Dry Farming in Utah.
Not all the farmers in the great west can have the advantage of irrigation. Those who cannot have, in Utah, organized the Dry Farmers' Association. As far as we are able to learn dry farming is the growing of such crops as do not require much moisture.
Four years ago the legislature of Utah provided for experiments in dry farming as an object lesson to farmers who cannot get water for irrigation, and the system is declared to be remarkably successful. One result of this has been to show that a large part of the water used for irrigation is wasted; that the crops do not need all the water they get and that the expense could be reduced. It is expected that the development of dry farming will quickly double the tillable land in Utah and greatly increase the agricultural products of the state.

LONGBOAT IS STILL IN THE LIMELIGHT.
If He Accepts Education He Will Be Professional—Echoes of the Burns-O'Brien Fight—Falconer and Kelley.
Manager McCarey, of the Los Angeles club, substantiates Brasso's statement that O'Brien tried to fake the bout.
The usual exodus of Cornwall lacrosse players appears to be under way, judging from the howl the Cornwall papers are putting up.
The Burns-Squires bout is scheduled for Los Angeles, on Decoration day, May 30th. Burns will decorate Squires' face in indigo tints, they say.
In the ladies' golf championship at Newcastle, Ireland, Miss May Hezel, Portrush, beat Florence Hezel, Carrish, by 2 and 1 to play, thus winning the championship for the third time.
International golf competition between the United States and Canada is to be attempted this season. Ten well-known amateurs, chiefly from the metropolitan and Philadelphia districts, have agreed to come across the border and participate in tournaments and team matches.
"Jack" O'Brien is the latest addition to the gallery of fallen idols of the United States prize ring. O'Brien stated that his match against Burns would be his last. It ought to be too, if the Canadian fighter's story is true. There is no room on this continent for fighters who attempt to "fix" their mills and humiliate the spectators.
The young male members of the three Anglican churches in Brockville have formed an athletic association for the purpose of engaging in baseball and increasing the coming summer, and elected the following officers: President, Rev. H. H. Bedford-Jones; vice-presidents, H. Y. Farr, Rev. F. D. Woodcock, Rev. O. G. Holbs; secretary, A. D. Pearson.
Miss Violet Summerhayes, of the St. Matthew's Tennis Club, Toronto, the holder of the ladies' intermediate championship title, will leave for England on May 17th, and will participate in the great English tennis championship tournament at Wimbledon in July. Miss Summerhayes will compete in several local tournaments before leaving. She will play against Miss Sutton, the renowned world's champion, while in the old country.
The reports from Ottawa, Collingwood and a dozen other places that Longboat had consented to run there at the coming athletic meets, are all denied by the great Indian runner himself, who writes from Collingwood, stating that he will only run twice during the summer, once at the Y.M.C.A. games at Harlan's Point, on June 14th, and at Caledonia, on May 24th. He has his other engagements, and, despite reports to the contrary, no inducements of any nature will make him change his mind, he says.
Toronto World: When in Toronto, last winter, Noah Brasso contacted those he conversed with that he could defeat "Jack" O'Brien. This Quaker also had the same opinion and was only induced to enter the ring by a rash of his friends and was not the Canadian's tactics were reasonable. Burns only received a draw in his previous bout, when the public verdict was in his favor. This he had to obliterate and another battle was necessary.

Women On Russian Railroads.
The number of women employed on the Russian railways is increasing. According to the latest returns there are now working on the twenty-five Russian state railways no fewer than 22,000 women as inspectors, clerks, telegraphers, etc. The average wages vary from 130 to 135 rubles per month (\$65 to \$70). The extremes are great. Thus, the women clerks receive on an average from 450 to 460 rubles, or about \$225 per month. Some telegraphers at the station get only 70 rubles, or about \$35 a year, in addition to free lodging and a few extras.

Sensbury, Pa., May 13.—George J.
