Washington, May 1.—The joint commission authorized by congress to examine into the business methods of the postal service, began its investigation today. **No More Sunday Ferry.**

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any unoccupied section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.  
Application for homesteaded entry or pre-emption must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.  
An application for entry or inspection made personally by any Sub-Agent office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.  
In case of "persecution" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.  
A homesteader whose application must be eligible for homesteaded entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual entry in good standing and not liable to cancellation, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.  
Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.  
Applicants for inspection must state in their applications the following facts:—  
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.  
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person's residence with the father or mother.  
(3) If the mother has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by his residence upon such land.  
Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, Ottawa, of his intention to do so.  
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.  
Coal—Coal Lands may be purchased at 10c. per acre for soft coal and 25c. for anthracite. Not more than 200 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.  
Quartz—A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim, 1,500x1,500 feet.  
The fee for recording a claim is \$6.  
At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the claim may be abandoned or sold, at the option of the holder, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.  
The patent provides for the payment of royalty of 24 per cent on the gross output. Flotation mining claims generally are 100 feet square entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.  
An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each, a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The leasee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each year, and shall pay 10 per cent annuity on each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
