BUILDING IN PICTON

MANY STRUCTURES ARE BEING ERECTED.

The Town is in the Hands of a Boom—Sudden Death of Mrs. S. M. Conger—New Canning Factory at Hillier.

Factory at Hillier. This is a signal year in the upbuilding of Picton. A building boom is on and never in the town's history has there been a busier spring season. All labor is in demand and the very highest wages are being paid. The building operations now in progress represent considerably over the \$100,000 mark and plans are being prepared for several other building operations. The new cement brick Baptist church on King street. This edifice will probably cost \$6,000, and represents a noble achievement of a particularly small congregation.

Activity in the business life of Picton is also responsible for many building improvements. A brick extension of 115 feet, being added to Allison's drug store. C. F. It will be 200 feet in length and be constructed of steel and cement. Many of the town's prominent citizens are also building and some very handsome homes are going up. E. M. Young, barrister, is now putting the finishing touches to his handsome \$10,000 home. In several instances five to eight thousand dollars is being expended in new houses.

A QUIET STRIKE.

Little Work Being Done Loading Vessels.

Montreal, May 14.—The longshoremen's strike for higher wages has so far progressed quietly. Comparative little work is being done on board the steamships in port, the companies having again received permission to make arrangements to secure help outside. The crews of the steamers are doing what they can, but it is not much. Police reserves were on hand, early today, in case of development of any trouble, but their services were not needed. It is just reported that the teamsters have gone on strike, and this will tend to still further complicate the difficulties of the steamship companies in getting ships loaded and unloaded. The strike leaders deny that their work comes under the Lennox act, not being a public utility by the name of a railway whose work is entirely carried on in the domain.
