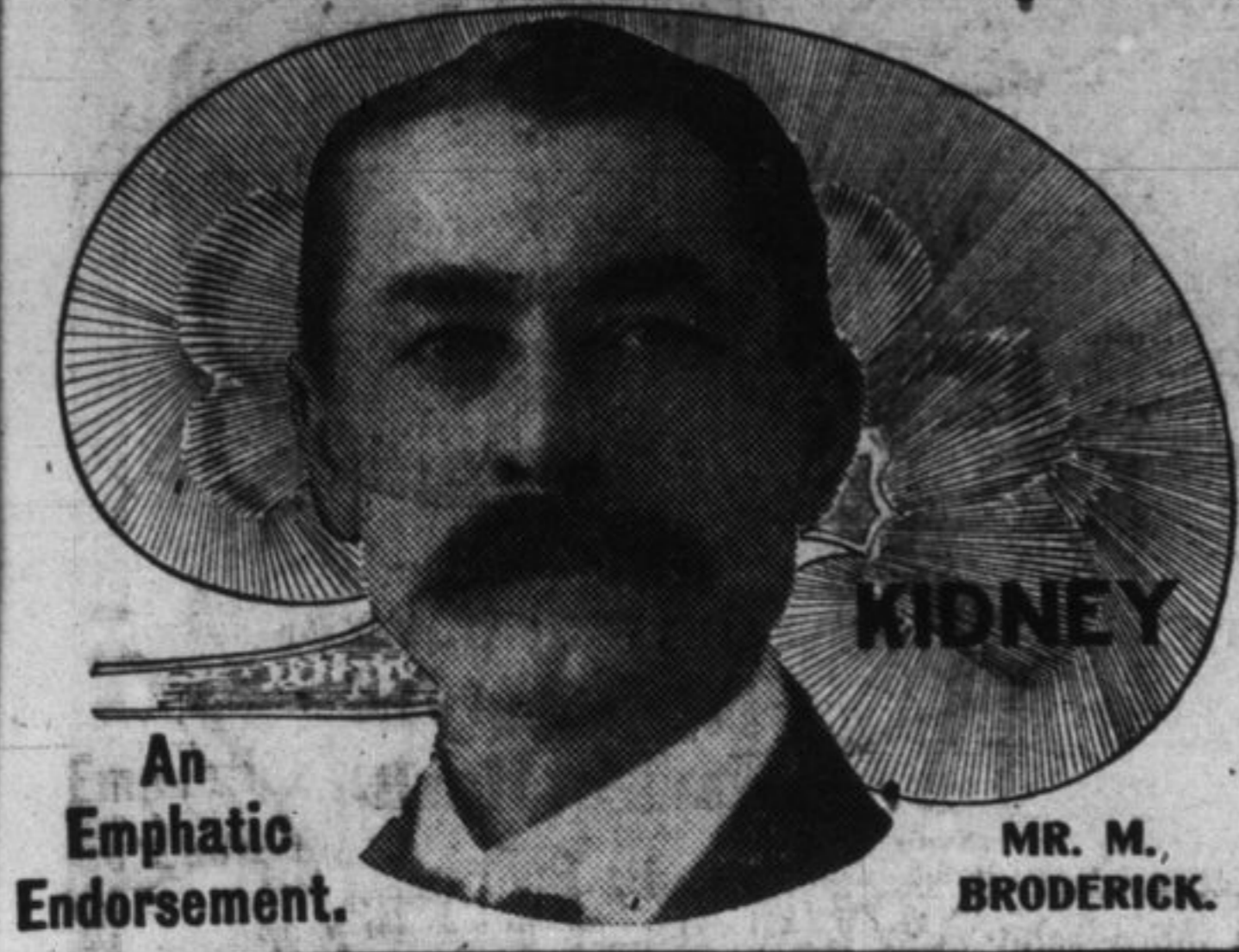

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres, or more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the District or Sub-agent. An application for entry or inspection may be made by the applicant or his agent, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "prevention" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim. An applicant for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until such application has been disposed of. A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of his mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment. Where an entry is summarily cancelled or is liable to cancellation, the applicant for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until such application has been disposed of. A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of his mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment. Where an entry is summarily cancelled or is liable to cancellation, the applicant for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until such application has been disposed of.
