He Followed the Blazed Trail and Endured Hardships—He Passed Away at Niagara Falls South.

Organization of the Texas-Cotton Warehouse Co., which will have headquarters in Houston, Texas, has been completed at Dallas. The company has a capital of \$2,500,000, one half already being subscribed. The Milwaukee German and the American Druggists' Fire Insurance Co. have been granted licenses to operate in Minnesota. The organization is of Cleveland. Both companies are capitalized at \$100,000. Experts in the oat pit say Patten and the Northern Grain Company of Chicago are long 15,000,000 bushels of oats. Stocks are practically all sold to go west. Strictest fire companies have reduced the prices of fire for the coming season about 45 per cent, placing them at the same figures which prevailed three years ago. Under the scale of prices for this season four 20-pound pieces of ice will cost \$1.25 a month, and seven pieces a week will cost \$2 a month. It is doubtful if any other wood-using industry is so dependent upon a single species as the pencil industry is dependent upon red cedar. This will be appreciated when it is known that \$20,000,000 worth are manufactured in this country every year, and that to the value of \$10,000,000 worth of wood are used in the New York Post. In other words, each day in the year 500 tons, or 20,000 cubic feet, of wood are used for pencils.
