FOR THE DAIRYMEN

G. G. PULOW GIVES AN ADDRESS AT PETERBORO.

Strongly Condemns the Feeding of Turnips For Either Cheese or Butter—Duty of the Instructor.

At a dairy meeting held in Peterboro, G. G. Pulow, of Kingston, chief dairy instructor for Eastern Ontario, gave an address, brief and instructive, on dairymen.

In opening his address he strongly condemned the feeding of turnips. He saw some of the cheese in Montreal which was very pronounced with a turnip flavor, but other cheese was flavored with mustard. It was a very serious mistake to feed turnips for either cheese or butter. A few factories in a section goes a long way in condemning the wise practice which it was only the few factories which suffered it would be all right. Peterboro has had a splendid reputation for fancy cheese and he hoped they would maintain it.

Continuing he said the object of the meeting was to raise the quality of the produce. It was the duty of the instructor to give the makers the most up-to-date information. This year there will be twenty-four instructors for Eastern Ontario, starting from Yonge street, Toronto, through to Quebec. These men will have charge of certain districts and will also act as sanitary inspectors. They will visit every factory and give instruction, and inspect the quality of the milk. This official will also be able to go to the very farms where the poor milk comes from and have the supply improved. A special effort will be made this year in many ways. Bulletin are being prepared to send to the schools to instruct the pupils in the care of milk. Then the Woman's Institute is taking it up. The cheese factories must be kept clean and all his utensils must be kept clean, and the instructor will pay particular attention to this matter. Anyone keeping milk in rusty cans or in uncleanly places they will be made to rectify it, and the instructor's duty will be to instruct the farmer.

To protect the producers and makers a board of directors has been appointed and no one is forced to adopt any of the inspector's suggestions until they go to the directors. They are only asked to do what is fair. The object of the institute is to get all the cheese uniform in the whole province. This cannot be done unless all the makers co-operate with the instructor. There is no fee for the instruction and every one is asked to help on the work.

In reference to the making of cheese he said he was confident that most of the makers knew their business. But this spring, he said, the first cheese would likely have to go right into consumption. With this in view he said the makers would do well to watch the market and know before they start what kind of cheese they want. For early consumption you want quick ripening cheese, while later in the season they will want the slow ripening. In the past the cheese has been to just get the cheese to pass. The object should be to get the best. The people want a nice melon, smooth, good smelling and tasty cheese, or fancy cheese. This will bring the best price and is just as easily made. He recommended uniformity in size and quality and in appearance, clean and attractive.

It is said that the makers has the poorest cheese factories in the world, yet Canada has the best makers and other countries are sending here for instructors. Other countries have better cheese than does Canada. If that is so then it is up to the maker to find out where the defect is. If it is the factory or the condition of the milk it is the maker's duty to inform the producer and rectify the fault, by pointing out to them what they are losing in dollars and cents.

The object of the instruction this year is to learn the defects in the cheese industry and to get right down to the bottom and start there to build it up on a proper basis. If the milk producer is not doing the best he can to do it is to get the cheese delivered in a proper condition. The farmers will not attend the meetings so it is the duty of the instructor to go out to the farms and teach them. If the farmers continue to do wrong after they have been instructed, the penalty will be imposed and the instructor will be forced to make the improvements. The same applies to the factories.

The two factories absolutely necessary is to have the milk kept in proper condition and to have the factory in such condition that the temperature is right and keep the place perfectly clean.
