VARIOUS EXAMINATIONS

For Civil Service and Land Surveyor Candidates.

Ottawa, April 5.—General promotion examinations under the civil service act, will be held, commencing Tuesday, May 7th next, at the following points: Ottawa, Kingston, Winnipeg, Montreal, Toronto and such other places as may be found necessary. For intending candidates may obtain information on application to the secretary of the board of civil service examiners, Ottawa.

Examinations of candidates for admission as articled pupils or for commissions as dominion land surveyors will be held at Ottawa, Toronto, Kingston, and Calgary, beginning on Wednesday, May 1st next.

WAS FOUND GUILTY

Of An Attempt to Blow Up Steel Company's Boilers.

Hamilton, April 6.—Sidney Jones, arrested in Toronto, a few days ago, on the charge of attempting to blow up the boilers of the Hamilton Steel and Iron company, was found guilty, at the police court, this morning, and remanded for a week for sentence. It was shown that Jones had deliberately turned off the water from the boilers because he had a grievance against the company. He was seen and the water was turned on again in time to prevent an explosion.

SPORTSMEN'S SHOW

OPENED AT THE ARENA IN MONTREAL TO-DAY

Dr. Torrey Will Open Campaign in Montreal—Condition of Dr. Drummond Very Grave, and Recovery is Doubtful.

Montreal, April 6.—Institutions point to a successful opening of the automobile and sportsmen's show at the Arena to-night. Practically every foot of available space has been taken, not only on the floor of the Arena, but in the annex and the gallery, and leading manufacturers of Canada, the United States and Europe have brought to Montreal their choicest productions in the line of automobiles and auto-boys.

While there is also a large exhibit of things interesting to sportsmen.

The show will be opened shortly after eight o'clock, by Mayor Ekers, assisted by President Duncan McDonald, and other officials of the automobile club of Canada. The opening ceremonies will be brief. It is expected that Mayor Ekers will make a short address, and formally declare the exhibition open.

Rev. Dr. Torrey, the noted evangelist, accompanied by Rev. W. S. Jace, by his assistant, arrived here, to-day, from Philadelphia, where he has been resting since his Buffalo campaign. To-morrow evening he will open a series of revival meetings in St. James Methodist church, which will continue until May 5th. There is much interest in church and religious circles generally, and a large choir has been trained to take part in the musical portion of the services.

AN HOTEL BURNED.

A Young Man Broke His Leg While Helping.

Lion's Head, Ont., April 6.—The Royal hotel and stables, owned by A. Morris, also the dwelling house of T. A. Bruin, with most of the contents, were destroyed by fire, this morning. The cause of the fire is unknown. Both buildings were insured. George Webster, a young man, while endeavoring to help quench the flames, fell from a ladder and broke a leg.

Barns And Horses Burned.

St. Catharines, April 6.—The barns of William Vanderburg, Thorold township, were destroyed by fire, last night, together with six horses, seven cows and a quantity of hay. The fire, it is supposed to have been caused by strays. Loss is \$3,000; partly covered by insurance.

Patient Lost Her Life.

South Windham, Conn., April 6.—One woman, Mrs. Laura Backs, an insane patient, lost her life in a fire which destroyed the Grand View Sanitarium, early to-day. Nearly all the patients were taken out of the building without harm.

MRS. DUCLOS SUES.

Seeks Legal Separation From Her Husband Now in Asylum.

Montreal, April 6.—Mrs. Alexander Duclos, the wife of the man whose liberation from the Longue Pointe Asylum is now being sought by way of habeas corpus, is suing her husband for legal separation, while the defendant meets her action by a cross-demand, asking that separation be declared, not against him, but against his wife. In the case of Mrs. Duclos, the grounds are unfaithfulness, non support, and ill-treatment, while in support of his action in separation, Duclos claims that his wife has been unfaithful to him.

A "KIDDIES'" COURT.

Government Measure Introduced in the Senate.

