ARRIVES AT THE PEN.

Joseph Phillips is Now Behind the Bars.

Joseph Phillips, the former president of the York Loan and Savings company, who pleaded guilty to making false returns to the government, and who was sentenced in Toronto, the other day, to five years, arrived in Kingston in time to spend Easter at the "pen." Detectives Severs and Jarvis, of the Queen city, brought Phillips to the city on the early train this afternoon.

It was not generally known that the prisoner would reach Kingston to-day, and there was only a small crowd at the station when the flyer pulled in.

Phillips was handcuffed to another prisoner, Nathaniel Halman, sentenced to two years for theft. He appeared to be in the best of health. He is very fleshy, and his long trial in the Toronto courts apparently did not weigh very hard on him. He appeared in the best of spirits when he alighted from the train, and talked and joked with his fellow-prisoner and the detectives.

On the journey down he was just as jovial. When the junction was reached, the prisoners were given refreshments, and afterwards the party crowded in a cab for the big stone building. Phillips was dressed in a dark suit, and wore a light black overcoat and stiff hat.

Phillips noticed the open cab in waiting, and anxiously inquired: "Is this our carriage?"

"Yes, we'll take this," said one of the officers in reply.

The party got into the cab, the "cabbie" cracked his whip and the trip to the penitentiary was made in very good time, when the prisoners were unrolled and given their numbers.

Phillips wore a broad smile as the cab drove away from the station. Probably very few, if any, recognized him as he passed along on his way to the "pen."

FACE ITS FIRE

Peasants Stand Before The Artillery.

ATROCITIES LEAD TO THOROUGH MEASURES AGAINST RIOTERS.

Pillagers Growing Bolder—Situation in Roumania Not Yet Under Control—Conflicts Become More Sanguinary.

Bucharest, Roumania, March 30.—The efforts of the government to suppress the revolt of the peasants have met with only partial success. The troops are now acting with increased energy.

A large number of rioters have been killed in the numerous conflicts with the soldiery, but as yet there is no sign of permanent amelioration of the situation. On the contrary, the riots appear to be becoming more bold according to a message received from the troops at the front.

As an indication of the nervous apprehension existing even in the capital, the new prefect of Bucharest, as a measure of precaution, ordered all shops in the city closed. This created the impression that the rioters were approaching Bucharest. There was panic until it was ascertained that these fears were groundless.

At Tirgoviste, in the Argesh district, a band of peasants attempted, yesterday, to raid an arsenal and procure arms and ammunition. Upon being repulsed, the rioters set fire to many houses in the town.

At Vlaschka a band of peasants was summoned in conflict with the soldiery, and it is reported that one of the latter was killed. A train running between Bucharest and Komona was stopped by rioters and looted.

According to an unconfirmed version of the encounter, 200 of the peasants were killed.

A squadron of Hussars sent to Braşova came in conflict with some peasants and it is reported that one of the latter was killed. A train running between Bucharest and Komona was stopped by rioters and looted.

There is a slight improvement in the situation at Jassy. The streets of the city are empty and the shops still shut. The peasants apparently are overawed by the concentration of a serious encounter is reported to have taken place at the Village of Papanahastie in which many peasants were killed or wounded.

The bombardment of the three villages in the Vlaschka district in which rioters had taken refuge, undoubtedly resulted in a very large casualty list, but the exact number cannot be learned. It is known, however, that several hundred peasants were arrested there.

There have been sanguinary encounters in the district of Dolj, but details are lacking. The peasants there are very riotous, and rumor places the number killed and wounded in encounters with the troops at several hundred.

The authorities are now beginning to use artillery to bombard the villages where the rioters take refuge.

There was a bloody battle in which the troops set, either had orders to suppress the disturbances at any price.

It is still impossible to give even an approximate estimate of the number killed or wounded since the beginning of the disorders, but there is good reason to believe that the reports have not been exaggerated and that when the totals finally are learned they will be greater than is now supposed. Eleven army officers have been killed or wounded.

