Contracts have been awarded for rebuilding the Queen Hotel at Belleville. William Peters, Osgoensburg, N.Y., deputy collector, died, from apoplexy, Friday.

The senate has declined to approve the printing of the insurance report in French.

There is a danger of a brick famine in Hamilton before the close of the summer.

The Canadian Fraternal Association has discussed the adoption of a standard table of rates.

Two more cases of small-pox have been found in Toronto. Five cases are under treatment.

Richard Croker, the former Tammany leader, has been seriously ill at his home in Ireland.

John St. John and Miss Latreille were struck by a train and seriously injured near Alexandria.

Rev. T. St. Aubin, in Rev. Dr. Amrose's pulpit in the pastorate of St. John's church, Montreal.

The employees on the Binghamton, N.Y., railway are on strike for higher wages and recognition of the union.

TO BEGIN NAVAL CAREER.

He Will Attend Osborne Naval College.



PRINCE EDWARD.

London, April 27.—Prince Edward of Wales will begin his naval career in a few weeks. His name appeared among the sixty-old boys who have passed the entrance examination for the Osborne Naval College.

The little prince will live exactly like an ordinary naval cadet, sleeping in the big dormitory and working in the carpenter's and engineering shops.

He has a pronounced taste for mechanics and also for outdoor sports, which are both features of the Osborne course.

The Prince of Wales will take his leave to Osborne and remain with him a few days, personally supervising his beginnings in naval study.

It is not proposed that Prince Edward will enter the navy permanently, for after a few years in the maritime service he will enter the army.

The Prince of Wales, however, has announced that he hopes that one of his sons will follow in his father's footsteps and adopt a naval career.
