Each government will have two votes. A department of the colonial office is created with a permanent secretary staff which shall be charged with the duty of obtaining information for the use of the conference and dealing. tentatively, with such matters of general impartial interest as arise in the intervals between the conferences. It was further decided that when matters arise requiring the consultation of two or more governments, which cannot conveniently be postnoned un-til the next conference, a subsidiary conference may be held between es pecially chosen representatives of the

covernments concerned. The Earl of Elgin, secretary of state for the colonies, referring to the mat ter of military defence, outlined the general principles of an imperial or-ganization and the premiers concurred in his views.
