MISSION TO PERU

E.C. AUSTIN TELLS OF HIS CALL TO WORK.

Was Touched By An Address Given at a Convention and Volunteered His Services.

An address dealing with missionary work was last night given in Bethel church by E. C. Austin, Canada's first missionary to Peru.

REVIVAL SERVICES

LESSONS ON RECENT SERVICES POINTED OUT.

Sunday Evening Sermon By Rev. J. Charles Villiers at First Congregational.

Rev. J. Charles Villiers preached, last evening at the First Congregational church, on "Lessons of Encouragement and Warning from the Recent McMaster Evangelistic Services." His text was Mark x, 15: "Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, shall not enter therein."

After a reference to the enthusiasm displayed by the evangelists—an enthusiasm warranted by the cause represented—he said the first lesson was that disclosed by the urgency of the treaty by the evangelists that decision be made for Christ.

A second lesson drawn from the services was suggested by the large attendance at the meetings. It brought home to our minds the fact that in spite of the selfishness, the selfishness of the hour the people had not lost interest in religion.

SHE LOADS ROPE

STR. PLUMMER CARRIES IT TO FORT WILLIAM.

The Movements of Vessels on the Lakes—A Raft to Leave Garden Island For Quebec.

The steamer "Clara" has arrived from Oswego with coal for Booth's.

The steamer D. D. Calvin goes on the dry-dock on Wednesday.

The steamer "City of New York" left the dry-dock this morning.

The steamer "Town" has arrived from Erie, with coal for the Locomotive Works.

The schooner "Tradewind" has arrived from Ganouque with 18,000 bushels of corn for Richardson's.

The steamer Westport has arrived in Kingston with a cargo of slabs for local dealers.

The steamer "J. H. Plummer," from Fort William, with a cargo of grain, loads rope for Fort William at Swift's.

The steamer Kenirving passed through Kingston, Sunday, on her way from Oswego, to Smith's Falls, with coal.

The steamer Randall has arrived at Richardson's with corn, from Washburn, and will clear to-day with corn for Washburn.

The tug Frontenac clears, to-night, for Quebec with the second of the Calvin company's raft of timber, bound for Europe.

The steamer Ford River was unloaded of its cargo of corn at Richardson's elevator at 2:30 o'clock, Sunday morning, and cleared for Chicago.

Swift's Steamer Bellevalle, down to-day, the steamer Ribleau King arrived yesterday and cleared to-day for Ottawa; the steamer Aletha, down and up to-day.

The schooner Ford River has arrived from Chicago, with 18,000 bushels of corn, for Richardson's. Capt. Chauncey Daryaw, of Kingston, reports a very rough voyage.

A Port Colborne, Ont., despatch says traffic was resumed through the Willand canal, at 11:30 o'clock this morning. The damage caused by the tug Schneck, bound from the Soo to Kingston, in colliding with the Michigan Central bridge, near Welland, has been repaired. A large fleet of boats both down and up bound had been delayed by the accident.
