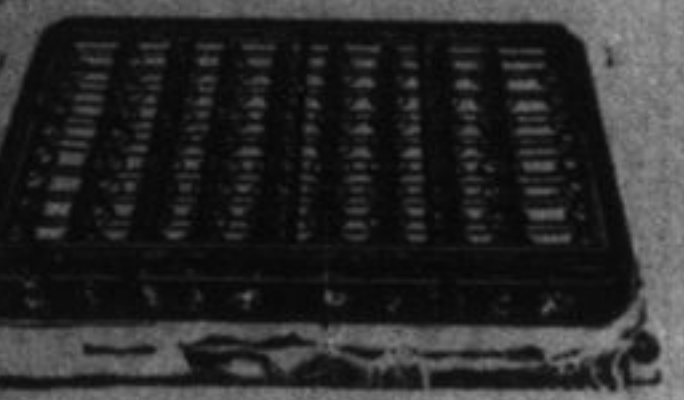

The city engineer stated that he was completing a plan showing how the streets should be extended. The council had approved of the scheme, and Mayor Mowat intended laying the matter before Mr. Hartly.

The chairman read a letter from A. M. Campbell, commissioner of highways for Ontario, stating that he could meet the city council on Tuesday, May 14th, for the purpose of inspecting the streets and consulting as to their rebuilding and improvement.

The chairman said that the information being collected in regard to the rebuilding of the roads was not yet complete, and would not be presented to the board until its next meeting.

The chairman and the engineer were authorized to arrange with S. Grimshaw to provide carpenters for doing the work required during this year in connection with building the concrete walks.

There was a discussion as to the use of the planks taken from the breakwater. It seems that Chairman Gaskin had intended to have them conveyed to the Division street to rebuild an old plank walk, but the parks committee chairman got wind of the matter and stopped the game.
