

Snake Charmer is Attacked By Adder.

Cardiff, April 20.—Henry Richards, of Maresfield, near Cardiff, who is known locally as "Henry the Snake Charmer," had a terrible experience with an adder on Thursday, from the effects of which he is only now recovering.

Richards has a habit of carrying at least one snake with him, and sometimes he has as many as nine in his pockets. His method of capturing snakes is interesting. He takes a white handkerchief, to which the attention of the reptile is attracted. Then he grasps its tail and places it across his arm, when it is said to become quite still under the man's influence.

Richards declares that he had been for three years in quest of the reptile which bit him.

PICTON LADY DEAD. YACHT CLUB TO JOIN THE NEW CIRCUIT.

Picton, April 20.—With shocking suddenness came the death of Mrs. Matilda Lowey, a well-known resident of Union street. About four o'clock, Thursday afternoon, she deceased was standing on her verandah talking to a friend, when she was stricken with paralysis and fell to the ground. In four hours she had passed away. Her husband, Mrs. Lowey was a widow, aged sixty-seven years. She is survived by one son, George, and two daughters, Mrs. B. Snider, and Mrs. J. O'Neil, all living in Picton.

HIDDEN COMMUNITY. Colony of Chinamen Found in Australia.

Sydney, April 20.—A traveller in Northern Queensland, Mr. Hansford, a Melbourne lawyer, brings a story of a hitherto unknown colony of Chinamen in the country near the Gulf of Carpentaria. The news, which has been confirmed, has come as a shock to the advocates of a "White Australia."

The Chinamen, who are said to number thousands, are, it appears, camped on arable river fields, and are growing vast quantities of opium, which is now a prohibited article in the Commonwealth, except for medicinal purposes. Presumably a market for the drug is found among the rich Chinese storekeepers of the north.

The interlopers have made their way to Australia by way of the East Indian islands and the Commonwealth government is now being called upon to turn them out.
