#### PERSONAL MENTION

**Movements of the People—What They Are Saying And Doing.**

A New York life insurance company will erect a building to Toronto to cost about a million dollars. Leithbridge, Alta. Knights of Pythias in conjunction with a Calgary syndicate will erect a handsome brick free house at Leithbridge.

Work was commenced this week on the new saw mill and rooming mill at Neepawa, Que., built by the Bayliss Paper and Pulp company of Birmingham, N.Y. In addition to the work of sawing timber, pulp wood will also be processed at the mill for every part. The Q.R.L. and P. Company will build a siding to the mill one mile and a quarter long.

George H. Kelly, superintendent of the Lake of the Woods Milling Company, at Kenowin, Ont., stated that the present mill will be started the first of May and from the beginning the output would be at least 2,000 barrels per day. Later the installation would be equal to a daily capacity of seven thousand barrels, the largest in the British Empire.

A wire mill, to cost about \$200,000, will be erected on 139 acres of land recently purchased by the American Steel & Wire Co., at Cleveland, Ohio. The construction to have the plant in operation within a year and will employ 1,100 men, making 7,000 tons of wire of the Cleveland plant. The capacity of the new plant will be 400 tons daily.

Large paper mills will be erected at Grand Falls, Newfoundland, by the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company. A water power plant will be erected on the Grand Falls River near Grand Falls, and will be an immense affair. Together with mill, the work of construction will extend over a period of from two and one-half to three years.

**Collegiate Team To Organize.**

A meeting will be called on the re-opening of the Collegiate Institute for the purpose of organizing a baseball team. The Collegiate boys expect to place a strong line on the field this season.

#### HIS CONDITION NOT CONSIDERED HOPELESS.

Surveys of Larder Lake District Begun For Provincial Government—Large Ore Shipments From Cobalt—Woman Suffrage In Sight.

Toronto, April 2.—A motion was made before Justice Riddell, this morning, to commit, for contempt of court for refusing to answer questions, and to produce documents, J. B. Lovell, Massey Norris, and H. G. Wright, the last named of the firm of Aylsworth, Wright, Moss and Thompson. The action arises out of the case of A. M. Orpen against J. B. Lovell, George Miller and the Dominion Brewing company to restrain the transfer of the Brewing company, judgment was reserved.

Fanny Caton and James Long got into a fight and the former John was sentenced to jail for thirty days on March 22nd. The woman who has been in jail fifty times, was pretty well battered up, and, this morning, Crown Attorney Drayton and Justice of the Peace Semmes went to the jail to take her ante-mortem statement. They were unable to do this, however, as the woman was unconscious.

J. J. Newman, Windsor, has commenced a survey of the Larder Lake mining district for the provincial government. He is running base and meridian line for six mile township, making a traverse on the ice of Larder Lake putting down posts and marking lines on the prominent sections of the land.

The ore shipments from Cobalt from March 25th to 30th totalled 477,230 pounds.

The following bulletin regarding the condition of Hon. J. W. St. John was issued by the hospital authorities at noon: "Passed a fairly good night. His condition this morning is about the same as yesterday. Although still very critical it is not thought his case is hopeless."

Fully as many members of the Ontario Educational Association as ever met here are gathered in the forty-sixth annual session in the University of Toronto. The present lamentable condition of rural schools was attributed by Thomas E. Elliott, of Ingersville in the high school principal's section of the college, and the high school department of the conference in public schools occasioned by the limiting of the work of the schools to the standard of the entrance examinations, whereby teachers of less knowledge and experience began to squeeze out the mature and more experienced married men.

#### FLYING ROLLER APOSTLES

Are Supposed to Have Gone to England.

Windsor, Ont., April 2.—It is believed here that Mrs. Mason, "Mother Eleanor" of the Flying Rollers community, and D. L. Mackay, her secretary, have gone to England. It is known they held tickets reading Montreal when they left here by a C.P.R. train on Sunday night. On leaving the hotel, just before midnight, both were heavily muffled in furs and wraps, with the evident desire to conceal their identity, but Mackay was too well-known here, where he had been a prominent figure for several years, and was identified by several railway men. A third person, a man, accompanied him. Who he was has not been disclosed. It is probable the property owned in this district and in Detroit by the community will be disposed of, and that the colony will remove to Fenwick, Mich., where several members now live on a farm owned by the Rollers.

