



Depth Of Great Lakes.

Lake Superior's greatest depth is 1,003 feet, Michigan's 864, Huron's 570, Erie's 204 and Ontario's 738 feet, says the Indianapolis News. The bottom of Superior is 401 feet below sea level, of Michigan 283 feet, of Ontario 491. The bottom of Huron is 11 feet above the sea level, that of Erie 369 feet. Ontario, the smallest of great lakes, is relatively the deepest. If these bodies of water could be drained the basin of Ontario would present striking contours as compared with the basins of the much larger lakes.
