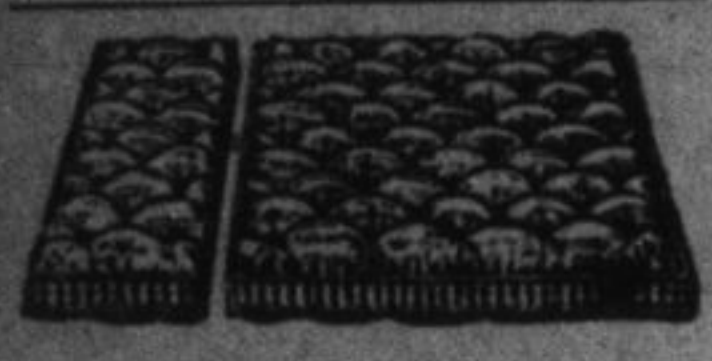

REDUCTION OF RATES TO BE CONSIDERED BY WATERWORKS COMMITTEE

Superintendent Hewitt Asked to Submit a Statement Showing Present Standing of the Finances. Chairman Carson presided at the regular meeting of the water works committee, held yesterday afternoon, and also present were Alds. Nickle, Millan, Henderson and Bigg.

The first matter taken up was that of the repairs to the water works wharf. The Donnelly Wrecking company notified the committee, through its solicitor, J. L. Whiting, that it was not liable for the account. The opinion given by the city solicitor, however, is that under the lease given the company, the latter is liable for repairs.

On motion of Ald. Nickle, it was decided to refer the letter of Mr. Whiting to the city solicitor and chairman, for a report. Three offers were received for the sale of a pump, which is now used by the city, but none of them were accepted.

The committee had an informal discussion regarding the distributing of the water works bills, which are now ready to be delivered. The matter was brought up by the secretary. It was decided to have Market Clerk McCann start at once to deliver the bills.

The request of the employees of the water works, for an increase in wages, was again up, but no action was taken. The matter of settling the dispute over the fuel saver, purchased recently, and which, according to the statement of the superintendent, has not proved satisfactory, was left in the hands of the city solicitor.

The reduction of rates came up, and it was decided to have the superintendent submit a statement to the committee, showing the present standing of the finances, in order that the members may be able to ascertain whether or not the funds will warrant a reduction in the rates.

FORM ASSOCIATION. Of Hospital Superintendents For Better Management. An association of superintendents of hospitals of Ontario, was formed at the parliament buildings, Toronto, yesterday afternoon.

The new organization will be along the lines of those already in existence in every state in the union. The object is the more economical management of the hospitals of the province. Last year 41,800 persons were confined in these hospitals, and the cost of maintenance was \$1,228,289.

The opening feature of the proceedings was a paper by Dr. Bruce Smith, on the "Responsibilities of Hospital Superintendents," in which the government inspector reviewed the growth of hospital work in the province in the past few years. Dr. Ross, of Buffalo, president of the association for the state of New York, gave an address on the importance of organization, outlining the system which prevails across the line.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

What is Transpiring Along the Harbor Front. The boilers in the steamer Navajo are undergoing some repairs.

Several of the M.T. Co's tugs received a test around the harbor, yesterday afternoon. A number of steamers formerly calling at Craig's wharf will use Folger's wharf this season.

Last night was quite sharp. There was ice about an inch thick in Richardson's slip this morning. The steamer New Island Wanderer will be taken into the dry dock tomorrow, to undergo general repairs.

The repairs at Folger's wharf are being proceeded with, and the work will be completed in a very short time. The government dry dock is a busy place these days. Steamships are being booked for dates to enter the dock nearly two months ahead.

The steamer Aletha is being fitted out as rapidly as possible and it is expected to leave at the end of the week for her first trip up the Bay of Quinte. Capt. Chauncey Daryaw left yesterday for Chicago, where he will take charge of the steamer.

The steamer Pierron arrived from Cape Vincent, yesterday noon, and returned again in the afternoon. No trouble was experienced from the ice, and the trip was a most pleasant one.

Has Proven Satisfactory. The steel steamer for the Lake of St. Lawrence Navigation company, built at the Kingston foundry, during the past winter, has proven satisfactory. The steamer is over 125 feet long, and has the distinction of being the first steel built boat ever constructed at Kingston.

The proprietors of the local foundry are likely to contract for a number of steel hulls during the coming season. Boat builders in the vicinity of the city are having a busy season for gasoline launches.

In the past few years the motor boat has succeeded in capturing the favor of the public. The number of sailing yachts, and from present indications there will be a large number of these pleasure craft in the city this year. The different types of boats in vogue are all over and done with, from the long narrow boat with powerful cylinders, built alone for speed, to the wide and comfortable yacht, whose sole use is for pleasure.

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FOR CREATING DISTURBANCE. Young Man Was Arrested by the Police. Michael Devine, of Division street, a young man, with fiery red hair, was accused before Magistrate Farrell, this morning, of "being drunk and disorderly."

"I don't think that I was disorderly," said the prisoner, when arraigned. Constable Thomas Mullinger, who made the arrest, stated that the prisoner had been creating a disturbance at the Iroquois Hotel. He had searched the prisoner, and had found a pair of steel knuckles. These were produced in court. Constable Mullinger said that several complaints had been made against Devine creating a disturbance on Ontario street.

Con. Millan, proprietor of the Iroquois Hotel, gave evidence. He told of Devine being in his hotel. There was a disturbance in one of the rooms, and he had found the prisoner there with three Englishmen, whose names he did not know. One of the Englishmen claimed that Devine had pulled a gun on him. The police found no revolver in the possession of prisoner.

