LORD CROMER RETIRES

ENVOY WHO WAS NEARLY FIFTY YEARS IN PUBLIC SERVICE.

Great Britain's Plenipotentiary in Egypt Resigns Owing to Ill-Health—Empire in Deep Regret—Did a Great Work—People of That Country Now Enjoy Peace and Prosperity Unknown for Centuries.

Foreign Secretary Grey has announced in the British House of Commons that Lord Cromer has resigned. In his letter of resignation he says: "I have arrived at the conclusion that I must ask you to accept my resignation. I have done so after full consideration and after consultation with my medical advisers. I am most anxious that it should be particularly understood that the reasons which induced me to take this step were wholly due to the state of my health and that no political considerations of any kind whatever are in any way connected with them."

Unexampled Services.
Secretary Grey, on making the announcement, and ex-Premier Balfour, who followed him, spoke with deep emotion of Lord Cromer's unexampled services to the Empire, and voiced the nation's regret at his leaving his post during such a difficult period.

The resignation by Lord Cromer of an office which though designated by a less high-sounding title is really the British vice-royalty of Egypt is an event of world-wide interest. Lord Cromer is 66, but that is not an age at which Englishmen, notably those in high position, are inclined to seek retirement. For the English, while they do not go as fast as Americans, go longer. The work which he has carried on for about 25 years appears about to be subjected to a test that will determine its stability, and one would naturally think that he of all men would desire to remain in direction during such a crisis. As he is not a man to shrink from the trial, the conclusion is natural that the British Government takes a somewhat different view of his policy from that expressed by so many tourists and observers who have been impressed by its "system" and "method."

Wonderful Progress.
Egypt under Lord Cromer's rule—for he has ruled as well as administered—has made really wonderful material and moral progress. It has enjoyed a tranquillity induced rather than enforced. His ways have not been harsh, and his ideas have been

PICTURES BY TELEGRAPH.

Photographs May Be Transmitted Over Wires in Three Minutes.

A machine for duplicating photographs by telegraph will be in actual operation in Berlin, Germany, this spring, and it is expected to be put to practical use by a number of newspapers in the near future. The device is the invention of Professor Korn of Munich. In a recent interview with P.T.O. of London, Mr. Alexander Kensey, the pioneer of illustrated journalism and editor of the London Daily Mirror, said: "We have the exclusive rights for England and the Colonies of Professor Korn's wonderful invention of photography by telegraph. It will be in practical use here in Italy, and the instruments are now being made for us by Caspari, of Paris."

"How does it work?" echoed Mr. Kensey with a good-natured smile. "Oh, that is very simple. Professor Korn can telegraph a degree of light. You see, there is a strong electric light burning at each end of the wire. Then he shows his photograph to the light, a minute space of it being registered at a time, and is reflected by a corresponding degree of light at the other end. Thus, one is able to see by telegraph, shades of degrees of light being transmitted instead of signs, the cost being reckoned by time."

"No, there is nothing to prevent our having stations even in Canada and Australia, while we have at present a private wire to Paris, to which we can connect the instrument, and the patent can also be used in conjunction with an ordinary telephone wire, the photograph taking only three minutes to transmit."

"Professor Korn is about forty-three years of age, and is engaged at the University of Munich. I have been in correspondence with him for a year and a half, and went to Paris recently to secure the rights for the 'Mirror' to attend the special representation given before a critical audience, including the French Postmaster-General and several Ministers of State, while King Edward showed great interest in this invention on his recent visit."

"Of course, there is a good deal of scepticism as to the value of this invention in England, as there was in the case of Marconi, but Korn is sure to make a fortune in royalties from his remarkable invention."

HERD OF FAMOUS RAID.

Now Attends Imperial Conference as Premier, From Cape.

Dr. Jameson, the hero of the futile raid upon Johannesburg, is the son of R. W. Jameson, a writer to The Signet in Edinburgh. He was born in Scotland, his father, John, was educated for the medical profession at University College Hospital, London. After acting as house physician and house surgeon, his health broke down from overwork in 1873, and he went out to South Africa, settling at Kimberley, where he continued his practice. He numbered amongst his patients President Kruger and the native chief Lobengula, and came much in contact with Mr. Cecil Rhodes.

