COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Between 12,000,000 and 15,000,000 bushels are still in the hands of western farmers.

The Union Bank of Halifax, will invade the upper province field at no date.

The Albert E. Reed company, with \$240,000 capital, has been formed to carry on a paper and pulp manufacturing business in Newfoundland.

The two Bonomer furnaces being installed at the Sydney plant of the Dominion Iron and Steel company will be ready for operation in about six weeks.

The output of the collieries of the Dominion Coal company for April was 316,000 tons, compared with 296,000 tons in the same month last year.

From the beginning of the year up to April 21st, the T. & N. O. carried 64,000 more passengers than for the corresponding period last year, and 30,000 tons more of freight.

It is reported that P. Morgan, Jr. is going into the Union Pacific directorate.

This looks very much like a settlement of the differences between the Hill and Harriman interests. This is said to be one of the reasons for the great strength of the stock.

Directors of the United States Steel Corporation have declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 of 1 per cent on the common stock, and the regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock. Quarter ended March 31st, 1907. Net earnings, \$39,122,492, an increase of \$42,488,802. Surplus for quarter, \$3,684,576, a decrease of \$1,822,484.

A FAMILY ADOPT A POLISH INFANT.

No Change in the Strike Situation in Ottawa—Some Firms Have Acceded to the Demands of Men.

Ottawa, May 3.—A prominent Turner street family have adopted a little baby boy, the son of a strange Polish woman who begged admittance to the house yesterday afternoon. The woman, after her confinement, mysteriously left the house, apparently well. The family, who are religiously believed that the child was sent from Providence.

The strike of the bricklayers and stonemasons shows practically no change to-day. The conference, last night, between the executive of the Builders' Association and representatives of the union was ineffective, neither side would yield an inch. The firms who have acceded to the demand for fifty cents an hour, are employing about eight men, but about two hundred are still out.

W.C.T.U. MEETING.

Comfort Bags and Literature For Lumber Camps.

As usual the May meeting of the W.C.T.U. was the smallest attendance of the year, due possibly to house-cleaning and moving. The meeting, though small, was full of interest.

The comfort bags and literature to be sent to the lumber camps is almost ready, and will be forwarded this month. The box of books and literature for the sailor's home is being prepared and will soon be sent.

The union was pleased to note several encouraging features in regard to temperance progress. The reduction of licenses and the enforcement of the by-law regarding blinds during prohibited hours were among these; also the pretensions given to the evils arising from the use of cigarettes in England and America, especially the anti-cigarette campaign conducted by the Montreal Standard, to which hundreds of boys have already signed themselves. Scientific temperance instruction in schools, too, is being highly recommended. Lord Strathcona, in a recent address in England, advocated it strongly for all public schools.

The educational hour was occupied with reports from the lumber camps supplied by the provincial superintendent, Mrs. Minnie S. Irwin.

From the banks of the Ottawa on the west to those of the Lake of the Woods on the west 25,000 lumbermen are busy this winter with saw and axe conquering Ontario's forest. The two W.C.T.U. missionaries, Miss Sproule and Mr. Munt, are doing some excellent work. We may again tell of the very many interesting incidents reported, but we would like to mention one. Mr. Munt says: "In one camp I visited one poor man had met with a sad accident by cutting his leg with an axe. Here the surgical needle, thread and bandages out of the comfort bags came in very useful. The foreman put in eight stitches and b-dressed the leg, and he was taken to a hospital about fifty miles distant. Great praise was given by the physician for what they had done in camp."—COM.

RACES ARRANGED.

A Circuit For Northern New York.

Cape Vincent, N.Y., Eagle.

Although all details are not fully perfected, matters have progressed far enough to warrant the belief that at the next Cape Vincent fair there will be circuit races. The combination will be known as the Northern New York Racing circuit, and will embrace the following places: Sandy Creek, August 20-23; Watertown, August 27-30; Cape Vincent, September 3-6; Potsdam, September 10-13; Canton, September 17-20; Ogdensburg, September 24-27.

