STANFORD WHITE'S DEBIT

Amounted to \$600,000—His Wife Gave Up All. New York, April 4.—It has become known that Stanford White, at the time he was slain by Harry Thaw, had overdrawn his account with McKim, Meade & White, his firm, by \$600,000. His estate is so involved that the proceeds of the sale of his art treasures will go to pay his partners a portion of his indebtedness, and his widow has given instructions that the insurance on her husband's life be applied to the same account. He appealed to his friends, who agreed to take up his broker's account and carry it on out of Wall street, speculations again. 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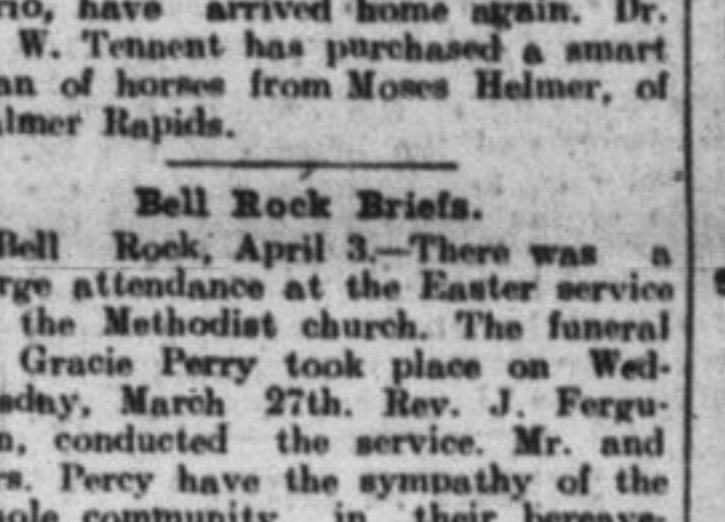
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
