THE MYSTERY CLEARING UP.

The Fays will be remembered. They were in Kingston some months ago and created a sensation by their feats. They were what is called magicians, which is another name for wonder-workers. Their success in reading, "monstrous" and questions which were written down, usually on paper, in locating certain persons about the house, in revealing the perplexing things that troubled them, in reading the numbers on bills and watches were for the time incomprehensible.

Another party, the Phays, are travelling through Canada and giving similar performances. These latter are the more remarkable, in that they include, in one part of the programme, about all that the Fays produced, and in a second part the methods by which they reach results. The questions are sometimes deciphered from the pads, which are made of special paper and are more than usually susceptible to chemical solutions. Aids in the house collect information about persons which is communicated to the reader through tubes and invisible telephones.

The marked bill, so often referred to, is "issued from the box office." The names of certain visitors are obtained from the directory of the hotel registers. The exact questions are sometimes read off a little book, which the operator has made out for her from the pads during the recess of forty or fifty minutes.

The Phays do not pretend to deceive anyone. They entertain and they expose, and the Ottawa papers say that the audience show an intense interest in the explanation of what has heretofore appeared to be a profound mystery.

SHUTTING OUT STRIKES.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux must be complimented on the successful inauguration of the act which aims at an amicable settlement of labour disputes, without resort to strikes. The act had hardly been passed ere the air was filled with rumours of labour troubles. In Nova Scotia the men were out, and the difficulty between men and employers had reached an acute stage. There was a misunderstanding as to the operation of the act. The impression was that it was not operative as yet, and that in any case it was enforceable by the government. The fact is that the usefulness of the law is only reached by the application of either party to the dispute for an investigation board, and pending its appointment and action it is a serious offence to strike or cause a lockout. As soon as the Nova Scotians realized the situation work was resumed, and the labour department will enquire into the case.

At Taber, in the west, there was a lock-out, and some fault was found because the government did not act once but in and end the strike. Mr. Lemieux said the routine was clear, that appeal must be made to the department, and on communication with the Canada West Coal & Coke company, the mine was opened and work resumed. Similarly the employees of the Crow's Nest Pass company, West Canadian company at Lile and Bellevue, the Canadian American Coal & Coke company at Frank, and the Internal Coal & Coke company, at Coleman, numbering 2,700 men, had returned to work and had applied for the appointment of boards of education to inquire into the disputes as to wages and time.

So the good work goes on. The act may not be a perfect one, but it is conceived in the proper spirit, and it will accomplish its purpose if it is respectfully regarded. The minister of labor toiled patiently to get it into its present shape. He consulted every recognized authority respecting it, and he had the experience of his deputy, which counts for more than anything else. The conflicts in which capital and labor have heretofore engaged have been costly affairs. They have entailed great losses on both sides, and they have paralyzed business. The desire is to prevent all this, and the new act will do it if given half an honest trial.

FOSTER HAS A BRAINSTORM.

The Foster explosion, on the insurance commission, was noisy but not effective. The plan of the ex-minister, on which he had mediated all through the session, was to assail the commissioners, to show that they were prejudiced, that they had gone out of their way in their investigation of private business and that the purchase was to figure him and his political associates. The point which he emphasized was that he was not a Forester, and that he was not to do with the investment of the I.O.F.

TWO MEN PLAY TRICK ON THE TRAIN.

Mr. Young, a Theatrical Man, Mourning Loss of His Time-piece.

Mr. Young, a theatrical man, advanced agent for the "Squaw Man," which is booked for the Kingston Grand, and who has been in the city making the necessary arrangements for the appearance of the show, is today mourning the loss of his watch, which he prized very highly. He had the misfortune in his possession when he stepped on board the early morning train for Toronto today, but before the train had got three blocks away from the depot his watch was missing and two men who had boarded the train at the station too.
