

RUSSIAN TORTURE.

Prisoner Covered With Kerosene and Set on Fire.

The London Chronicle gives the following story of Russian torture from the town of New Margelen. The village of Kupa would appear to be in the province of Fergana, in Russian Central Asia, of which Margelen is the capital.

On February 10th final sentence was passed in the matter of an attorney in the village of Kupa upon the house of a rich money-lender, from whom \$25,000 was taken. The temporary council of war of the district sentenced three men to death by hanging, six to labor in the mines for various periods, and six were acquitted. The trial was conducted with open doors, and many of the public were present.

A disagreeable impression was produced on those present by the disclosure in the course of the trial of torture, to which it appears the accused persons were subjected by the officials of the Kupa village administration at the time of the preliminary examination. They poured kerosene over the back of one of the prisoners, and then set light to it. He showed the horrors at the time of the execution of the prisoner the torture was unmentionable. It is held that the native administration were led away by an excess of caution.

However, it must be remembered, that all of the routine labor is not of the exacting sort, like mining and nursing. Moreover, as we have seen, the liberty to "knock off work" at will is one of the incentives of the caste workers—one that is freely used, but apparently never abused. No doubt, under such a rule, they get more satisfaction, one might even say, enjoyment, out of life than winged idlers whose career, is shut in and restricted at so many points that they seem to be little more than privileged prisoners of state.
