COMMERCIAL MATTERS.
What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The installation of an electric power plant at Rouman, Sask., is being accelerated. Calgary, Alta., ratepayers voted in favor of extending the electric lighting system at a cost of \$25,000. The Belleville and Toronto Rolling Mills company is running day and night. J. C. Dabell, of St. John, N.B., has established an industry at Moncton for the manufacture of bed springs. The Boston and Maine railroad has nearly completed a lot of 50 special box cars for the exclusive transportation of automobiles. The cars are of the 36-foot type, with large end and side doors that make them very accessible and easy to load.

Involuntarily in the Dominion of Canada during April reported by H. D. Dun & Co., Montreal, which compares with seventy-two millions in the corresponding month last year, when the amount of defaulted indebtedness was \$212,274. The American Madras company has commenced operations at their plant in Hamilton, Ont. It will produce cast-iron steam and hot water boilers only, which product is handled and sold through wholesale or jobbing houses at Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg. The new fire-proof power-house for the Quebec Railway, Light and Power company is to be entirely void of wood, even the window casings being of steel. Tenders have been received and accepted. The Dominion Bridge company receiving the steel work and Francis Farnham, Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg, the contractor for the stone and concrete construction. John Galt, C.E., Toronto, has presented his report to the Vernon, B.C., city council in reference to utilizing electric power. He suggests that the plant be located at Shuswap Rapids, twenty-six miles east of the city, and estimate the cost at \$170,000. The Patrick Lumber company, limited, recently organized in Montreal, with a capital of \$100,000, controls a lumber limit situated on two branches of the Little St. Lawrence River, in British Columbia. The limit comprises about 500,000,000 feet of lumber, the cutting of which should occupy about twenty or thirty years. The company is engaged in the erection of a sawmill to cost \$125,000.

Cornwall, May 4.—Cheese—were boarded, 163 colored. Six buyers were present, and for nearly two hours they bid in vain on Montreal inspection while the factory men held out for factory inspection. THE LATE JOSEPH POTTER

Passed Away at Portsmouth After Brief Illness.
Portsmouth mourns the death of one of her best citizens in the person of Joseph Potter, who died on Monday evening, after a short illness of heart trouble brought on by sciatica rheumatism. He was taken ill on Sunday night after retiring quite well. The deceased was born in Worstershire, Eng., sixty years ago. He resided in Kingston and Portsmouth for the past forty years, as gardener. From 1858 to 1890 he served in the Portsmouth council. For several years he was a member of the public school board, always taking a deep interest in education. In politics he was a liberal, and in religion an Anglican, a member of St. John's church. The deceased is survived by his wife, four daughters and three sons. Arrived at home: Eva, in Toronto; Mrs. C. Kelso, Toronto; John, George and Joseph, in Portsmouth. Four brothers and three sisters also survive. Two brothers are Charles Collins Bay, and George of Portsmouth. The rest of his family live in England. Mr. Potter was a member of Court Frontenac, No. 30, I.O.O.F. The flags on the Portsmouth town hall and the village public school are at half-mast out of respect to his memory.

The remains of the deceased and her aged husband, who died some months ago, were laid side by side this morning.

New Post Office Opened.

A new postoffice has been established about five miles north-east of the city, to be known as Maple Lawn. John Hogan is the postmaster, and the new office is located at the top of the high hill just west of the residence of Marshall Fair. It will be a great convenience to many people residing in that section.

Will Be Light Docket.

There promises to be a comparatively light docket at the non-jury high court session on Monday next. No cases have been served as yet. There will be three or four applications for naturalization papers.
