CHINESE WANT A ZOO

Second Noah's Ark of Wild Animals.

Berlin, April 25.—The well-known wild beast dealer, Herr Hagenbeck, of Stellingen, is sending the contents of a zoological garden to Peking for the Chinese government. He has chartered a ship for the purpose, which, when freighted, will be to all intents and purposes a second Noah's Ark.

The boats, which will be in pairs, will be packed in strong cages large enough to afford them room for exercise. The cases in which an ostrich is packed is fitted with a sort of trap-door through which it can stretch its neck when so inclined. A number of trained keepers are accompanying the ark, who will instruct the Chinese government in the treatment of the wild animals.

Mary Anderson Navarre.

New York, April 25.—Advices from London state that Mrs. Antonio Ferrand de Navarre, who was Mary Anderson, a beautiful and accomplished actress, sailed yesterday, for this country, to pay her first visit in many years. She and her husband will stay for a number of weeks in New York, and will be the guests of Mrs. Navarre's parents in Forty-third street. Miss Anderson retired from the stage in 1888, and two years later she and Mr. de Navarre were married, in London. Since their marriage they lived in Broadway, Eng., in the midst of an artistic and literary settlement. Two children, a son and a daughter, have been born to them.

The British And The Boers Will Fight.

Laurier's Prophecy

AT THE BANQUET TO THE COLONIAL PREMIERS.

Sharp Talk of Premier Deakin About Reciprocal Trade—The Mention of Joseph Chamberlain Was Loudly Cheered.

London, April 25.—At the banquet tendered last night to the premiers of the self-governing colonies at the colonial institute, Premier Deakin spoke in no uncertain terms of the necessity of some plan of reciprocal trade among the component parts of the empire. Lord Elgin presided over a brilliant assemblage.

Lord Tweedmouth, replying to Mr. Smartt, who proposed the toast of the "Empire of the Empire," said the present condition of the empire had to be considered, not the condition a hundred years hence. Sir Frank Borden, who followed, said that Mr. Smartt's suggestion was a difficult and controversial one, which it was better not to enter into in detail. If ever British authority were challenged, what happened in other years since would happen again, and to ten times a greater degree.

The chief feature of the speech of Lord Elgin who proposed "A United Empire," and who spoke of the good feeling which characterized the conference, was the prolonged cheering which greeted the mention of Joseph Chamberlain.

Sir William Laurier said Mr. Smartt was more of a warrior than he was. He alluded in glowing terms to the British government's action in granting a constitution to the Transvaal, prophesying that if ever the British empire was called upon to draw the sword from the scabbard, the man who fought each other in South Africa would be found fighting side by side under the old flag.

Mr. Deakin, after some subsidiary chaff with reference to the speech of the conference, spoke plainly on the question of preference. Having referred to the probability that an organization analogous to the general staff would be treated in connection with naval and military matters, he asked the empire exist only for defence? Are we to stand shoulder to shoulder on the battlefield, side by side on the iron-clad, but to pass each other by as strangers in the paths of peace. We see our merchants, shippers and traders exposed to competition which is unfair, which is subsidized. Surely the least we can do is to insist on equal terms for our own people.

The M. P. in both houses yesterday entertained to luncheon the colonial premiers. The interior of Westminster Hall was appropriately decorated. The prime minister especially distinguished notabilities were present.

Premier Laurier said the labors of the colonial premiers in this country would not be in vain, but would tend for good and the premiers would go back more inspired and ever with the sense of imperial unity, coupled with and based on local autonomy.

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CRIME WAS PRACTICALLY FORGOTTEN

By All Except the Police—Jailed After Eight Years of Honest Citizenship.

Kansas City, April 25.—Twelve years ago the post office of a small Oklahoma town was robbed. William J. J. was seen about the place with the stolen goods. He was arrested, charged with the crime, and sentenced to five years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan. For three years he was commuted for good behavior, and was released. He was walking in the yard of the prison one night. He saw a guard asleep, and temptation was too great. He fled the guard he ran.

The next day Charles W. Anderson made his appearance in this city. He found a position in a restaurant. None of the employees were more zealous than Anderson. For years he struggled on, leading an upright life and saving a little money. Then, seven years ago, he met the woman who was to be his wife. He was only twenty-nine years old, and the girl was seventeen years old. They were married about a year later and lived in a small cottage at 117 Holmes street, a devoted husband and wife.

