional democrats, introduced a bill providing for the appointment of a committee to draft a measure abolishing summary court-martial. All the speakers supported the bill except the members of the Reactionary League. The Cossack spokesman, wearing his uniform, declared the army was ashamed of the work the government's court-martial forced it to do. The action of the constitutional democrats will force the hands of the government, as the summary court-martial lay lapses if it is not re-enacted within two months after the convocation of the dooma.

**Tobacco Men Jubilant.**  
Nashville, Tenn., March 26.—The tobacco growers of Tennessee, Kentucky and Virginia are jubilant and very grateful to the Tennessee legislature for passing the two tobacco association bills," said President Ford, who is chief executive officer of the association. He said that the passage of the two bills mentioned materially strengthens the organization in its fight against the tobacco trust. This organization has been operating since 1890, and for several years past against the oppressions of the trusts and in behalf of better prices for their tobacco, and the members feel that they are winning all along the line. The two bills passed were strongly favored by all but a very small percentage of the members, and the large majority feel that they will now be able more effectively than ever before to carry on their contest.

**Asks \$5,000 Damages.**  
Philadelphia, March 26.—Frightened by a dog which leaped upon her suddenly in play, Mrs. Mary E. Donnelly an aged widow living in 2864 North Fairhill street, lost her balance and fell to the ground.

She sustained internal injuries and was laid up for weeks at the hospital.

Now she has filed a suit against the owner of the dog, Jacob Wernice of 614 Huntingdon street, alleging severe injuries and asking \$5,000 damages.

Mr. Wernice feels very sore about the suit because he claims that his dog is absolutely harmless, and is known as the pet of the neighborhood.

**Wants To Lead Poole.**  
New York, March 26.—Miss Louise Fentlaff, the eighteen-year-old daughter of Otto G. Fentlaff, of Montclair, declared yesterday that she is ready at any moment to lead a party of men to punish her father, who has left his family, and is living in a near-by house with a housekeeper.

"My father's conduct is breaking my mother's heart," she said, "and I am ready to do anything to have him suffer for it."

This statement of the young woman has led the leading citizens to declare that if Fentlaff does not move away in the immediate future, he will certainly be driven out, and in no gentle manner.

**British Consumption Of Spirits.**  
Westminster Gazette.

The total consumption of spirits in the United Kingdom during the past year amounted to 32,292,480 proof gallons, as compared with 29,269,786 gallons in the previous year—a decrease of 67,286 gallons. Estimating the population at 43,600,000, this quantity works out at 30 of a proof gallon per head, which, according to figures given in the last report of the inland revenue commissioners, is the same for the last financial year but compares with 33 in 1904-5 and 39 in 1903-4. The highest point touched was in 1892-1900, when the consumption worked out at 1.17 proof gallons per head of the population.

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## BONILLA FLED.

### The Capital of Honduras Has Been Taken.

Washington, March 26.—Senor Corea, the Nicaraguan minister, last night, received a despatch from President Zelaya, of Nicaragua, announcing the capture and occupation of Tegucigalpa, the capital of Honduras. The fall of the Honduras capital has been predicted by the Nicaraguan foreign office following the capture of Cholotica, the most strongly fortified town in that country, and the flight of President Bonilla, of Honduras.

Ernest H. Sedgwick, a stewardess of North Oakland, Cal., has been arrested on suspicion of brutally murdering his mother while intoxicated.

Windsor has been asked what special inducements will be offered the Wolverson brass works, of Grand Rapids, Mich., to establish a branch there.

Speaker St. John passed a very good night, says an announcement from the general hospital, Toronto, and his condition, this morning, is more hopeful.

Guarded by jealousy, Andrew Anderson, of Brockton, shot his wife, Amberg Anderson, and then attempted to take his own life by jumping out of a third story window. He was arrested.

A fire despatch says during the past week the sun has been very warm, and the ice has been greatly weakened. A thunder storm with heavy rain on Saturday also assisted in the ice's destruction.

Nathan Hallman, formerly the trusted accountant of the Canada Furniture company, Toronto, who stole about \$2,000 of the company's funds, was sentenced to two years in penitentiary.

Max Root, merchant, Fontville, committed suicide by blowing out his brains with a rifle. He tied a cord to the trigger, and discharged the rifle with his feet.

R. MacDonald, secretary-treasurer of the West River municipality, in Manitoba, is short \$2,000 in his accounts, according to the government inspector's report.