#### WHITE WOMEN AVENGED.

African Natives Flogged By Whites.

Johannesburg, April 2.—Captain Grogan, president of the Colonists Association, assisted by two other Europeans, publicly flogged three natives before the courthouse.

The affair was instigated by practically all the non-official white population. A resident magistrate and a policeman were present, and made a formal protest, but no attempt was made to interfere with Captain Grogan and his assistants.

The flogging was the outcome of lack of police protection, which has led to many white women being insulted by natives. Often the natives have gone unpunished, and public resentment culminated in to-day's extraordinary scene.

#### AWAIT EARTHQUAKES

With Some Anxiety Says Prof. Belar, of London.

London, April 2.—Prof. Belar, the seismograph director of the Alabach Observatory, announces that the great unrest of the earth has been growing during the last three days and connects the fact with the presence of large sun spots. He says that if the disturbances of the equilibrium of the earth's surface are to result in the average compromise, we must await the earthquakes now due with some anxiety.

### THEATRE CROWDED

DESPITE THE BAN OF ARCH-BISHOP BRUCHESI.

Montrealers Go to See "La Rafale" By Paris Company—The Views of Mlle. Rose Symra.

Montreal, April 2.—Despite the injunction of Archbishop Bruchesi, forbidding the faithful to attend the Theatre des Nouveautés was, last night, filled to its capacity on the occasion of the presentation of "La Rafale," with Mlle. Rose Symra, formerly of the Theatre de l'Odéon, of Paris, in the leading role. In the balcony some had to stand for lack of seating accommodation. The archbishop's injunction, however, had an appreciable effect on the attendance of ladies, their proportion of the audience being smaller than usual. The audience was generous, particularly toward Mlle. Rose Symra, whose acting made an excellent impression. At the matinee performance the audience was small, about half the seating capacity of the theatre being occupied.

Mlle. Rose Symra said that the archbishop's injunction had fallen heavier on her than the rest of the players, owing to the occasion being her first appearance on a Canadian stage.

"I was very much surprised," she went on. "At first I thought it was the result of some misunderstanding between the management and the ecclesiastical authorities. I never dreamed that the clergy here imputed so much influence to dramatic artists and their work. In France we are considered quite inoffensive and the church could never think of molesting us in this way. I have given lessons in some of the most orthodox Roman Catholic families in Paris and on an excellent terms with several members of the clergy there. It is the first time that I have ever met with such a reception. I was always under the impression that this broad expanse of territory stood for freedom, especially freedom of ideas, but I can declare frankly that I have been a little disappointed."

**Case Was Dismissed.**

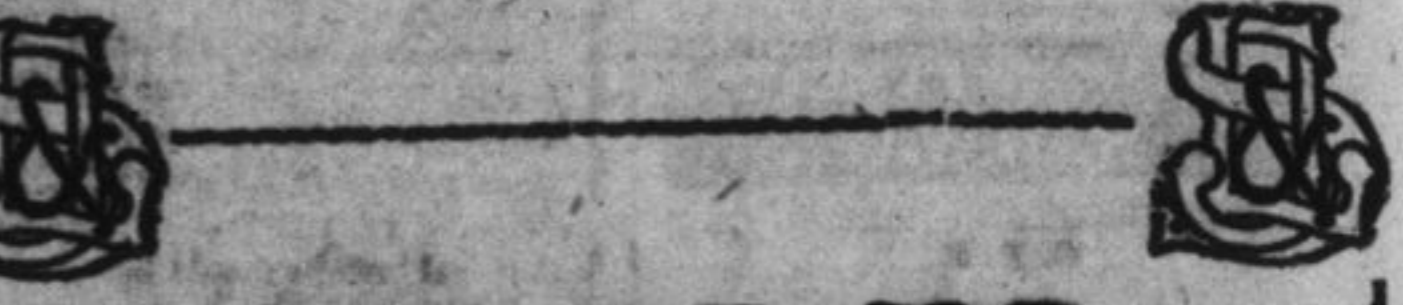