To her his life had always been exemplary. She knew of nothing wrong. Then, three years ago, the baby came and saving a little money. He started a restaurant of his own. The years passed with still the happiness in the little home. Business was good at the restaurant.

Saturday he was recognized by federal detectives and returned to the government prison.

HUSBANDS AT A PREMIUM.

Three Women to One Man in Switzerland.

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OFFER PETAWAWAGROUNDS AT NOMINAL RENTAL.

Change of Front Later—Wanted Gift of Niagara Camp Grounds in Exchange—Mr. Borden Raises Question and Mr. Fielding States Case.

Ottawa, April 24.—The case for the Dominion government in regard to the acquisition of lands at Petawawa for the purposes of militia training was stated in the house, tonight, by Mr. Fielding. The question was raised by Mr. Borden, who, after summarizing a portion of the history of the negotiations, questioned the validity of the proceedings of the federal government, and declared that, even if in accordance with the law, they were tyrannical and oppressive. Mr. Fielding charged those who had supplied the leader of the opposition with his information with having suppressed or omitted some of the most vital facts. In a careful survey of the circumstances he read the correspondence which had taken place between the militia department and the Ontario government of lands, mines and forests, showing that the government of Ontario in 1904 offered to lease the lands to the militia department for ninety-nine years at a nominal rent. The militia department has been offered a free site for a camp at Kawartha, in the province of Quebec, but it decided to accept the Ontario offer. After the federal government had made all arrangements the Ontario government turned round and suggested that part of the camp ground at Niagara, which it was proposed to abandon, should be given to the province in exchange for the Petawawa lands. That suggestion was not entertained by the militia department, whereupon the Ontario government raised a cry about timber licenses. The minister of militia entered into negotiations regarding the licenses, but found that the compensation demanded was exorbitant, and was wanting \$95,000. "It," concluded Mr. Fielding, "the Ontario government thought they had a grievance, the federal government was willing to leave the question to be determined in the courts."

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Trent Valley Canal—Increased Postage.

From Our Own Correspondent.

Ottawa, April 25.—The route of the Trent Valley canal, and the promises which had been made to the electors of Durham during the candidature of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, that Port Hope would be the mouth of the canal, were discussed in the house yesterday. Mr. Foster taking the opportunity of making one of his alleged funny speeches at the expense of the minister of justice. The house was in itself amused to enjoy the sallies of Mr. Foster immensely.

The announcement was made by Mr. Lemieux that the government had appointed Sir William Mulock, ex-minister of labor, as chairman of the board to investigate the coal situation in the west.

Senator Ellis brought up in the senate the increased postage to the various states. The minimum rate on a Canadian newspaper to the United States was one cent a package. The good which the circulation of Canadian newspapers did in the United States was to be seen each year by the large number of Canadians in the United States who took part in the home-comings held in the towns and cities throughout the dominion each year. Under the new postal rates the country weekly which cost \$1 would have to pay 52c. a year postage and the semi-weekly \$1.04. The result would be a falling off in the papers going to the United States. He questioned the increase being in the best interests of the country.

HUSBANDS AT A PREMIUM.

Three Women to One Man in Switzerland.

Geneva, April 25.—Recently published statistics show that in the Swiss canton of Glarus there are three women to each of the 1,200 marriageable men in the district.

"Seven hundred of the men are married and 113 husbands are still in their teens. Three youths of nineteen are widowers and two of the same age are divorced.

One young man of twenty-five divorced two wives within three years and is engaged to be married for the third time. Another youth of twenty-two, has been married twice and is now a widower.

Ballet Dancer's Request.

Leaves \$115,000 To Be Distributed Among Young People.

Berlin, April 25.—Lucile Grahn-Young, the leader of the Munich Royal Opera ballet, who died, yesterday, bequeathed her fortune of \$115,000 to the municipality, to be given away in the sums of \$75 to worthy young men between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five, and young women between thirteen and twenty who require help in studying their chosen professions and trades.

The only condition the dancer imposes upon the city is the upkeep of her grave, for which she leaves a sum of \$3,750.

Compelled To Retire.

Brookville, April 25.—Owing to the precarious state of his health Rev. D. Winter, ex-president of the Montreal Methodist conference, is compelled to retire from the pastorate of the Winchester Methodist church.

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
