Anv even numbered section of Domin-Wat Provisces, execpting 8 and 26, not reserved, n ty be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry or in-

pection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-agent.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent sollice may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary

ompers to complete the transaction are eceived by mail.
In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the appli-An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be eceived from an individual until that pplication has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good tanding and not liable to cancellation relinquish it in favour of father, mother,

son, daughter, brother or sister, eligible, but to no one else, on filing de-Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings. the applicant for inspection will be en titled to prior right of entry. Applicants for inspection must state

hat particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequently the stateany prior right of re-entry should the become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled. Duties—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans:—
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each

year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the lather is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be atisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent esidence upon farming land owned by

him in the vicinity of his homestead the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his inten-
