

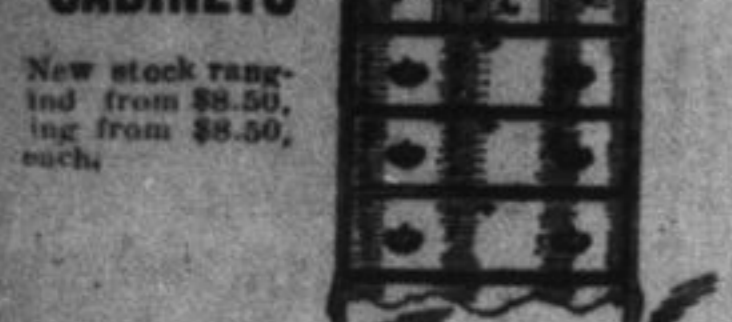

NOT ENOUGH MONEY

GIVEN FOR THE FACULTY OF PEDAGOGY.

How Are Manual Training and Domestic Science to Be Established—Where Will the Money Come From? Asks a Trustee.

In regard to deciding upon the capacity of collegiate and public school teachers to be utilized for the practical work of the faculty of pedagogy, Queen's University authorities propose to submit this matter to a board of three persons, viz., the dean of the pedagogy faculty, the public school inspector and the collegiate institute principal. If a collegiate teacher is deemed incapable of being an instructor to a pedagogy class, it is not proposed to oust him at once, but to give him sufficient time to get another appointment. The very best of the public school teachers would be assigned to the Victoria school classes, where the practical instructional work would be given. The collegiate principal would receive \$500 of the \$1,900 grant for collegiate work, and the other teachers there would get smaller amounts. The principal of Victoria school would get \$200 extra.

At present there are no properly equipped domestic science or manual training classes in the schools. These are essential for the pedagogy teachers and must be installed. At the city council withdrew the \$900 appropriation asked by the Board of Education for domestic science this year, how can the classes be installed? Where will the money come from? A school trustee asks. The \$500 offered by Queen's will not go far. The trouble is that the Ontario government has given Queen's the miserable paltry sum of \$5,000 to establish a faculty of pedagogy that requires at least double that amount. The opinion of trustees and others is that the \$5,000 offered by Queen's to the Board of Education is not nearly enough to place the school system on a basis for pedagogy instruction. The city council will have to act before the Board of Education can introduce domestic science and manual training. And where will the money come from? The humble citizen asks. Can the roads bow down to pedagogy, and last a while longer? It looks as though the city council would have to supply what the very "liberal" conservative government at Toronto has failed to do.

STANLEY SMELTING WORKS.

The Mines of a Company Locating Here.

The directors of the Stanley Smelting works have issued a letter to their stockholders, informing them that the corporation's new smelter will be located at Kingston, that city having voted a free site of five acres and ten years' exemption from taxation. This will cause a considerable saving in freight rates and in the cost of coal and coke. Regarding their mines they say: "We have got our largest vein opened up for 4,000 feet, and the vein is from ten to twenty inches wide, carrying on an average, ten per cent. lead, the main workings are now over 300 feet deep, and the shaft No. 3 or western shaft, is now seventy-five feet and being rapidly sunk. On no place that we have opened up along this 4,000 feet has the vein shown less than ten feet wide, with absolutely no rock in it to handle, nothing but calcite and lead." A 500-ton concentrating mill is being installed on their property, and a continuous aerial tramway from the mine to the mill, a distance of four and a half miles.

Fear That the Wheat Crop Will Be Smaller Than Usual This Year. Clarence W. Smyth, a traveller for a firm at Winnipeg, was in the city yesterday on his way to pay a visit to relatives at Montreal and Quebec.

Mr. Smyth was asked about the crop prospects in that district, and stated that many farmers had completed seeding. This, however, was in the high grounds, but in the low grounds nothing had been done as yet.

"I have is some fear that the wheat crop will be somewhat smaller than last year," said Mr. Smyth, "but the supply of oats and barley will be very large."

The latest reports from Winnipeg go to show that there is great concern over the seeding throughout the west. This is due to the fact that on Sunday last there was quite a fall of snow in different parts of Manitoba, and there was also freezing weather.

In speaking of the immigration to the west Mr. Smyth said that Winnipeg was flooded with new foreigners every day. The new comers were eagerly sought after by the farmers. Winnipeg, he said, was going ahead at a rapid rate. People from all parts of Canada and a great many from across the line had gone there to live this spring.