In 1888 he visited Lobengula at Bulawayo, and enabled the British South Africa Co. to obtain concessions in Matabeleland. Dr. Jameson abandoned his medical practice, and joined the pioneer expedition of 1889. A year later he obtained the concession in Garsaland, preventing Portugal from asserting her claim to the country. In 1891 he was appointed administrator of Rhodesia. During his administration several wars took place with the Matabele.

On coming to England, in 1894, "Dr. Jim" was feted, and made a C. B. Shortly after his return to South Africa the world was startled with the news of the raid, the history of which is too well known to call for repetition.

Perfidious Alibion.
A remarkable anti-English story, originally emanating from The Allegmeine Marine Correspondenz, which published it from a "reliable English source," is now going the round of the German newspapers, which are giving it prominence, and profess to see in it a proof of insincerity of the British proposal for the discussion of the reduction of armaments.

The Allegmeine Marine Correspondenz says that three "Dreadnoughts" are now being built at Armstrongs to the order of the Argentine Government, and adds that the English press recently announced that Messrs. Vickers, Son, and Maxim are building a giant battleship for the Brazilian Government. The correspondent asks whence these South American states get the money for this very considerable outlay, and points out that these four ships just form a division, which could be purchased by Great Britain at the opportune moment.

ROCKTIDE AT HUNGERFORD.

When Civic Officials Kiss All the Women.

Describing the quaint old Easter custom of "Rocktide," which is still kept up at Hungerford, a correspondent of the Courier writes: "The ceremony begins with the 'macaroni supper,' at which macaroni, watercress, and punch are partaken of, among other dishes. But the real fun begins on Tuesday evening, when the high constable and other officials are elected."

First the town crier parades the streets ringing his bell to awake the townsfolk to their duties. Then he goes to the town hall, and from the balcony he blows a long and loud blast on a celebrated horn, which was presented to the town by John of Gaunt, when he bestowed certain privileges upon the town. (There is also a beautifully carved ivory chair, only used on state occasions, which was presented by him). Then follows the work of electing the constable and other officials, and when this is done, a lunch at the chief hotel.

But the most curious part of the proceedings is the work of the men called "tutti-men"; they parade the streets carrying decorated slaves. They have to visit the houses of every commoner and demand a coin of the realm from every man and a kiss from any woman whom they may encounter. They must be allowed to enter any house and go where they like! If the "fair sex" object to be kissed they must find safety in the streets, for it is only in the houses that the kiss can be demanded!

The meaning of these strange doings seems to be lost, but perhaps in some other part of the country where "Rocktide" is still observed its meaning may be known and explained.

In Hodge's "Everyday Book" one explanation is that it may have been originally intended to celebrate the departure of the Danes from England, though what connection the two things had does not seem to be explained.

POSTAL REDUCTIONS.

British Newspapers May Now Come to Canada At Lower Rate.

The following announcement was made last week by the Postmaster-General in regard to the new postal rates in force from May 1st: "The postage from the United Kingdom to Canada on registered newspapers and on bona-fide magazines and trade journals (published at regular intervals of not more than once

month) is to be reduced to a rate of a penny per pound on each packet, the charges on packets not exceeding two ounces remaining at a half penny. The present limit of weight of five pounds for a packet will be maintained, and certain administrative regulations will be laid down by the British postoffice.

The accompanying portrait is that of Right Hon. Sydney Buxton, British Postmaster-General, who has had much to do with bringing about the change.

STYOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or more over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-agent.

An application for entry or inspection may be made to the local Agent by the applicant, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "pre-emption" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from any individual, and that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of his wife, son, daughter, brother or sister, eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment of the land.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled the homesteader may, at his option, institute of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to priority of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in that particular the homesteader is in default and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled. Duties—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans—

(1) At least allured months' residence upon the land, and to be in possession of the land during the term of three years.

(2) If the father or mother of the settler is deceased, or if the settler resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader, the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal—Local Lands may be purchased at 10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by any individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per acre on the gross output. Quarter—A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim, 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$1.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of royalty of 24 per cent on the sales. Miner must claim generally are 100 feet square entry fee \$5, renewable early.

An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental 10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent computed on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
