WEST COAL STRIKE SEEMS QUITE LIKELY TO BE SETTLED.

Settlement Recommended by Mine
Workers' Executive—Buckingham
Strikers Released on
Technically.

Ottawa, April 30.—The western coal
strike seems likely to be settled. The
minister of labor today received a
telegram from Mackenzie King, stating
that the outstanding points of an
agreement has been arrived at be-
tween the operators and the executive
of the Mine Workers' Association. The
latter strongly recommends it to the
members.

All the summonses in the cases of
the Buckingham fatal riot charges
were, this morning, declared void.
They were issued without a seal being
affixed thereon. This technical objec-
tion was brought up, yesterday, and
Judge Talbot now declared the service
null and void under Quebec laws. The
strikers are, therefore, released under
this ruling.

THE WELSH PROMOTERS. Of the Zinc Smelter—Mr. Hadley a Sprinter.

William W. Hadley, one of the Welsh
gentlemen interested in the zinc smel-
ter, that is the outstanding project in
South Wales, and is an athlete of in-
ternational fame. He has made a record
as a soccer or association football
player and as a sprinter. He was
born in one of the sporting centres in
Wales, a county that has produced a
large number of fast runners, the only
people who blocked the triumphant
march of the New Zealanders in their
old country tour in 1906. Mr. Hadley
says he can get out of Kingston suffi-
cient soccer football material to
clean up Canada.

Mr. Gray is a typical all-over Welsh-
man. He speaks the language to per-
fection and in his English gives evi-
dence of his Cymric Celtic origin. He
thoroughly understands the tin
plate industry and is not backward in
the belief that he can give this city
the first tin plate works in Canada.
Mr. Gray knows all the tin plate works
of South Wales and has been closely
identified with the management of tin
works through the western valleys of
Monmouthshire, Llanelli, Carmarthen
and Swansea in Glamorganshire.

The zinc smelter would run night
and day, Sundays and week days, and
never stops. It would give this city
100 Welsh families from Swansea,
which will mean an addition of from
300 to 500 to the population. Mr.
Gray and Dr. Evans had many listen-
ers, this morning, at the British-Am-
erican hotel, as they talked in the
language of "Yr Hen Ioddy" in Welsh.

Mr. Gray is a graduate of the U. C.
W. Cardiff, where he received a tech-
nical education. He is the son of a
mining and mechanical engineer and
thoroughly conversant with the busi-
ness he has in hand. He will come to
Kingston to live with his wife and
as manager of the new smelter.

COMING TO CANADA. Girls Will Seek Work as Domestics.

A young English woman, twenty-one
years of age, who came out from Lon-
don, Eng., with a party of sixty girls,
reached Kingston yesterday. She was
looking for her parents, who reside at
the junction, and through the efforts
put forth by Peter and John, the
woman's relatives were located. Her
parents have been living at the junc-
tion about two months. She was the
only one out of the party of sixty
who left Montreal upon their arrival.
The others have all secured work as
domestics in that city. The newcomer
says that another large party of girls
will leave the old country for Canada
shortly. The majority of these will
seek work as domestics, and do-
mestics are very scarce in Kingston,
she will ask a number of them to come
on to Kingston.

CLEMENCEAU DENOUNCED. Striking Paris Bakers Furious Against French Premier.

Paris, April 30.—Three members of
the General Confederation of Labor
were arrested, this morning, by M.
Hamard, chief of the Paris detective
force. The most prominent of them is
Bouquet, chief leader of the bakers'
strike. When he was arrested Bouquet
few into a fury against M. Clemenceau,
calling the premier a renegade, and
saying that before he became a min-
ister he advocated exactly the same
ideas as the Confederation of Labor.

These arrests were made as a pre-
liminary May day precaution. Others
may follow, and Paris will be an
armed camp on Wednesday. The mili-
tary measures that are being taken
are in reality quite as extensive as
last year, though the troops will be
kept more in the background unless
there is actual need of them.

