matter, and no action was taken. Dr. Bogert and Mr. Nickle retired from the meeting, and the members of the board proceeded with other business, Thus it is quite evident that the whole matter will be allowed to drop.

Want By-Law Enforced. Dr. Evans brought another matter before the board-that of expectorating on the sidewalks. He said that the board of health last year passed a bylaw prohibiting this practice, but it appeared as if the by-law had not been enforced. The principal sidewalks in the city were put in a disgraceful condition, as a result of this disgusting habit. By-laws prohibiting the practice were enforced in other cities, and he could see no good reason why the by-law should not be enforced in this city. He urged that the sanitary inspector be called upon to keep his eagle eve on the lookout for offenders, and that an example be made of some of them. Serious results would follow, if the practice was allowed


