OPPOSES TRANSFER
Of Western House License to the
Frontenac.

The application of Louis Langford
for transfer of liquor license from the
Western House to the Frontenac Hot-
el, was considered last evening by the
board of license commissioners, but no
decision was arrived at. Another
meeting of the commissioners will be
held this evening. The proprietor of
the British-American Hotel objects to
the transfer, as the opening of the
Frontenac would tend to take away
business from his home, which he took
of the hands of the owners when it
was in a dilapidated condition, and
turned it into a good hostelry. The
owners of the British-American are
all for the transfer, and desire to
rent the Frontenac. To do so, it must
first have a liquor license.

NON-JURY COUNTY COURT
Only One Case Has Been En-
tered.

As yet only one case has been en-
tered for the non-jury county court,
which opens Tuesday afternoon next,
at two o'clock, before Judge Madden.
It is expected that another case will
be entered for hearing.

Bourassa's Bluster In
House Of Commons

SHOULD ENQUIRE
INTO VARIOUS CHARGES
AGAINST MEMBERS.

The Opinion of the Public He
Declared, Was That There Had
Been a Saw-Off—He Would Not
Be a Scap Goat For the Govern-
ment—Ministers Should Be
Men of Credit.

attack by Mr. Bourassa, upon the al-
leged saw-off between the government
and the opposition regarding the re-
port of the insurance commission, took