The newspapers print further stories of the fierce fighting. It is stated that every rebel town and village is being bombarded into ruins. One hundred and forty houses at Viera, have been demolished and more than 300 persons were killed. Two neighboring villages were razed and all their inhabitants killed.

The rebels fought with furious desperation at Stanesi. The loss of the troops was trifling but 600 peasants were killed and 400 wounded. One version of the story of this fight says that after the bulk of the troops were withdrawn the peasants gathered once more and massacred the remainder.

Bands of peasants are surrounded by troops at Braşova, and Viena, and are resisting desperately. Artillery is being used against them.

Many women, among the rebels, have shared the same fate as the men. The soldiers are peevish against being ordered to be violent in cruelty. The atrocities seldom have been equalled in Balkan records.

Ladies Object.
Atlanta, Ga., March 30.—The women of Atlanta are in revolt against being asked to ride on and off street cars by conductors, and have made a strong protest to the management. The women allege that the white shirt waists which they have donned for spring are fearfully soiled by the touch of the hands of the conductors.

That night something went wrong with the plant, and there was no gas throughout the city. It is only surmised what happened, but the employees of the gas works later refused to work unless Mr. Gardner, and quit in a body. It is not believed that there will be any difficulty in keeping the works going and the city supplied with gas.

AN OLD FRAUD

Is At Head of The "Flying Rollers" MOTHER ELINOR

Turns Out to Be ANNE O'BELLA DIS DE BARR.

She Had Recently Served Time in England—She Has a World-wide Criminal Reputation—Identified as the Old Girl of Mischief.

Detroit, March 30.—"Mother Elinor," sometimes known as Mrs. E. L. Mason, of Detroit and Windsor, Ont., has been proven beyond all doubt to be none other than the notorious Anne O'bella Dis De Barr. Also it has been learned that she was known in England as Editha Loleta Jackson, where she served time with a man reputed to be her husband for a serious offence.

Her prison record from Scotland Yard, accompanied by her photograph, reached here at the instigation of certain Detroit persons who were investigating her case. The Editha Loleta Jackson, of London, was positively identified as the "Mother Elinor," of Windsor, E. E. Swinerton, a member of Mother Elinor's staff, made the identification in a sworn statement.

The woman has a police record extending over both continents, and embracing many parts of the United States. She disappeared from Windsor about two weeks ago, and none of the cult seem to know her whereabouts. It is rumored that she now is in Ontario.

Under the name of Anne O'bella Dis De Barr, she served six months in New York. In Geneva she served two years for larceny. She was known there as Vera P. Ava, and later as Edith L. Murray. She served time in New Orleans, where she was known as Edith Jackson.

Hamilton, Bermuda, March 30.—The Swedish steamer Pandur, 700 tons, loaded with pitch pine, bound for East Florida ports, was abandoned forty miles south-west of Bermuda, on Thursday. She was abandoned by her crew and main top masts were gone. The captain and crew rowed ashore landing below Gibb's lighthouse, yesterday afternoon. They were in exhausted condition.

Boy Attacked By A Fowl.
London, March 30.—A little boy, twenty months old, the son of W. Lovett, of Burton Pines, Devonshire, was viciously attacked by a fowl, yesterday, while he was standing at the door of his father's farmhouse. He was so severely pecked and scratched that surgical attention was necessary.

Disquieting Rumors.
London, March 30.—Yankee Fair styles that rather disquieting reports come from Madrid as to the health of King Alfonso. It is said the king has been suffering from a recurrence of the lung trouble of several months ago, when it was removed by a victim of tuberculosis.

Progress of Doukhobors.
Winnipeg, March 30.—The Doukhobors' community, last season, completed \$200,000 worth of railway grading, upon which the profits would be \$110,000. They also will market \$100,000 worth of grain this spring, which indicated financial progress of this sect.

Cannot Walk For Drink.
Sheffield, March 30.—The Sheffield licensing magistrates declared that persons whose three-mile walk on Sunday is taken with the object of obtaining a drink are not entitled to the drink. Only those who walk for the sake of walking are entitled to a drink.

