The company, which was asked by twenty-seven and one-half to thirty cents an hour and linemen from twenty-three and twenty-five cents to twenty-five and twenty-seven cents an hour.

Perth, Ont., May 9.—Mrs. T. A. Code, wife of T. A. Code, proprietor of the Perth Felt and Kaitling mills, died at her home, here last night, at the age of fifty-two years and six months. She was a daughter of the late John Leslie, jeweler, Ottawa, and was loved and respected by all who knew her. She leaves a husband, one daughter and one son. The funeral takes place on Friday.

Brantford, Ont., May 9.—The lifeless boat of Benjamin Jackson, of North Park street, was found, on Saturday morning, on Terrace Hill street. Suspicious of foul play are entertained. An inquest will be held.

Killed By Bursting Wheel.

Brantford, Ont., May 9.—William Hopkins, an employee of the Gooden, Shapley, Muir company, was killed, this morning, by the bursting of an empty wheel on which he was working.

DEATH FOR AGED DIVINES.

Minister Proposes a Substitute For Annuities.

London, May 9.—Rev. T. E. Ruth, Liverpool, made some of his followingists fairly glib as he talked the other afternoon before the Baptist Union, which was holding its annual session in this city. His subject was superannuated clergymen, whose treatment by his denomination he considered very disgraceful. He offered what he called a barbaic suggestion, and said he thought its adoption would be a decided advance on Christian ethics. His suggestion was of the Oeler sort. Like Oeler, he fixed an age limit beyond which no minister should be allowed to pass for whom he was presenting. And just as Dr. Oeler, responding to a world-wide outburst against his declaration that men ought to be put to death at forty, pleaded that he was indulging in humor when he said it, so Mr. Ruth proclaimed that he had spoken as a humorist, but a group of many who heard him unfold his suggestion prayed that they might not be around if he should ever again be taken with a humorist fit. This is what he said:

"We give our old ministers a miserable pittance which we call an annuity. I would suggest a kinder method. I would defer every year a man of fifty-sixty to the edge of a cliff. It should be a glorious autumn afternoon. I would have the man of fifty-nine address his seniors, pointing out the gorgeous cloud palaces in the western sky. He would say, 'Within my many mansions in my Father's house, I am bidding them take the path to glory which the setting sun has cast on the silver sea, he would tell them gently over, one by one, and some away humming, 'Part of them have crossed the flood and part are crossing now.'

"No doubt he would chuckle to think that his three weeks' come next year. No doubt he would have a feeling of joy to think he had rendered God and his generation more service than an annuity fund."

The sentiments of those who heard these humorous remarks were somewhat divided. There was a certain amount of applause. There was also a distinct manifestation of disapproval. One venerable clergyman actually burst into tears. He was shocked at Mr. Ruth's grotesque humor.

A SHIP RAN AGROUND.

Fog Put the Baltic Out of Her Course.

New York, May 9.—The big steamship Baltic, which sailed yesterday afternoon, went aground in the main channel and still fast. The vessel went out light, having but a small cargo on account of the longshoremen's strike. A number of tugs were promptly dispatched to the scene, but as the accident occurred at high tide great difficulty is expected to be experienced in releasing the boat. The accident occurred during a dense fog which caused the Baltic to get off her course.

The Baltic carries about 250 first class passengers, while in the second cabin and in the steerage the list is very large. The crew of the ship numbers over 400.

Montreal Young Woman Gets Money Back.

Montreal, May 9.—Justice Curran heard a suit for breach of promise which offered some unusual features. Miss Abeline, alias Amanda, Jasmin, dressmaker, sued J. E. Durocher, a young business man, for \$1,990 on the ground that after obtaining from her \$500 on notes and giving her in return a policy in the French-Canadian Artisans' Society, he abandoned her and refused to carry out the arrangements for their marriage, and for loss of time caused because she gave up her ordinary work a short time for their engagement, because Durocher did not want people to say he had married a working girl. The plaintiff was given \$155 damages and the amount of the loan.

VANCOUVER MAN'S LEGACY.

Hundred Thousand Dollars From Estate of J. H. Smith.

New York, May 9.—The will of the late James H. Smith is made public. The value of the estate is estimated at not more than \$25,000,000. Among the beneficiaries is a cousin, James C. Keith, Vancouver, B.C., who receives a legacy of \$100,000. The estate, after three million is paid to the widow and various other legacies are taken out, goes two-thirds to George Grant Mason, division superintendent of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and one-third to William S. Mason, a bank official at Evanston, Ill. Both men are nephews.

Mr. Smith died suddenly at Kioto, Japan, on March 26th, while he and Mrs. Smith were on their bridal tour.

ENTOMBED FOR NINE DAYS.

Remarkable Rescue of Miner in Australia.

Victoria, B.C., May 9.—The steamer "Mammoth" from Australia, brought news of the rescue of an Italian miner, Varichetti, from an Australian mine by divers, under circumstances similar to the rescue of Hicks at Bakersfield, California, a few months ago. He was nine days imprisoned in a living tomb before divers succeeded in rescuing him.

WARSHIP ON HAND.

Britain Will Place Another in West Indies.

London, May 9.—In view of the recent rioting at Castries, Island of St. Lucia, and the fact that a British warship was not available for relief purposes, at the earthquake at Kingston, J., the British government has decided to station a second cruiser in the West Indies, the Scylla, a third-class cruiser, having a speed of twenty knots and carrying a crew of 273 officers and men, has been selected.

Melcombe, May 8.—Very little seedling has been done as yet. Miss Julia Ralph, who has been a nurse in Ogdensburg state hospital for the past six months, has returned home. The new library placed in our school will afford reading material to pupils and the older folks. The school's condition is unimproved. George Moore and family have moved into the house owned by John Bolger.

On the 27th ult., there passed away an old and respected resident in the person of Mrs. James McDonald. The general esteem of the community was shown by the large funeral which followed—her remains to Lansdowne vault. Interment will take place in the new Catholic cemetery.
