

OF IMPERIAL FISCAL POLICY BUT OF METHODS.

Premiers Deakin and Jameson De-

London, May 2.—The precis of proceedings of yesterday's imperial conference is preceded by a note from the secretary of state for the colonies announcing that at Premier Deakin's request a summary of the first portion of the premier's address delivered on Tuesday is included (with some corrections). It appears from the reissued precise that Mr. Deakin opened the question from almost an entirely academic point of view, pointing out how foreign imports to the colonies had shown increasingly greater per centage than British imports during the last fifty years. Resuming, yesterday, the commonwealth premier said the purchasing power of the British should be used unitedly. He contendpowers discriminating against

ed that if retaliation was in prospect Britain and her colonies would desire to treat especially with those countries doing a large export trade with the empire. Premier Deakin urged that there should be a preference in population as well as in a trade, and preference in the channels of trade, and that the maintenance of all these links between the different portions of the empire would stimulate and embody a spirit of unity in the empire which would decide its destiny.

Sir Joseph Ward urged that the question should be taken out of the arena of party politics. Preference was not to be confused with protection as competition between the col onies would suffice to keep prices at a normal level.
