ORDERS FOR CAMP

ISSUED BY COL. GORDON O. C.

The Troops Will Assemble on June 17th—Composite City Regiment Will Go Into Camp on June 25th.

The following command order concerning the June camp at Barrieffield has been issued by Colonel W. D. Gordon, commanding eastern Ontario: 1. In accordance with G.O. 75 of the 2nd April, 1907, the following units of the active militia of M.D. No. 3, will assemble for training in camp at Kingston, on Monday, the 17th June, 1907, except the composite city regiment, under command of Lieut. Colonel J. Earle Halliwell, 10th regiment, which will proceed to camp on Tuesday, the 25th June proximo: 3rd Dragoon, 4th Hussars, 5th Dragoons, "B," "C" and "D" squadrons; 4th Regiment R.C.I.; 16th Regiment; 40th Regiment; 40th Regiment; 40th Regiment; 49th Regiment; composite city regiment, detachment C.P.A. S.C.; No. 3 Co., C.A.S.C.; No. 3, field ambulance; detachment O.S.C. Instructions as to routes and hours of departure will be issued later.

2. The establishments of all units authorized to train will be that issued with G.O. 58, of the 2nd April, 1907.

3. (a) Each corps detailed for training in camp will send an advance party of five men, to the camp on Saturday, the 15th June proximo, to take over the camp equipment and lay out the camp.

(b) The officer in charge of each advance party will be instructed to report personally, at headquarters office, on arrival at camp, to the D.A.A.C., and bring him a nominal roll of his advance party, and the necessary requisition for the camp equipment for the unit to which he belongs, computed as per G.O. 112, of the 16th May, 1903. The following allowances for subsistence in addition to pay, for the officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the advance parties of corps proceeding to camps of instruction, as follows: Officers, \$1.50 per day; N.C.O.'s and men, 75c. per day.

(c) Officers commanding shall apply for a date, through the C.S.O., Eastern Ontario, for militia books form C 23, as their quartermasters will require to take them with them to camp two days in advance of the troops, one of these requisitions filled up and signed by the commanding officer, to be handed on arrival to the S.A.S.U. of the camp.

(d) As one cook per squadron, battery or company, is to form part of the advance party, arrangements must be made for a warm meal to be ready for the main party on its arrival at camp.

(e) Commanding officers, who have not already done so, will requisition for camp cooking ranges at once, if required, forwarding the same to the C.S.O., Eastern Ontario, which ranges will be issued on the camp ground at Barrieffield. Should camp ranges not be required, provision should be made for camp kettles.

(f) Applications for transport of advance parties should be made to Eastern Ontario, giving place of departure, and railway or steamboat by which required.

Permanent Corps Examinations.
On Monday next, the examinations for appointment to the permanent corps and promotion therein will begin in Ontario Hall. The board of examiners will consist of Lieut.-Col. Hemming, C.S.O., Major Eaton (Ottawa), and Major Leslie, R.C.H.A.

The 14th P. W. O. Rifles.
The following is the company establishment of the 14th Princess of Wales Own Rifles: One captain, two subalterns, one color sergeant, three sergeants, four corporals, thirty privates, one bugler, total, forty-two. The total establishment is 408.

No. 5—Capt. H. J. Dawson, Lieuts. Mahood and Richardson.
No. 6—Capt. H. P. Taylor, Lieuts. Craig and Betts.
No. 7—Lieuts. Campbell, Manhard and J. Richardson.
No. 8—Capt. W. H. Craig, Lieuts. Bowdell and Folger.

The first four companies comprise the right half battalion, under the command of Major A. B. Cunningham. The other four companies comprise the left half battalion, under the command of Major W. B. Skinner.

Attention is drawn to the new condition of efficiency pay which will be as follows: First year men, twenty cents a day; second year men, fifty cents a day; third year men, fifty cents a day. The claimant must have fulfilled these conditions: He must, unless amongst those exempted, have made an average of outings at the two short-range ranges prescribed for the musketry practice of his corps. Those exempted are the sergeant-major, quarter-master sergeant, sergeant-drummer, O.R. sergeant, paymaster-sergeant, pioneer-sergeant and bandmen. Qualifying practice began at the penitentiary butts, last Saturday, when companies Nos. 1 and 2 did their firing.
