DEEDS OF VALOR

WERE PERFORMED AT THE C. P. R. WRECK.

The C.P.R. Company is Not Interested in the New Port-Italians Arriving to Begin Work.

Fort William, Ont., April 12.—A. Williams, who arrived from the scene of C. P. R. wreck, reports that the accident was the worst that has ever occurred in Canada. The death list is now fifty with thirty injured. Five cars, toppled over a steep embankment and over two hundred passengers had a wild struggle for freedom. The flames spread rapidly and some horrible tales of suffering are reported among the passengers, who were pinned in underneath the burning ruins. Deeds of the greatest valor were also reported by passengers who were on the train, and at least two of the passengers were killed in burning cars and rescued some of the injured in a manner that stamps them as heroes of greatest magnitude.

James Gilroy, a member of the 12th Lancers, who has just retired from service, and who was going west to settle, is mentioned as one of the heroes. He plunged into the midst of the burning train with a handkerchief over his face and brought out Mrs. R. R. Thompson, who was pinned underneath a seat. The woman was hoarse and her body was missing, and with an agonizing cry, she plunged into the car and was never seen again.

Another passenger, George Perry, of Bonaventure, Eng., is also mentioned for conspicuous gallantry, he having rescued two out of the car that was on fire from end to end. He was injured at the time of the wreck, several bad cuts and was severely burned.

The passengers on the wrecked train were nearly all English immigrants, they having come over on the steamer New York, Kensington and Virginia. They were all pretty well crowded into the train, and when the wreck occurred, they were all thrown into cars.

After the cars caught fire the scene was one of utmost horror, the entire side of an hour, and it was several hours before the ruins were cooled down to admit of a search being made for bodies.

The husbands of Mrs. E. H. Champion and Mrs. R. Davidson were both on the wrecked train, and were sitting beside their wives when the shock came. In the confusion they became separated, and managed to get out themselves, after this it was with the greatest difficulty that they were kept from plunging back into the burning mass of ruins.

All the injured arrived here about noon, several are in the hospital, but none are in serious condition. A great number of passengers proceeded west on the train from here.

A LIVELY EPISODE.
Two Men Floating in Ice.
Word was brought to the city, on Friday, of an accident which happened on Tuesday afternoon near Craigfield and P. V. Some were eyewitnesses to a tragedy that nearly resulted in the death of two lives.

The defence succeeded in holding their own and by the police of such facts as to the whole action of the chief of police and was on a fair way to criminality and the police paid him as a spy by odd methods that do not appeal to the public.

AGAINST THE TOWN

PORT ARTHUR COUNCILLORS RESTRAINED.

Brought Out a Mother Who With Agonized Shriek Ran Back to Death to Save Her Baby.

Toronto, April 12.—Messrs. George T. Marks and Harold H. Wiley, Port Arthur, and William H. Plummer, of Sault Ste. Marie, have issued a writ against the town of Port Arthur, asking for an injunction to restrain the town from taking any further proceedings in respect of a proposed by-law to authorize the town to enter into a contract with the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern railways.

D. McNeill, the manager of the C. P. R. was interviewed, today, with reference to the reports from New Brunswick that, on a recent visit to that province, he inspected the port of Letangue and, becoming impressed by some talk lately of becoming a rival to St. John, the C. P. R. Atlantic terminal and winter port. Color has been lent to the rumor that the C. P. R. was interested in this place as a possible shipping port, through the fact that a charter has been obtained to build a branch line there and which the C. P. R. is popularly supposed to be building. Mr. McNeill had been to Letangue and "I may say that I was favorably impressed with the place." He gave it to be understood that the C. P. R. is not now interested in the proposed railway to that place, whatever its future course in that connection may be.

The first batch of thousands of Italians coming to Canada, direct from Italy via New York, to work on the railways out west, reached here today and proceeded west. They are a sturdy looking lot of navies. Representatives of the Six Nations Indians, this morning, asked Premier Whitney to favorably consider a request that the electoral franchise be granted them. The premier promised consideration of the matter.

As anticipated, the clauses of the city of Toronto's bill for expropriation of the plant of the Toronto Electric Light Company, were withdrawn, when the measure was taken up before the private bills committee of the legislature this morning. The committee showed its sympathy towards the city's side of the case by unanimously agreeing that Toronto's bill, as amended, by the withdrawal of the clause to insert a clause, quite clear, that the city has the right to build its own distribution system, on the approval, of course, of the ratepayers. The city has officially requested the Hydro Power company to furnish a formal contract for the supply of power in accordance with the mandate given in the last municipal election.

A difficulty has arisen between the city of Toronto and the department of justice, at Ottawa, regarding the cooperation of two English criminals, James Goldwell and Isaac Isaacs. The girl was sentenced to six months for shoplifting and has a long list of convictions in London. Isaacs is a parolee and an English prisoner on that he is a professional anarchist. The Toronto police desire to deport these people and communicated with the department at Ottawa. The latter stated that it would pay the fare of the prisoners as far as Portland, Maine, but that the city would have to bear the expense of the officer, accompanying them and their passage across the Atlantic.

Tonawanda, N.Y., April 11.—On Wednesday morning, April 10th, St. Francis church was the scene of a very pretty wedding, the contracting parties being Capt. W. P. Johnston and Miss Frankie Cosgrave. Miss Edna Proctor, cousin of the bride, governed in white silk organdy, acted best man. After the ceremony, the bride's relatives, accompanied by immediate relatives, drove to the home of where a dinner wedding breakfast was served. The tables were beautifully decorated with natural flowers. The happy couple left on the noon train to spend a few weeks with friends in Chicago and Duluth. On their return they will reside in their new home, 238 Broad street. Mr. and Mrs. Johnston have a very large circle of friends who extend hearty congratulations. The bride's sister, Miss Laura Cosgrave, of Kingston, and her nephew, Eugene Donoghue, attended the wedding.
