A GREAT ADVANCE IN LOCOMOTIVE BUILDING IN ONTARIO.

James Connell Describes the Conditions Fifty-Four Years Ago—Some of the First Locomotives Constructed. (By James Connell, School of Mining, Kingston.)

The first locomotive in Ontario was one imported from Portland, Maine, for use on the construction of the Ontario, Simcoe and Huron railroad, built by the G.T.R. system.

The first locomotive to be built in Upper Canada was constructed in 1853 in Toronto by James Good, whose works were on Sherbourne street, and it was used in hauling the first regular train in the province, the trip being made on May 16th, 1853.

There were other engines turned out by Mr. Good in the few years following, and used on the same line. The names were Simcoe, Hercules, Samson, George Beatty and Cumberland.

The two latter were used to draw the royal train when the present railway, built by the G.T.R. system, was first opened in 1856. The engines being used as a pilot.

Mr. Good built a few more, but it soon became lost art so far as Ontario was concerned. In 1856 a shop was opened in Hamilton at the foot of Westworth street, by D. C. Gunn, who belonged to Kingston.

The writer who had learned his trade in Glasgow, started work in this shop when the first engine was on the floor. Nearly all the hands were Scotchmen, mostly from Dundee. The superintendent, W. L. Kinmond, was also from Dundee, and had brought the men with him and they were all splendid workmen.
