COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Failures in Canada this week 27: same week 1909, 125,230,518.00. Assurance for \$112,572,028.00. Surplus for \$1,829,750.00.

The International Mercantile Marine surplus for 1903 is given at \$6,195,037, against \$2,500,848 in 1902.

The contract has been let for an addition of a third building to the new six-story C.P.R. roundhouse, at Leithbridge, Alta., which is nearing completion.

Work will commence at once on the new building to be erected by the Standard Fitting and Valve Co., Gaspe, Ont. The machinery building will be 70 by 200, and the contract calls for its completion in two months.

The Mackay Bennett and Candy Company, Stratford, Ont., have made arrangements for a large addition to their present factory. The extension will be 63x40 feet, five storeys high. On the ground floor a large new boiler will be installed. The addition will give about 12,000 square feet of extra floor space. Work will be commenced immediately, as the contracts call for its finish before July 1st.

Considerable additions are being just now made to the rolling stock of the Grand Trunk, in the delivery of some five thousand freight cars of various kinds. These cars were only ordered last day or two ago, which is regarded as pretty rapid work in these days of enormous orders for rolling stock, far beyond the capacity of the shops to turn them out.

The cars are of the most modern type, and as shown by the immense quantity of steel coil cars, which have a carrying power of 100,000 pounds each. The cars are being rushed into active work as fast as they arrive, which is about 90 a day.

HOTEL LICENSES GRANTED.

County Commissioners Met Saturday Afternoon.

The county license commissioners met Saturday afternoon in the office of C. W. Wright, city license inspector. Those present were: John Dillon (chairman), Purdy, George Smith and Inspector Marsden.

A petition from G. Berryman, Kingston Mills, for a license, was refused, on the grounds that when the present law of license commissioners came into office, it had been agreed that the first offense of a hotel proprietor in selling to a minor, or on the Sabbath day, would mean a revocation of license. He had been fined in the year just passed, for selling liquor without a license.

THE LATE ROBERT McLEOD.

An Old Citizen Passed Away This Morning.

The death occurred this morning of a well-known citizen, in the person of Robert McLeod, Bagot street. Deceased was an engineer by trade, for years long connected with the Rathbun company, of Deseronto, and the locomotive works, at Belleville. Mr. McLeod was installed as engineer, which position he held until he had to give up on account of ill-health. Deceased was a member of St. Andrew's church and in politics was a conservative. Deceased unexpectedly, for although deceased had been ailing for a considerable time he seemed brighter this week. Deceased was a widower. He is survived by his sister, Mrs. McLeod, nee Bagot street. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon.

He Was Abroad For a Long Rest.

Col. Fages Has Reported For Duty at Halifax—Notes of Interest.

A profile of the Barriefield range has been completed and forwarded to Ottawa, and it is expected that within the next twelve or fourteen days the work will be completed, and this will be necessary, in order to have it ready for camp.

The range is to be extended to eighteen feet, instead of sixteen feet, as originally intended. It will be constructed according to plans from the imperial war office, and Kingston will have one of the finest ranges in the Dominion of Canada. The range will be supplied with an up-to-date telephone service, and will also possess moving and disappearing targets. It is expected that the government will have the work done by day labor, under the supervision of a competent engineer.

The R.C.H.A. has been indulging in mounted parades, under the instruction of Riding Master Gimlett, at the riding school. Both men and horses are acquiring the necessary improvements, and it is expected that in a week, they will appear on the market squares. The horses for the use of the bandmen are being carefully selected from among the horses of the battery, special attention being given to their adaptation to band work.

Col. Fages, formerly of Kingston, has reported for duty at Halifax, and is now conducting an inspection of the horses and equipment of the Sydney, N.S., Field Battery.

Col. Fages has not yet moved his family from Quebec, but expects to do so shortly.

During the last dominion election, Hon. William Hartly promised the citizens of Kingston that \$120,000 would be placed in the military budget for Kingston. He has kept his word. As a result of his influence at Ottawa, he has succeeded in securing \$116,000, to be spent in Kingston on military buildings this summer.

There are several applications for the position made vacant by the promotion of Sgt.-Inst. Harvey, of the R.M.C. Sgt.-Inst. McIntyre, of "A" Battery, is prominently mentioned for the position.

The volunteer corps of Kingston will be supplied with mark II Ross rifles.

An order has been added to the staff of the paymaster for Eastern Ontario, at the armory here.

A sign has been placed in artillery park, warning people against the practice of making a dumping ground of that location.

The new military regulations make provision for a night watchman for the armories and garrison.

IN MILITARY CIRCLES

WORK ON RIFLE RANGE TO BE RUSHED.

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MAKING A LOSS

On Street Railway Power When All is Considered.

