REVIVAL SERVICES.

The Addresses Delivered Last Evening.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, there was a good attendance at last evening's revival services in Sydenham Street Methodist church. The speakers were Mr. Ross and Mr. Cameron. The first named took his text from Philippians i, 5: "He humbled himself." In the course of a very able address which was listened to with deep attention, he called particular attention to the fact that it was not God the Father who humbled Christ, neither was it man who humbled him. "He humbled Himself," it was purely voluntary and it was of accord to God the Father because of man's great need. It was to save man from sin that Christ humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death even the death of the cross, and wherever the story of the cross is read a feeling of guilt comes into the human heart. His is the only life and death that makes us feel the need of forgiveness.

After the male quartette had sung, with good effect, "The Heart of the Heart," Mr. Cameron spoke briefly on the repentance of the dying thief as recorded in Luke xxiii, 40. He saw in this man a picture of the sinner who repents, and there was in it, too, a demonstration of the power of Jesus Christ to save the most abandoned and sinful of men. No doubt this robber, who was suffering justly for his transgressions, said that law had been brought up with religious privileges, but he had cast them all aside, even as some had done who were now listening to his voice. "Sin has spoiled the brightness of your days and when night comes you have no peace." Continuing he called attention to the great change in the condition of the man, now known as "the penitent thief." Touching by the spirit of God, he is led to see his own sinfulness and the revelation is turned into the sinner and his genuine repentance is shown in his confession and in his interest in his brother robber. His faith is wonderful in that it was at a time of Christ's greatest humility when he was being crucified, and he decided that he would follow Him. Let us pray for a lady who is not sufficiently convicted of sin. A Friend.

WANTS SOME POWER

HOW QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY COUNCIL STANDS.

Only Two of the Older Professors of Queen's Remain—They Are Prof. Dupuis and Watson—No Medical Summer Session.

The Queen's university council, a body elected by the graduates, feels that "if it is to be of further use it must have extended powers. It has been in existence for the past thirty years and has performed good work. Now, however, that the graduates elect five members of the trustee board and the university council also elects five trustees from among its number, the council has little scope, in view of the large representation on the board that controls the fate of the university. The council was inaugurated as an advisory body, and it has continued as such, no executive powers being given it. Now, however, if it wants the trustees, to give it certain powers, or else it must die a natural death. There is lots of work for the council to do even without executive powers, and it would be a pity to see it go out of existence for want of the right to do its duty. Its institution provides for a council, and it must nominally exist, anyway."

Only Two Are Left.

One by one the older professors of the Queen's university of long ago are disappearing from the halls of the seat of learning on the old Ontario strand. A year ago the late Rev. Prof. Nicholson was called to rest. Now Rev. Prof. Ferguson and Fowler are retiring from active duty on superannuation. The only two remaining who link the days of Old Queen's with the present are Prof. Dupuis, dean of the practical science department, and Prof. Watson, of the department of philosophy. The former became connected with the teaching staff in 1866 and the latter in 1875. It is said that Prof. Dupuis had contemplated retiring after the war service but continued in the university authorities. He has been an inestimable strength to the faculty of practical science, and the great work he has done for Queen's will perpetuate his memory.

No Summer Session.

There will be no longer a summer session at the medical college as in former years. The medical term this year was lengthened to the first of April, and the course required by the Ontario Medical Council. The change is satisfactory to both professors and students.