It is intended that there will be five races of \$500 each, arranged as follows: 2:22 trot, 2:18 trot, three-year-old trot, 2:33 pace, 2:17 pace. Each place will start with such racing events as may best suit conditions.

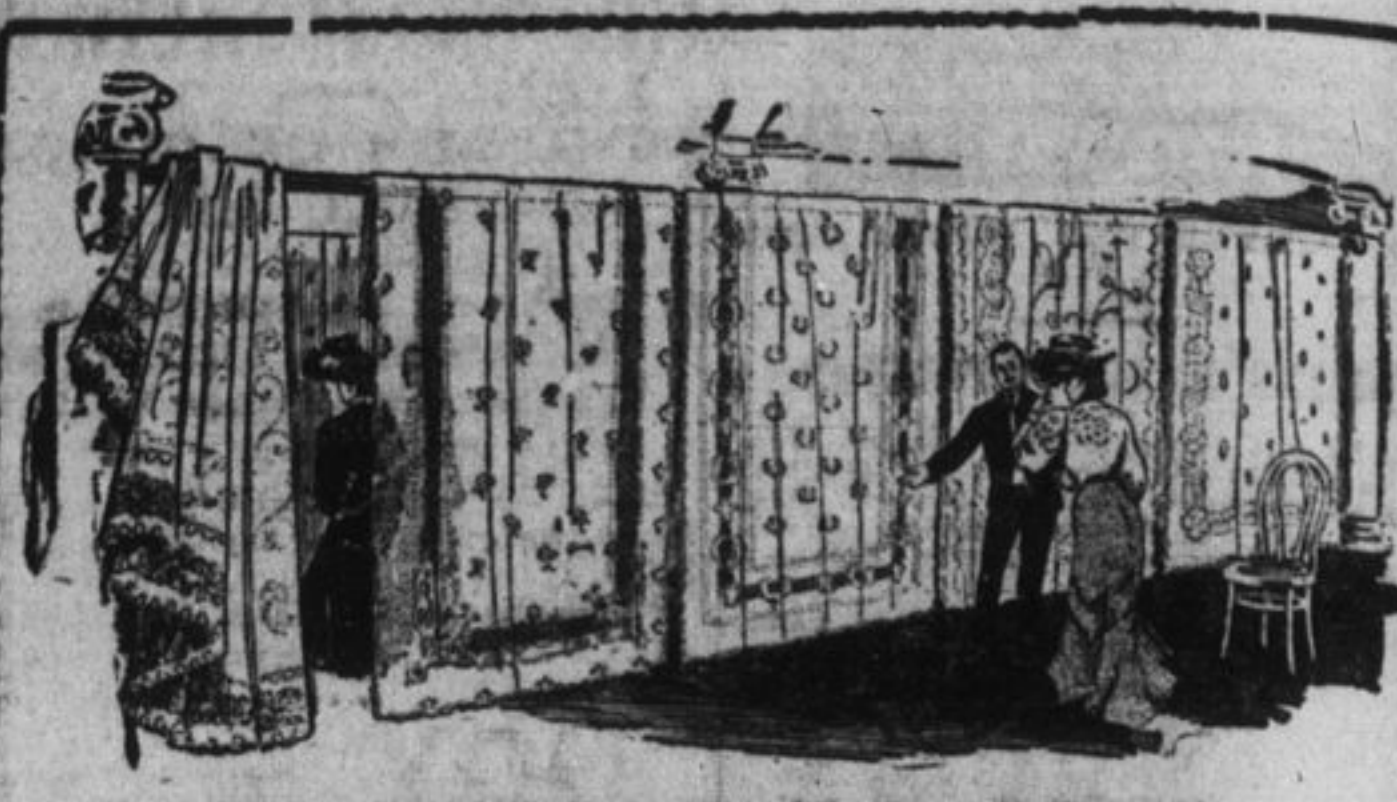
Back Yard Inspection.
