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WON A \$4,000 PRIZE

MR. ROGERS, OTTAWA, HOLDS A LUCKY TICKET

Ticket Was Purchased By His Father, and Entailed An Annual Subscription to Keep It Good.

Ottawa, May 14.—W. H. Rogers, interpreter of the immigration department, was given a glad surprise, this morning, when he received a letter from Germany informing him that he was the lucky holder of ticket No. 16,001, which had drawn a prize of \$4,000 at the annual drawing of the Leipzig lottery, on May 1st.

Mr. Rogers' father was a British consul in Austria, and he purchased ticket No. 16,001. At his death the postulated passed to his son, who for twenty-three years paid his \$6 fee as holder. The clear profit on his prize when his fees to conduct the lottery are deducted amounts to \$4,000.

SOLD AT RESTAURANT. Candies, Ice Cream and Fruits Under License.

Toronto, May 14.—By a decision, given by Judge Morson, to-day, it is legal for an one holding a restaurant license in this province to sell candy, ice cream or fruits, on Sunday, and it is not necessary that whatever is purchased be eaten on the premises.

John Devins, restaurant keeper, at Sunnyside, was recently convicted under the new Lord's day act, for selling candies on Sunday, and fined \$20 and costs by Magistrate Kingsford. He appealed before Judge Morson, who made judgment to-day.

In quashing the conviction the judge held that the kind of food a person wanted depended upon the person's taste or the length of his purse. A man could choose what he wished to eat, whether it was candy or ice-cream or ham and eggs. He should be allowed to purchase light food and take it away if he so desired.

The judge could not distinguish between the various kinds of foods, and there was, no doubt, that candies, oranges and ice-cream were foods. Under the old or the new Lord's day act these may be sold by a restaurant on Sunday. It is understood there is no appeal from this decision.