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YACHT CLUB MEETING

JOHN M. CAMPBELL ELECTED COMMODORE. The Fee For Senior Members Raised to Ten Dollars—A Syndicate Yacht Likely to Be Built to Compete With Water-towns.

The annual meeting of the Yacht Club was held last evening. There was a good attendance of the active members, and the deliberations lasted till half past ten o'clock. The most important business transacted was the raising of the membership fee of those over twenty-one years of age, from five to ten dollars.

Commodore E. C. Gilderleeve presided, and made a brief report upon what had been accomplished during the past year, in which the club house had been enlarged, and the wharf property acquired by the club improved.

The secretary-treasurer reported a balance sheet of \$200 cash after all the year's indebtedness had been paid. The club membership is 224, of whom 100 are senior members, eighty under twenty-one years of age, and the rest non-resident.

Regatta Committee—James Conway, H. Waddell, Lieut. Col. Strang, P. Smith, Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick, H. H. Macnes, Lieut. Col. Young, Mr. Dunn. Amusement Committee—Lieut. Col. Strang, W. B. Dalton, Jr., F. H. Macne, K. Tandy, W. Haver, Jr.

The question of increased membership fee received over an hour's discussion. It was moved by R. E. Burns and seconded by Prof. Martin that the fee for senior members be ten dollars a year, and for members under twenty-one years of age five dollars. H. W. Richardson moved an amendment, seconded by G. Y. Chown, that the fee for senior members be seven dollars. It was realized that the executive must have more money at its disposal to meet the needs of the club.

The proposers of the amendment feared the loss of many members by raising the fee to ten dollars. There were many who paid their yearly fee of five dollars who scarcely ever visited the club house. Angrove; John Routley, John McDerrott; president, Mr. Burton, Y.M.C.A. physical instructor; vice-president, F. H. Stockdale; A. Stokes, secretary-treasurer, A. Houghton.

The age limit for players was fixed at sixteen years for juniors, and twenty years for intermediates. Another meeting will be held on Tuesday evening next, when a schedule will be drawn up. All teams must be entered before that meeting. The entrance fees were fixed as follows: Junior, \$15; intermediate, \$15.50; senior, \$22. Messrs. Angrove and Routley have each donated cups for competition.

For the Erection of Queen's Biological Building. These contracts have been awarded for the erection of the biological building in connection with Queen's Medical College; Masonry, William McCarthey; carpentering, Hunter & Harold; plumbing, Elliott Bros.; painting, A. McNamee; electric wiring and fixtures, James Halliday. The total contracts awarded amounted to \$85,756. The medical faculty expects to be able to complete the building with the \$50,000 granted by the Ontario government. The building will be of Kingston limestone, as the masonry figures were found quite satisfactory. All concerned are pleased that the structure will be stone and in keeping with the rest of the buildings on the university grounds.

CARPENTERS' STAND

EXPLAINED BY ONE OF THEIR NUMBER. Most Other Trades Have received Increased Wages—Why Should the Carpenters' Request Not Be Accorded To?

Kingston, April 2.—(To the Editor): I should be pleased if you would allow me space to correct the false reports that have already been spread broadcast by the man of the street, which is so prevalent at strike and election times. The carpenters and joiners of Kingston have come out for a fair and legitimate wage and hour. We ask what is fair to any conscientious public—the eight-hour day at a minimum rate of \$2.50 for the eight hours, our previous wage being \$2.50 for nine hours. The masons have obtained the eight hours with 45c. per hour; their laborers \$2 for the same amount; the painters have an advance of 25c. per day, and there has been no grumbling. Why should there be with the carpenters, the poorest paid mechanic in Kingston considering the tools he has to furnish? After considering the great loss of time during winter months the wage is very small indeed, and I am sure a generous public can sympathize with us in our struggle.

Many kind and bigoted individuals are greatly against unionism, but they little know the great benefit it is to all concerned. A good honest union man is the man the master seeks. If he is true to his own fellow-workmen he cannot fail to give his master every satisfaction. Unionism has a tendency to educate men morally and physically. They aim at a higher standard, better work and sounder principles. The man who joins the union just for its benefits or to quit a master, is just the man who the masters should shun. Such have no standing and are not worthy to be placed anywhere, but we have such men in Kingston drawn up miserably, whom their very looks betray, and would work for anything to keep a job if the master would stoop so low as to reach them.

But the men of Kingston can be proud they have a good lot of bosses. Without exception they are most considerate and also on most favorable terms with the men. Outsiders do not need to promulgate falsehoods, as there is neither turmoil or strife, and we trust that the Salvation Army will keep their men in the background until such times as a settlement may be made which will not be long.—Yours in union, ALFRED COWARD, delegate of the Carpenters and Joiners of Kingston.

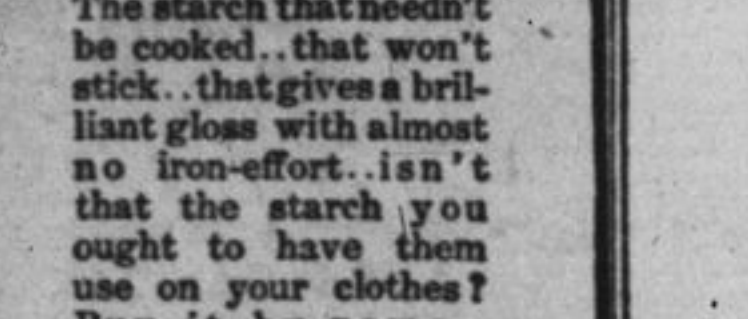