As the question of power supplied by the city to the street railway company has recently been under discussion, the following opinion given by Ross & Holgate, of Montreal, the electrical experts who examined the Kingston lighting plant a year ago, is of interest. Ross & Holgate were asked this question:

Is the agreement entered into between the city and the street railway company, by which the former sells current to the latter at 1.25c. per kilowatt hour, delivered at the switchboard, advantageous to the city or otherwise?

Answer: From a study of the cost of generating power in your station, the details of which we have for last year, we reach the conclusion that you are selling power to the street railway at about labor and material cost of same, that you are not making any profit thereon, and that you are not charging such a price as would cover your fixed charges on the boiler plant and buildings, which are utilized by the railway. From a strictly financial standpoint, therefore, when fixed charges are considered, you are making a loss. On the other hand, your fixed charges, should this load be removed, would not be increased in any of the items, except, actually, although not theoretically, no, actual financial loss to the corporation is evident. On the other hand, should you discontinue the supply of the street railway, your cost for coal and material per kilowatt of output of your lighting station would inevitably rise, so that on this score, the city may be said to make an actual profit by the reduction of the losses, which in the case of no street railway current being sold, would attach entirely to the lighting plant, whereas under the present arrangement they are distributed between the two services.

From the above considerations, we are of the opinion that should the street railway revenue be cut off, the city per kilowatt hour of your station output would inevitably rise, so that the elimination of the street railway would actually result in a loss. As a matter of fact, the endeavor of all companies is to obtain a day load to fill up the hours, or at least curves at the station, even although that day load be obtained at little or no apparent profit, as every increase in load which tends to make the plant operate nearer rated capacity, tends to lower the costs of all product sent out.

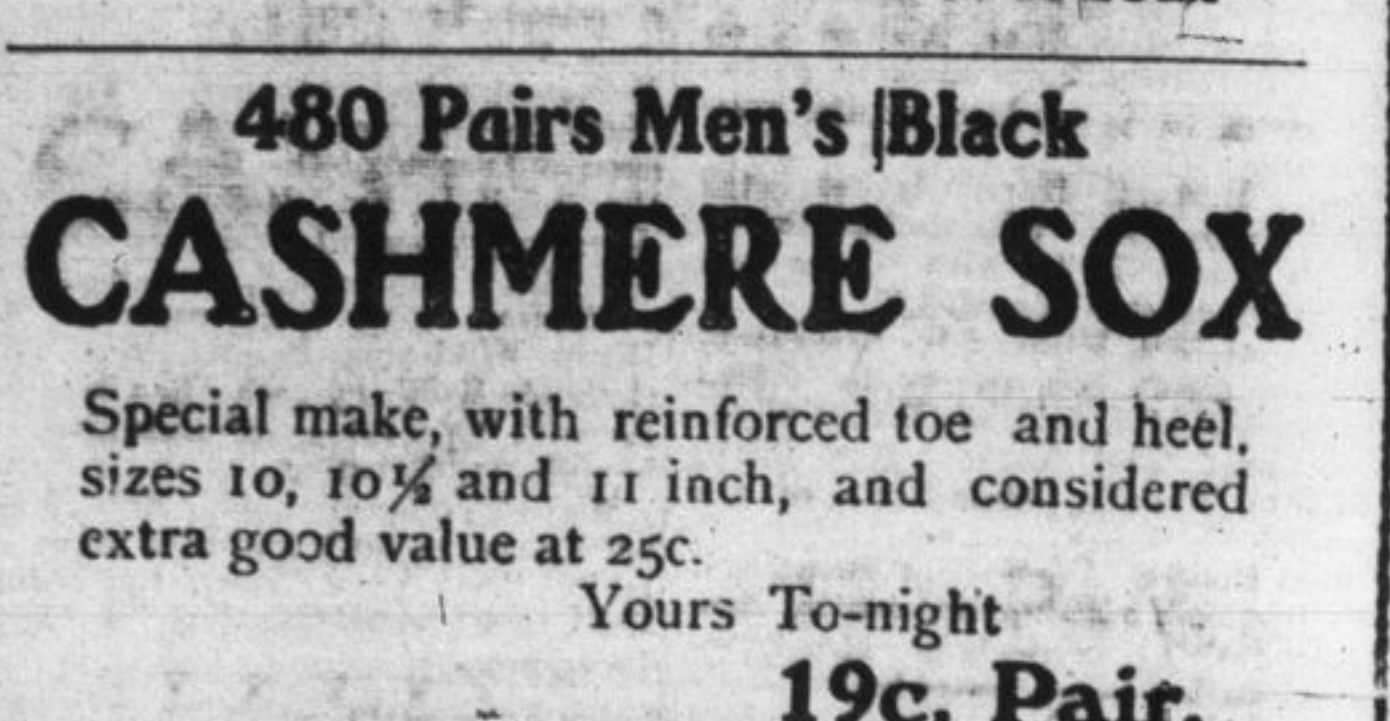