GIRL FATALLY SHOT. Victim of a Sad Accident in a Nevada Town.

Chatham, Ont., April 30.—Word has
been received in this city that Miss
Carrie Burton, of Anderson, Ind., a
former well-known Chathamian, was
killed through the accidental dis-
charge of a pistol in Goldfields, Ne-
vada. Miss Burton was twenty-one
years of age, a stenographer. She
was talking to Frederick Gleason,
the deputy sheriff, when his revolver fell
and went off, the bullet striking her
in the head, killing her instantly.

Promotion For Kingston.
London, April 30.—Canadian satis-
faction is expressed that Capt. King-
mill, former captain of the battleship
Dominion, has been appointed to the
command of the special service divi-
sion of the home fleet at Devonport.
The appointment indicates that the
admiralty did not intend the calamity
to the Dominion to impede Capt.
Kingmill's promotion. He will be-
come rear admiral next year, and
then be available for a further step
upward.

FIRED AT PRESIDENT?
Men in Motor Boat After Roose-
velt.

Norfolk, Va., April 30.—It is stated
here today that a swift motor boat
with two or perhaps more men in it,

cruise, and that three shots were fired
at the yacht. The shots came from
a rifle. Local authorities know or ap-
pear to know nothing of the matter.
The secret service and crew of the
president's yacht were sworn to secrecy.
The information was secured from one
of the crew.

Department of Pedagogy.
To-morrow evening, a special meet-
ing of the Board of Education will be
held to meet a deputation from
Queen's University trustees and assist
with reference to the department of
pedagogy, to be established at
Queen's, and towards which the On-
tario government is giving a yearly
grant of \$10,000. The educational de-
partment notified the university au-
thorities to confer with the local
Board of Education with reference to
arranging for the practical work of the
pedagogical students who will utilize
the public schools and Collegiate In-
stitute.

Bought A Stone Crusher.
The council of Emmettown township
bought a stone crusher, Monday, and
propose to have it operated principal-
ly by the ratepayers in doing their
household work. The stone crusher
cost \$1,000. It is hoped to im-
prove the roads over a distance of at
least twenty miles this year. Reeve
Gallagher thinks this a cheaper and
better way than attempting to break
the stone with axes and hammers and
flushing up with top boggies.

Why Cut Off?
The question is being asked why
the liquor license of the Bowen house
was cut off. James Adams has con-
ducted one of the quietest taverns in
Kingston. No complaint was ever re-
gistered against his house, for no
lighter could be got there within pro-
hibited limits. His bar was closed
tight on Sundays too. Why was it
singled out and others with "records"
given renewals?

Start On May 50th.
The medical council examinations
start on May 20th, this year, and will
be continued for three weeks. There
are about fifty medical graduates and
students studying for the examina-
tions at present. The exams, as usual,
will be held in the city hall.
The dominion land surveyors' exam-
ination preliminary starts to-morrow
and lasts all day.

AFTER INSURANCE MEN. President Indicted For Forgery, Forgery and Larceny.

New York, April 29.—William A.
Brever, former president of the Wash-
ington Life Insurance company, who is
under two indictments of forgery
and one of making a false statement
to the state insurance department,
appeared in the supreme court and
tentatively offered a plea of guilty to
the latter charge. The plea was offer-
ed with the idea that only a fine
would be imposed. District Attorney
Nott declared that a prison sentence
should be imposed. The tentative
plea was withdrawn and the case put
over until Tuesday.

An application made by the dis-
trict attorney for a special panel of
jurors to try Frederick A. Burnham,
president of the Mutual Reserve Family
Life Association, who has been in-
dicted for forgery and larceny, was
granted by Supreme Court Justice
O'Grady. William Rand, counsel,
asked that the trial be not called at
once, because Burnham is ill with du-
bious and, it would be nothing short
of murder to bring him into court at
this time. The special panel was or-
dered to report on May 13th.