Willis Spracklin, Windsor boxer, got out of his class when he met Harry Cobb, at the Wheelmen's boxing show at Detroit, Mich., last night. The bout was stopped in the sixth to save Spracklin an apparent knock out.

The turning over of the Canadian Northern elevator system to the British American Elevator company, was one of the best things that has happened to Port Arthur for some time. The company is making Port Arthur its chief grain centre.

## PHILLIPS' APPEAL.

### Asks Minister of Justice to Quash Sentence.

Toronto, March 26.—Application is to be made to the minister of justice to quash the five-year sentence imposed on Joseph Phillips by Judge Winchester. The plea is that he was assured of suspended sentence if he made restitution and pleaded guilty. In support of this a letter from Hon. J. J. Foy is quoted in which the attorney-general promised if restitution was made to lay the matter before the trial judge. This was done. It does not necessarily follow that the attorney-general gave any undertaking to the responsibility for any action the trial judge might take.

## WOMAN WANTED FOR JUMPING BAIL.

Montreal, March 26.—Mrs. John F. Ober, arrested at a boarding house on Sasser street, is wanted in Wisconsin for having jumped her bail while waiting trial on a serious charge.

She went from Wisconsin to Toronto, and there met John I. Ober, an ex-convict who was married by Rev. Mr. Chown. This was on February 23th.

The two came to Montreal, while the detectives were looking for Annie Deits, the single woman, they saw a sufficient likeness in Mrs. Ober to compare her with Wisconsin authorities. An officer came on here and took the woman in to custody.

## TO GO OR NOT TO GO

### SIR WILFRID LAURIER HAS NOT YET DECIDED.

Borden Offers to Adjourn—Mr. Bourassa Should Be Taken as a Valet, Says Col. Hughes—The Provincial Subsidies.

Ottawa, March 26.—What will the colonial conference and the provincial subsidies the house had its hands full yesterday, Mr. Borden asked whether the report was correct that Sir Wilfrid was on the point of abandoning his intention of attending the coming meeting of the colonial premier in London. The opposition leader thought it would be a deplorable incident if the first minister of the leading colony were absent from that conference. He even went to the length of volunteering to adjust the house on Wednesday to permit Sir Wilfrid going to London. The motion to be returned when the conference was over, Sir Wilfrid hastily suggested the whole thing hinged on the absence of obstruction in the house. He wanted to go, but he said on April 5th, the opposition would have to get the plug in the vent of eloquence. He admitted the question of "go or not to go" was being carefully considered. The debate resulting showed that the house was in favor of the attendance of the first minister at the London conference, and Mr. Bourassa was gently handed some gentle love taps by Col. Hughes and Dr. Sprague. The former raised general parley by suggesting that Sir Wilfrid take the member for Labelle, who had such a habit of kicking over the traces, with him, in the role of valet.

The provincial subsidies were the cause of extended talk.

## GERMANY SEES CHANCE.

### Will Seize Coal Lands in

Teheran, Russia, March 26.—Germany claims an indemnity of £5,000 for the murder of a German missionary, on February 18th, in the province of Azerbaijan, and demands the extradition of the murderers.

Failing satisfaction, coal land on the frontier of Asiatic Turkey, near Bagdad, will be occupied. Germany has for a long time desired the coasts of this land for the purposes of the Bagdad railway.

This may mark the initiation of active intervention by Germany in the Persian situation.

## Helped Father To Suicide.

New York, March 26.—With the in-patient aid of his six-year-old daughter Violet, Theodore Schmidt, a painter, who was partially paralyzed, committed suicide with illuminating gas in his house in East 138th street. Mrs. Schmidt left the child at home to care for her husband, and during her absence Schmidt instructed the child to bring a piece of rubber hose from the kitchen, attach it to a gas jet, wind the other end around his neck, and place it in his mouth. He then told her to turn on the gas and go out on the sidewalk. The child did as directed, and when Mrs. Schmidt returned her husband was dead. The little girl told her mother of her unsuspecting part in the tragedy.

## In A Highway Robbery.

Windsor, Ont., March 26.—Norman Livingston is held by the police on suspicion of being implicated in a highway robbery which occurred after midnight on London street west, when James McCloy, a tunnel employee, was held up and robbed of forty-five dollars by two men. The description given by McCloy fitted Livingston and "Crap" Nelson. Nelson has not yet been found by the police.

## To Announce Decision.

New York, March 26.—Justice Fitzgerald said, to-day, that an examination of the affidavits and briefs filed by counsel, regarding Thaw's mental condition, was being made. He will be ready to announce his decision to-morrow.
