THE RIGHT IS GIVEN

MUNICIPALITIES TO ACQUIRE PRIVATE LANDS.

When Needed For Park Purposes—Kindergarten Deputation Interviews Dr. Fyne—Legislation Re Model Schools Abolition.

Toronto, April 3.—A clause giving municipalities the right to enter upon and acquire private property without the consent of the owners, was passed by the municipal committee of the legislature to-day. The object is to enable municipalities to acquire land for park purposes.

A deputation from the kindergarten department of Ontario education waited on Hon. Dr. Fyne, minister of education, this morning, and asked that the examination of kindergarten assistants be conducted by the department of education and not by local kindergarten directors, and that steps be taken to establish kindergartens in every urban school in the province.

Members of the farming department of the Ontario Agricultural Association waited upon Hon. Dr. Fyne, this morning, to urge that as the proposed abolition of the model schools in accordance with the new normal school programme will deprive many model school masters of their occupation, some provision should be made for them.

LAURIER'S REPLY

To Hon. Mr. Emmerson's Letter of Resignation. Ottawa, April 3.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reply to the letter of Hon. Mr. Emmerson is as follows: "Ottawa, April 3, 1907.—My Dear Emmerson—I have come to the conclusion that the course which you take is, under existing circumstances, in the public interest. You owe it to yourself, to your colleagues and to your friends, to clear your character of charges levelled against it. You could well ignore mere insinuations, but direct and specific charges you do well to face as soon as you can, however, I will place your resignation in the hands of his excellency. Let me assure you that I, as well as your colleagues, appreciate the efforts, labor and zeal with which you struggled to advance the public welfare in a most arduous department. Believe me, my dear Emmerson, Yours very sincerely, (Signed) WILFRID LAURIER."

A BOMB IN THE CHURCH.

Anarchists at Work in the City of Genoa. New York, April 3.—The Herald has received the following despatch from Genoa: While the Jesuit Father Passivich was preaching in the Church of San Siro, here, yesterday, some one threw a bomb in the main door. It exploded and caused a tremendous panic, but no one was injured. After the commotion Father Passivich resumed his sermon, first saying a Te Deum in Thanksgiving for their escape. Investigation by the police showed that the bomb was filled with nails and iron wire, and led to the arrest of the authors of the plot, who are two well-known anarchists, one, Francesco Campanini and Giovanni Belloni. A search of their lodgings revealed quantities of material for the manufacture of bombs.

The People Are Fleeting.

Porza Del Gada, Island of St. Michaels, Azore Islands, April 3.—Violent shocks prevailed throughout this island during the night. The worst disturbance occurred at Vila Franca, where the panic-stricken people fled to the outskirts of the town. The wealthier inhabitants are leaving Vila Franca, the ancient capital of St. Michaels, which was twice previously destroyed by volcanic eruptions.

Hamilton Man Missing.

Hamilton, April 3.—Henry O'Keefe, a nephew of the Dean of Salisbury, has been missing from his home since early yesterday morning, and it is feared he may have met with foul play. He left home about six o'clock yesterday morning, to go to his work at the steel plant, and has not been seen or heard of since. The police are looking for him.

The boss carpenters and carpenters had a conference, last night, and though no final agreement was reached, a prominent member of the union told the Whig, to-day, that a settlement, favoring the carpenters, would likely be arrived at to-day, and that the men expected to start back to work to-morrow morning.

About two o'clock, yesterday afternoon, fire broke out in the oil house at the G.T.R. diamond, where the K. & P. crosses. The fire was caused by a spark from an engine, which set the grass on fire. It crept on till it reached the house where the oil for the switch lamps was. The loss will be about \$200.

CITY IN DARKNESS.

San Francisco, April 3.—The destruction of the electric light and power house of the San Francisco Gas and Electric Light Company by fire last night plunged almost the entire city into darkness, and resulted in the injuring of five firemen, and a loss estimated at \$2,500,000. One fireman will die.

MURDERS CHILDREN

THE YOUNG FARMER ALSO SHOT HIMSELF

Dr. Drummond, Author of "Habitant" Stricken With Paralysis—Ban on Theatre Removed.

Montreal, April 3.—William Simpson, a young farmer of Hudson Heights, was brought to the Notre Dame hospital to-day suffering from a self-inflicted bullet wound, and if he recovers will have to face the serious charge of having murdered his two young children by shooting them.

The tragedy occurred yesterday forenoon, about ten o'clock, at the home of Simpson, about three miles outside the village of Hudson Heights. Simpson shot his two-months old child, and then turned the gun on another two years old. Both of them were girls. Mrs. Simpson was present at the time of the tragedy, but beyond threatening her and pointing the revolver at her he did no injury. She ran at once to the home of Simpson's father near by for assistance, and when he reached the scene of the tragedy it was found that Simpson had turned the pistol on himself. The cause of the tragedy is shrouded in mystery as Simpson had never shown signs of insanity.

Word was received here to-day from Cobalt that Dr. Drummond, the noted author of the "Habitant," and other French-Canadian dialect poems, is lying dangerously ill there as the result of a stroke of paralysis.

Archbishop Bruchesi, to-day, removed the ban prohibiting the faithful from attending the Theatre Des Nouveautés. The objectionable play has been withdrawn and an apology offered to his grace, thus terminating the incident.
