Windsor, Ont., May 7.—New York

organizers for the new prairie prov-
inces.

Finds Time to Do Much Philan-
tropic Work.

In Session At The Imperial
Conference.

JAMESON'S OFFER

BRITAIN CANNOT CHANGE ITS
POSITION

In Reference to the Tariff of the
Kingdom—Only Two Questions of
Importance to Be Yet Dis-
posed of—Lloyd George States
the Government's Position.

London, May 7.—At the opening of
yesterday's meeting of the imperial
conference, Premier Jameson expressed
the hope that there will be a more
sympathetic answer, on behalf of the
home government, from Lloyd George,
than had been received from Mr. As-
quith. He asked to be allowed to
move the question of the tariff at
the earliest possible time, to devote much
thought and counsele thousands to
issue a preference to all portions of
the empire on the present dutiable
articles of the British tariff.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier thought con-
sideration of the proposed resolution
should be postponed until the main
resolution had been considered.

Lloyd George, however, insisted that
Premier Jameson's resolution, that his gov-
ernment could not change its position in
reference to the tariff of the United Kingdom.
Having referred to Britain's position in
the world, he said that in Mr. Deakin's
resolution the government was asked to
do what no protectionist country in
the world would do, namely tax
the colonies' best customer. Proceeding to
consider what he called proposals of
the colonies, he said that Britain was
not the colonies' best customer. According
to him, the colonies' best customer was
the United States, and the colonies could
not afford to offend the United States.
He spoke approvingly of Sir Joseph
Ward's suggestion for improved and
expedited communication, and also the proposed appointment of
commercial attachés of the colonies to
assist British trade. He was con-
sidering the appointment of what he
might term "imperial commercial tra-
velers" to investigate the trade con-
ditions and requirements of the
colonies and to report to the
British government.

Salomon, who had been a