Monument To Capt. John Smith.
Lousion, March 30.—Mal-Gen. Benjamin Powell has presented to Louth Grammar School a bust modelled by himself of his ancestor, Capt. John Smith, founder of the state of Virginia. Capt. Smith was a pupil of the school.

Cape Town, March 30.—By a series of grafting experiments, Dr. P. C. Gilchrist, superintendent of the Louth experimental station, has produced a curiosity which partly resembles the apricot and the plum, and has the flavor of both fruits.

NEWS FROM TORONTO.

J. D. King Company—Eight More Mining Companies.

Toronto, March 30.—The application of A. R. Clark and the Ontario Bank for a winding-up order of the affairs of the J. D. King company, which got into deep financial waters recently, was this morning dismissed by Chief Justice Falconbridge on consent of both applicants, a syndicate has purchased the movable assets of the concern, but the company will retain its name and premises. A re-organization of the business is in progress.

The incorporation of eight more mining companies with an aggregate capital of \$5,200,000 is announced in this week's Ontario Gazette.

Recently, the Toronto Casket company assigned. It has since been sold to a rival company for about \$50,000. This morning a suit was entered by the Dominion Bank against Joseph A. McCracken and others, joint makers of a guarantee bond which was to be a security to the bank of the indebtedness of the company, it is claimed. The bond was for \$15,000. The bank further claims that moneys were advanced on this bond sufficient to bring the total claim of the plaintiff up to \$25,711.

THE CONFSSIONAL.

Presbyterian Minister of Montreal Advocates It.

Montreal, March 30.—"I am rather surprised that an institution which exists at present in the Roman Catholic church has never been introduced into the principles of our church. It is the only true medium by which a pastor can be to his congregation what he ought to be. I refer to the confessional."

This was the significant statement made by the Rev. John McKay of Crescent Street Presbyterian church, in his address at the induction of Rev. W. J. Clark to the pastorate of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Westmont.

SECURED ARMISTICE.

Bonilla Can Surrender in Twenty-Four Hours.

San Juan del Sur, Nicaragua, March 30.—United States Consul William Bonilla has stopped the hard-boiled Amalco, Honduras, by Nicaraguan gunboats, and secured an armistice, according to dispatches from that city. The armistice gives President Bonilla twenty-four hours in which to surrender.

Mlle. Leontoff Sentenced.
Thun, Switzerland, March 30.—Mlle. Tatiana Leontoff, the Russian woman who murdered a Frenchman, M. Muller at Interlaken in September last, mistaking him for M. Duranov, ex-minister of the interior of Russia, was today, sentenced to four years' military confinement and to twenty years' expulsion from the country. The prisoner complained that she had been subjected to the utmost brutality by the confining magistrates and the prison warders, who, when called to the witness stand, were unable to deny the charge.

Gigantic Grant.
Harrisburg, Pa., March 30.—Testimony to the capital investigation commission is launching a great sensation. Based upon estimates furnished by bronze bidders and painters, it has been determined that Sanderson's profit on the building was \$1,581,271. This is 261 per cent approximately.

The association had a successful season, and accumulated a surplus of nearly \$1,000.

Fears Of His Own Shads.
Cape Town, March 30.—An agitation has been started among the colored population—outside the native reserves of Cape Colony in favor of applying the principle in criminal cases of trying a man by his peers, so that a colored man may be tried only by a jury composed of colored people.

Socialists Too Slow.
London, March 30.—Six of the eight socialist candidates for the Northampton board of guardians have been disqualified because they failed to hand in their nomination papers in time. One of them, who arrived yesterday ten minutes late, said he thought the nominations closed to-morrow.

To Decide To-day.
Chicago, Ill., March 30.—Whether there will be a strike of the employees in the train service of the western railroads hinges on a meeting to be held, to-day, between two federal officers and the representatives of the unions and the railways concerned.

Examining Thaw.
New York, March 30.—The Thaw lunacy commission went into exclusive session, to-day, with Harry K. Thaw before them. Dr. Hamilton and the Tomba attendants will follow.