Ottawa, April 6.—In the senate, yesterday, Hon. R. W. Scott introduced a government measure to provide for the creation of special courts for trying juvenile offenders. The bill is modelled on the lines of the famous "Kids' Court" instituted by Judge Lindbergh, of Denver, Col. It will not be passed beyond the second reading this session, the intention being to create discussion on the question during the parliamentary recess, leaving the final passing of the bill until next session.

WILL ARRIVE MONDAY.

Furniture For Frontenac Hotel—\$6,700 Worth From Toronto.

The furniture for the Frontenac hotel had been shipped from Toronto and will arrive in the city to-night. In all \$6,700 has been purchased which speaks well for the management of this fine old hostelry. The work of remodeling the hotel will be started at once.

To Sell Rollers' Property.

Windsor, Ont., April 6.—Alfred Stedman, who is temporarily in charge of the Windsor and Detroit Flying Rollers, says the holdings of the set, in this city, will be sold, as soon as possible. He says it will not take longer than two weeks to complete the sale, and that afterwards the people in the Windsor colony will move to Fennville, Mich., where the Rollers already have a farm and home.

Navigation At Buffalo Open.

Buffalo, N.Y., April 6.—Navigation opened here, this morning, with the departure of the steamer Francis L. Robbins with coal for Milwaukee. The Robbins is making progress, but it is slow, owing to the heavy ice off this port.

DR. DRUMMOND DEAD.

The Noted Author Passed Away at Cobalt.

Toronto, April 6.—A despatch from Cobalt says that Dr. W. H. Drummond, the noted writer of French-Canadian dialect poems, who was stricken with paralysis three some days ago, died, this morning, never having regained consciousness.

The man who has given to Canada such masterpieces in dialect verse as "The Papineau Gen" and "The Wreck of the Julie Plante," was critically enough, not of Canadian birth. He was the son of an officer of the Royal Irish Constabulary, and was born at Currane House, county Leitrim, Ireland, in 1854. He went to college, however, at Bishop's, Lennoxville, and took his medical degree in 1884. For twenty years he was a prominent physician of Montreal.

Archbishop Bruchesi Objects to Works in Public Library.

Montreal, April 6.—Archbishop Bruchesi is extending the scope of his censorship. He now expresses his conviction that such books as the works of Voltaire, Rousseau and others ought not to be included in the city library at the Monument National. The city hall committee in charge of the city library have been discussing the question with him, and it is thought that they will comply with his request and remove what he calls "offensive" books from their list.

CANADA'S FINANCES

ARE REPORTED IN FINE CONDITION

A Decrease of Fourteen and a Half Millions in the Public Debt—The Record is Most Gratisfying.

Ottawa, April 6.—A decrease of \$14,466,136 in the net public debt of Canada, an increase of \$8,798,995 in the ordinary revenue, and an increase of only \$152,539 in the ordinary expenditure of \$1,291,712 in the total expenditure are the outstanding features of the splendid financial statement of the dominion for the fiscal period ended March 31st.

The record of the nine months which constitute the last fiscal year, in respect to the financial betterment of the country, is in every respect the most gratifying ever issued by the finance department.

Since Confederation, there have been only five years in which the year's statement has been able to show a decrease in the net public debt. Three of these years have been under the present government, and the total reduction of the four years was \$13,968,365, or less than the reduction achieved in the past nine months. The total net debt at the end of last month was \$232,576,541, a reduction during the month of \$2,565,113.

The total revenue in regard to consolidated fund account for nine months was \$63,814,457, and the expenditure \$41,888,739.

The increase in revenue for March, as compared with the same month of last year, was \$572,756.

The expenditures on capital account for the year were \$10,885,690, as compared with \$9,146,337 for the corresponding period of 1905-6.

The revenue increases included \$5,598,110 from customs, \$1,942,958 from excise, \$214,148 from post office, and \$762,810 from public works, including railways.
