BOTTOM OUT OF IT

The Trouble Was a Shortage of Capital—Pieton is Talking of a Sewerage System—Personal Notes. Pieton, May 11.—The bottom is out of the Lake-on-the-Mountain, at Glenora. At least, this is the case so far as the scheme of H. C. Kennedy, promoter of Warton, is concerned. About two years ago, Mr. Kennedy secured F. S. Wilson an option on the lake. His proposal was to have the lake supply electricity for the county and eastern part of the province. Its peculiar position, over 200 feet above the lake, made the scheme feasible. The Ontario Electrical Power Development company, was organized, and capitalized at \$1,000,000. The matter was more than a nine days' wonder. Many investments in the stock were made. Time passed and no developments. The option expired in January, this year; a three months' renewal was made and then another for six weeks. Now it is understood Mr. Kennedy has dropped the matter. Why has the subscribers money gone to? In advertising, it is said, and it is understood that Mr. Kennedy claims he has lost much in the ill-fated scheme. The trouble was that not sufficient capital was raised to push the development. As a result many Pietonians and others of the county are out small sums of money, which, however, are all less than \$100.
