SUCCEEDED IN DREDGING A CHANNEL

John Donnelly, the well-known Canadian wrecking master, has at last succeeded in dredging a channel to the stranded steamers Huribert W. Smith and the William Nicholson, ashore at the foot of Michigan street.

Capt. Donnelly has had two sand-suckers on the job continually and had expected to use the wrecker Saginaw, which he recently purchased from the Great Lakes Towing company.

He encountered another obstruction in his wrecking operations yesterday. During the big gale of January the heavy sea swept away a large portion of the concrete foundation of the breakwall.

Capl. Donnelly is well pleased with the progress made in the operations and it is the opinion of vesselmen that he has done extremely well under the circumstances.

Albany, N.Y., May 1.—Gov. Hughes, to-day, approved of the bill providing for an investigation of the National Guard and naval militia of the state.

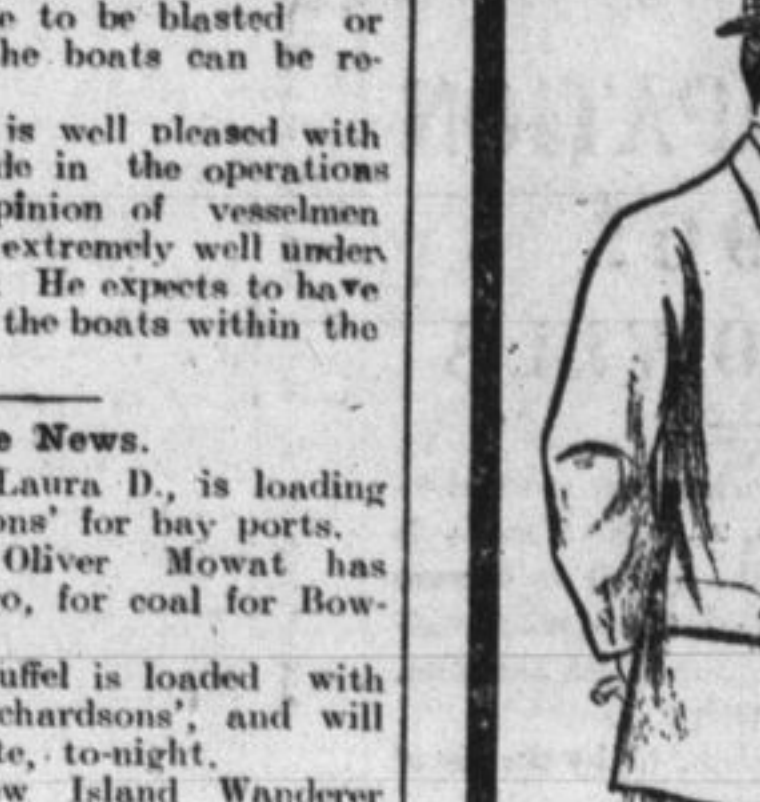
