GAIN TO CANADA AT ALL.

- Fresh Arrivals Prefer Town to Country Life-Will Not the Farms-Not Sufficient ttention Paid to Rural Districts.

In the current number of the Em-ire Roview Mr. Gerald Adams, who was a delegate from the Canterbury Chamber of Commerce to the Congress of Chambers held in Montreal in 1903 nakes some excellent suggestions fo the bettering of our immigration service in the United Kingdom. He has evidently given careful study to the stion, for he is not misled by the gain to this country. The saying that in numbers there is strength may be estioned when it is applied to some the swarms that have come across

Are a Minus Quantity mers 'are a minus quantity instead of a gain, a weakness rather than a strength to Canada. In the West acreage under cultivation has by no the population. But there has been very striking increase in the number of the Western interior provinces. very large proportion of the immi-grants from the Western States and from Northern Europe went on the soil, but the people from Southern Europe and many from the United King-dom preferred life in the towns and cities. If all were productively engaged there they would be a source of wealth to the country only second value to the farming class.

Many Undesirables. But in the towns of the West as well good times we have enjoyed for years afford opportunities for hangers-on and parasites who contribute nothing to the country's output. Mr. Adams does not deal with the distribution of the population in our West, but he sees clearly enough that among the people arriving in Canada from the British Isles there are too many ally nor physically to be admitted into the population of this country. oafers and whiners, who would do no good anywhere. In the opinion of Mr. Adams, one reason for the percentage of this element being so large is that the rural districts of Britain are practically ignored by our immigration agents, nearly all of whose effects are exerted through city offices.

Go to Rural Districts. Naturally, therefore, it is from the cities we get far the greater part of our immigrants. Mr. Adams is con-vinced that the British rural district urnish us exactly the kind useful immigrants we want if the means of learning something about Canada were put in their way. H says that men brought up to agricu tural pursuits, and with savings amounting to from £100 to £50 abound in the United Kingdon where so small a capital is of little help to them. With their training their small accumulations of cash, and their wives, daughters, and sisof farming. Englishmen of that type established on homesteads in Canada would be able to improve their lo immeasurably, and would be a real acquisition to the country.

Cheap Farms In West, In our West, as Mr. Adams truly remarks, such an agriculturist would be able to buy a farm, already broken up, for a sum equal to about two size in England. But the British small farmer, who has nothing to look forward to but hard work and more onerous conditions, knows little or nothing about the grand opportunities of this country. Our immigration agents do not give him their attention. They find it easier to work in the thickly-settled towns. Mr. Adams advises that the Dominion Government establish agencies in the heart of each rural district. "A smart man." he says, "with his heart in his work and the bump of organiza tion properly developed, could accomplish wonders in emigration pro-

PERILS OF PIONEERING.

Do Their Work

People loll in cushioned Pullman or leisurely discuss their dessert in the diner as the train whirls them through the mountains, clatterin across trestle-spanned gorges, now rushing along the edge of dizzy cliffs, where the roadbed, a narrow shelf carved in the rock, clings to the face

Those travelers in luxurious high speed trains, how many of them, as they gaze indolently toward the towering snow peaks and the shadowy depths of the canyons, pause to think of the surveyors who mapped the road, and whose pioneer work has made it possible to travel de luxe through this grand scenery? through this grand scenery? Pathfinders at Work.

To the average occupant of the par-or car the thought of camping out in leep snow of the winter woods would crawling for hours in the broiling sun along steep side-hills and over rockbereft of shade, one's tongue akin to dry flannel, and water-well, perhaps half a mile away. But these are commonplace events in the life of

the railway surveyor.

Let the reader imagine that he has taken conge of civilization, and that he is one of the sun-burned, smokescented, overalled crowd that constitutes a survey camp fifty miles up the pack trail that winds off through the mountains from the very last jumping off place on the railway.

The "Get Up" Call. Early in the morning-horribly earjust as a faint light—the first pale and while yet the stars gleam in the frosty sky, above the black tops of frosty sky, above the black tops of the pines, comes the reveille, an abominable din of tinpan and stick, harshly discordant. Perils of the Work.
